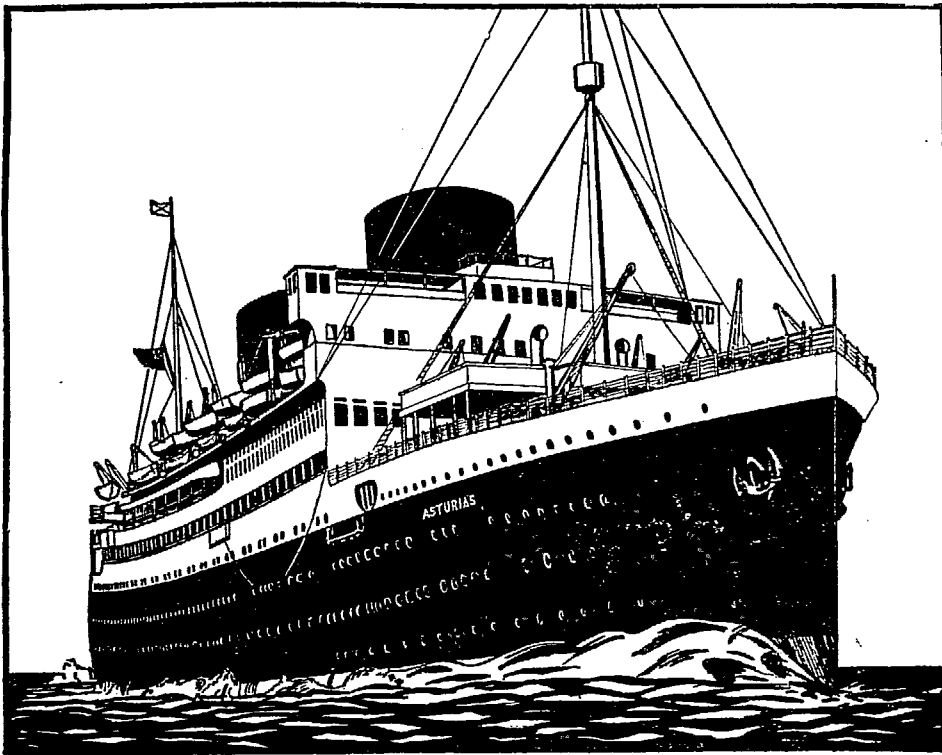

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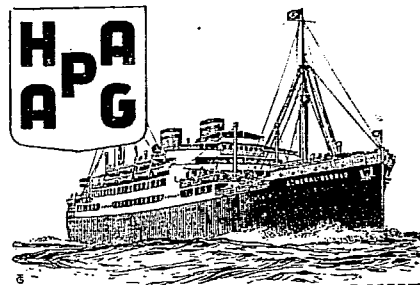

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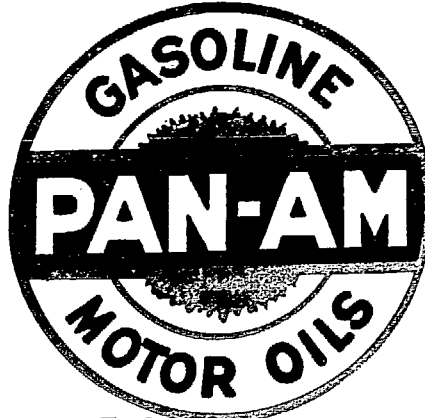

**THE ECONOMIC READJUSTMENT OF BRAZIL**

**A REDUCTION OF 50 % FOR ALL FARMERS' DEBTS CONTRACTED BEFORE. JUNE 30, 1933**

Decree 23.533 of December 1st, 1933.

— Art. 1st — The valorem of all Agriculturist debts contracted before June 30, 1933 is herewith reduced of 50 %, provided said debts had cash or mortgage guarantee.

— Art. 2nd — Debts of any nature, contracted by agriculturists with Banks or Banking Houses, are also reduced of 50 %, provided said debts have been contracted before June 30, 1933 and when the debtor is insolvent.

— § 1st — Debts contracted after June 30, 1933 and which represent a renewal or continuation

of previous debts, are also included in the present Decree for all it contemplates.

— § 2nd — All persons dedicating their activities, physical or juridicial, to agriculture, cattle or cattle-raising, are considered agriculturists to all effects of this Decree.

— § 3rd — The benefits of this Law are also fully extended to those Agriculturists who engage in other business or activitl besides Agriculture.

— § 4th — Landowners whose property is rented to third Parties or who do not engage directly in farming or field-culture are not included to benefit by this Law, as are not also obligations or debts contracted in foreign currency.

— Art. 3rd — To indemnify for the losses suffered in virtue of Art. 1st and 2nd, creditors shall be entitled to Federal Government Bonds, par value, 6 % yearly interest, of the nominal value of 1:000\$000 (one conto of réis) each, the issue of which is hereby granted to the Ministry of Finance, to the limit of 500.000:000\$000 (five hundred thousand contos of réis).

— § 1st — The Government Bonds will bear

this date and shall be redeemable after a period of thirty years, starting from June, 1935.

— § 2nd — The interests shall be paid bi-yearly, in June and December of each year.

— § 3rd — Redeeming will be effected by lot-drawing, in December of each year.

— § 4th — Bonds and respective interest are exempted from whatever duty or tax.

— Art. 4th — The Bonds referred to in Art. 3rd — will be accepted by the Banking Mobilization Fund (Caixa de Mobilização Bancaria), par value, as security for operation of credit proposed to same in the terms of Decree 21.499, June 9th, 1932.

— Extra Paragraph — The Government protracts the period of existence of the Banking Mobilization Fund Bureau in order to attend solicitations made for the cases considered in Decree N. 21.499 of June 9th, 1932, on the basis of guarantee for these bonds.

— Art. 5th — The creditors reached by this Decree, who in their turn are debtors to Banks or Banking Houses, will have the right to effect payment of their debt previous to the date of this Decree, on a basis of 50 % in above referred bonds, par value.

— Art. 6th — In order to execute the dispositions contained in this Decree is hereby established an "Economic Readjustment Bureau" (Camara de Reajustamento Economico).

The Ministry of Finance will enter into an understanding with the Banco do Brasil as to the functioning of said Bureau.

— Art. 7th — By the terms of Art. 3rd. — all Banks and Banking Houses shall submit to the Economic Readjustment Bureau a detailed statement of the reductions made by force of articles 1st and 2nd.

Extra Paragraph. — Commercial and other creditors will communicate to the Bureau of Economic Readjustment, within the maximum period of 6 months, enclosing copy of documents and other papers proving the existence of the obligation and consequent reduction allowed.

Article 8th — Creditors who refrain from forwarding regular communication within the period stipulated, or who obtained in whatever other way examinations and verifications by the Economic Readjustment Bureau, will lose the rights to the indemnization referred to in Art. 3rd.

Article 9th — Is hereby granted to the Economic Readjustment Bureau the exertion of any practice intended for control of the exactness and legitimacy of the reduction of credit for which notice has been given, inclusive examination of documents relative to the case.

Article 10th — Are subjected to the effect of this Decree only those debts through which the agriculturist is debtor and principal payer, and emitter or acceptor if the title is transmissible.

Article 11th — The present Decree will be effective the day of publication, its text being forwarded to the Interventors for immediate publication. Dispositions in contrary are hereby revoked, including those of constitutional character.

## THOUSANDS OF CUPS OF STEAMING BRAZILIAN COFFEE ARE SERVED DAILY IN CONNECTION WITH AN IMPRESSIVE EXHIBIT

### A notable demonstration

Coffee exhibit is the right name for the Brazilian display. Although leather, metals, cotton and other agricultural products are featured they are overshadowed by the weight that is put on the coffee exhibits. The striking frieze of enlarged photographs all around the space is almost entirely devoted to coffee culture. The majority of the exhibits are coffee beans from various Brazilian states. This in addition to the fact half the large space is occupied by the thronged coffee bar.

Rich and spicy odor from the coffee makers spreads through all the adjacent aisles. Automatically noses turn that way and feet follow them to the Brazil exhibit. The cups are full breakfast size, with saucers. The cream is rich. The enticing drink is handed over the counter by pretty girls who make the guests feel heartily welcome.

At busy times the coffee drinkers are two and three deep all the way around the counter. The pleasing stimulus of being at a place that is a center of popularity, the good reaction from the expression of pleasure and approval that are voiced on all sides and the quality of the product itself, expertly prepared and attractively served, all make a friendship-bringing effect that seems to register one hundred per cent.

### Brazil Day Observed

Brazil day at the Fair was September 17th. The exhibition was officially dedicated in a welcoming ceremony in the U. S. Government Building at which Mr. Rufus C. Dawes, president of A Century of Progress greeted the Brazilian delegation. The Brazilian ambassador was represented by Capt. João Alberto and Mario Monteiro de Carvalho, assistant Brazilian

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commissioner to the World's Fair, and Senhora Rosalina Lisboa Miller, who replied to Mr. Dawes's address of welcome.

The banquet which followed was featured by Brazilian music and general rejoicing that Brazil and Brazilian coffee were taking their place in the focus of creative activities at the Fair.

A large diorama of a São Paulo coffee plantation is a decorative feature of the exhibit. Companion to this is a diorama of the harbor of Rio de Janeiro.

At the end of the general exhibits space is a frieze effectively made from a giant enlarged panorama photograph of the city of Rio de Janeiro. The remainder of the frieze all around the inside of the space is devoted to coffee in the field, in sacks and on the dock.

Long staple cotton, leather and leather products, including women's shoes of bird skin, seventy kinds of commercial woods, oil producing nuts and plants and a number of varieties of hemp fibre are shown in the exhibit area, but they are all dominated by the green coffee exhibits. In one case are twenty-four different varieties from different states.

A beverage that may have a wider acceptance in the United States as a result of this exhibit is Maté tea from Brazil. Maté tea is not served but is for sale in small colored kegs holding about a half a gallon of the dry leaf and is generally sampled in attractive cartons.

Maté tea tastes and looks, when brewed, something like green tea with a special racy flavor of its own, and its beverage effects are similar to those of tea. The annual production in Brazil is around 200,000 tons, of which 75 per cent is consumed in Brazil and Latin American. The largest export year was 1926, with 92,657,000 kilos. In 1931 this had fallen off to 76,759,000 kilos.

The Brazilian exhibit is on the second floor of the Travel and Transport Building and is excellently placed just above the main entrance to the great hall of the building. The entrance aisle leads directly to the much publicized "world's fastest escalator" of the Otis Elevator Company, which conveys a constant stream of visitor to the second floor where the first thing they perceive is a strong perfume of coffee inviting them to the Brazil exhibit a few steps away. — O. C.

## CHEMICALS AT 1934 B. I. F.

### GROWTH OF SECTION

A notable indication of the growth of this Section of the British Industries Fair is given by the fact that six months ahead of the 1934 Fair, which opens on February 19 and continues until March 2, chemical manufacturers had booked more exhibition space than was occupied by all exhibitors in the Chemical Section at the 1933 Fair.

The heavy chemical industry had its origin 100 years ago in Great Britain. British enterprise, based on conveniently situated supplies of salt and coal, the essential raw materials, since then has been conspicuous in this field of chemical production. The United Kingdom produces acids and alkalies, chlorine, bleaching powder, water glass and all heavy chemicals which are the basic requirements for industry.

Since the World War, continuous applications of scientific research, drastic replacement of old plant by new concentration of production in a few of the latest types of works have enabled the chemical industry to strengthen its position, widen its resources and improve its services to its customers.

## O PODER DA OBSERVAÇÃO

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Remarkable progress has been made, too, by the British fine chemical industry. It is now second to none in the range and quality of its products. Among them are: medicinal and pharmaceutical chemicals; photographic chemicals; laboratory and analytical chemicals, including microscopic dyes and stains for medical investigations; perfumery chemicals and essential oils; rare earths such as are used in the electric filament lamp and gas mantle industries; solvents and plasticisers of a wide variety of types now largely used in the paint, lacquer, varnish, soap and perfumery trades.

One typical example of the work of the British fine chemical industry is its development of insulin for the effective treatment of diabetes. To put this remedy at the disposal of the masses, the British industry undertook a vast amount of research and investigation. As a result, insulin of the highest quality is now available at a fraction of its original cost.

The British dyestuffs industry has grown immensely since the war. In 1913 more than 80 per cent. of British domestic requirements were imported; now British dyes hold a secure place in world export trade. Prices are on a competitive world level; quality is beyond reproach; the range is sufficient to meet most practical requirements. Three of the five main dye post-war research discoveries have been due to British industry.

Similarly, British chemical manufacturers have made conspicuous progress in developing fertilisers and other products for the agriculturist.

The Chemical Section of the 1934 British Industries Fair will be organised, as in past years, in conjunction with the Association of British Chemical Manufacturers. It will afford a striking demonstration of the resources of the industry and of the

specialisation characteristic of it in its close attention to the varying needs of markets in all parts of the world.

## **LONDON FINANCIAL POSITION**

The dominant influence in the financial markets is still the uncertainty surrounding the future of two important currencies, American dollars and French francs, from both of which there has been something in the nature of a flight, though in considering the fluctuations in rates the existence of a big speculative position must be taken into account. Uneasiness regarding the ultimate result of the experiment in monetary policy in America has been increased by the various resignations from the so-called "Brain Trust", the latest being that of Dr. Sprague, formerly American adviser to the Bank of England. This development had the more effect because the letter of resignation constituted a strong indictment of the President's policy. The dollar has not repeated the record low valuation reached on Nov. 16, when the rate touched 5.53, and at the moment is well below that figure, but if the candid opinion of leading experts on both sides of the Atlantic could be ascertained a substantial majority Cuyabanos made 5 1/2d, M. V. Americanos 6 1/4d, adverse to the plan would be disclosed. It is significant that opposition to the policy in America is much more pronounced.



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France once again is wrestling with the Budget problem and more especially the task of imposing fresh taxation that would be accepted by all political parties. The downfall of another government has taken place, and the currency is depreciating. It seems clear, however, that only a small amount of gold has been withdrawn from the Bank of France on American account, much of the quantity recently lost by that institution having been taken for London, partly in connection with the operation of the Exchange Equalisation account which buys francs in order to control sterling expressed in the French currency.

There are some unfavourable features in the general situation. The Disarmament Conference has not definitely broken up, but there is little prospect that any satisfactory agreement will be reached. The political future of India is the subject of much controversy among our leading politicians, and it has been decided that the World Economic Conference cannot be resumed.

Any satisfaction with the continued improvement in the trade of Great Britain is neutralised by the belief that the disorganisation of the foreign exchanges, and especially the uncertainty as to the future of the dollar, must check international trade and consequently our export business, though the Chancellor of the Exchequer has stated that as yet our trade has not been seriously affected. He indicated that measures might be considered to meet the depreciation of the dollar. Great Britain has intima-

ted to France that if the latter country continues its discriminatory surtax of 15 per cent on British goods, retaliatory measures will be taken. The monetary situation here shows no real change. The Bank rate is likely to remain at the present figure of 2 % for a considerable time to come — possibly as long as the Country remains off gold — and evidently the great Banks do not intend to bring about a further appreciable rise in market discount rates. Their last attempt was upset somewhat by foreign purchases of bills at below the Banks' buying rates, such purchases having possibly represented one form of the flight from the franc.

Because of the above considerations the general tone of Stock markets has been dull though the leading gilt-edged securities have shown considerable resistance. There has been no heavy selling but for some time there was very little fresh support, either from investors or speculators, so that prices generally tend to dwindle. With a rally in both the dollar and the franc the tone became firmer.

The proposals of the British Government to assist the finances of Newfoundland by offering a British Government guaranteed stock in exchange for the various issues of the Colony have aroused some discussion, and an immediate effect was a somewhat spectacular advance in the various 3 % and 3 1/2 % issues which under the proposal would obtain the same terms as the 5 % bonds, a circumstance that has led to some adverse criticism. Another matter which is very strongly criticised is the



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proposal of the Union Cold Storage Company to reduce the interest rate on the 6 % and 7 % Preference stocks by one per cent and on the 10 % issue by 3 per cent. In compensation a cash payment of 2s. Od. per £1. of stock is offered to the 6 % and 7 % holders and of 6s. Od. per £1. to the ten per cents — terms equivalent to the proposed reduction in interest over a period of ten years. It is thought that if these proposals are adopted various other Companies with Preference Capital bearing a higher interest rate will announce similar measures. The matter has aroused so much feeling that the London Stock Exchange Committee has taken the unusual step of asking the Company to postpone the meeting for three weeks in order to give shareholders more time to consider the matter.

Less uneasiness is now apparent regarding the future of Germany, and a recent statement by Chancellor Hitler was regarded as reassuring. German Government bonds, consequently, have recovered well, some purchases on Berlin account having been reported.

Not much improvement has taken place in Brazilian Government securities, the market for which is still more or less nominal, though the speech of the new President was considered satisfactory.

Argentine Rails are still greatly depressed, but it is difficult to believe that the present low prices of some of the Debenture and Preference issues are justified.

At the Royal Mail Steam Packet meeting the Chairman could do little more than go over the ground covered by the annual report. He emphasised the fact the losses of £9,000,000 (after taking in the reserve account) related to those already ascertained, and that while the company would do everything possible to cut down expenses the whole of the ordinary and preference capital must be regarded as lost. He hinted also that part of the losso might fall upon holders of the 5 per cent second debenture stock, the current price of which is about. 26.

## LONDON PRODUCE NOTES

### COMTELBURO AIRMAIL SERVICE

Nov. 24th, 1933

There was little change in the general influences which at the moment govern the Produce markets and business continues to be somewhat difficult to effect. Sugar was steadier in tone chiefly on reserve of sellers and some improvement in the dollar. Foreign 96 per cents, afloat parcels, sold at 4/4 1/2d per cwt, and December to outports at 4/6 3/4d, c. i. f. The refined section was steady with fair sales reported at unchanged prices. In the futures market there was a good deal of liquidation but found ready absorption and the market closed firmer.

The rubber market remained steady throughout the week and closed firmer in tendency on outside support. This was engendered largely by favourable news regarding a meeting to consider restriction, which is now being held in the Dutch East Indies. Smoked sheet, spot, sold up to 4 1/4 per lb. The

United Kingdom stock showed a further falling off of 832 tons last week and is now down to 88,909 tons against 97,973 tons a year ago. The demand for tea at the week's auctions was less active and prices were easier in many instances. Common Indian and Ceylon maintained late rates but all other grades declined in value. The quality showed a further falling off, especially that offered at the Ceylon auction. Home consumption, however, retains a high level and during October 38,000,000 lbs. were withdrawn from bond on this account. The United Kingdom stock is now in the neighbourhood of 300,000,000 lbs. Coffee received only moderate support. Good liquoring Costa Rica and African kinds sold well at firm rates, but all other kinds were neglected. Brazilian kinds were dull; superior Santos, prompt, quoted 35s. f. o. b. Cocoa was a weak market and prices fell sharply under lower New York advices and pressure to sell. Good fermented, Accra, January-March shipment, sold down to 17/9 per 50 kilos, c. i. f., Continent, Jute was quiet and easier in tone owing to quieter Calcutta news and poor trade support; first marks, December/January, selling down to £14 6/3 per ton, c. i. f. In the hemp market Manila eased but little business was done, African sisal declined sharply following a large sale of Mexican sisal at old rates, which, owing to the incidence of exchange, means that the figure was to all intents and purposes much lower. No. 1, Tanganyika and Kenya, December/February shipment, sold from £16 to £15 12/6 per ton, c. i. f. one port.

**TIMBER** — There was a slight improvement in the demand for mahogany, there being a little more

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inquiry from merchants for forward shipment, but the prices asked by shippers are too high for buyers to operate. However, with the demand for mahogany expanding, it is possible that some business may eventually be arranged. In the absence of supplies little interest is shown in Gaboon. The demand for Japanese oak is not so active. Large quantities of South American wood came to hand recently per "Polycarp". The wood is well manufactured and excellently graded and is much in favour with buyers, especially as supplies of Central American mahogany are difficult to secure.

**FRUIT**—Arrivals of South African and Brazilian oranges were shorter, and the demand was more brisk with values firmer. Oranges from Spain are likely to arrive in larger quantities from now onwards and particularly from Nov. 30th, when the duty of 3/6 per cwt, automatically reverts to one of 10 per cent, ad valorem. The Spanish crop promises to be large. Oranges Brazilian 126's 13/6 to 14/6, 150/176, 16/9 to 17/6; 200/226's 17/6 to 20/—; 250/288's 19/6 to 21/6; 324/360's 19/— to 20/—; New Malagas 420's, 22/— to 22/6 per case, Bananas-Canary 12/— to 14/6 per crate; Jamaica 9d to 11d and Brazilian 6d to 9d per dozen. Imports last week about 35,000 bunches of bananas and 24,000 boxes of oranges.

**HIDES** were quiet and occasionally easier. B. A. Americanos sold at 5 5/8d wid 6d now asked; Cuyabanos made 5 1/2d, M. V. Americanos 6 1/4d, and B. A. Anchos 4 3/4d to 4 7/8d. Other sales included dry Mollendos at 6 1/8 d, dry Cearas at 7 3/8d, salted Mendes seconds at 2 7/8d. Dry first Carves sold at 6d and seconds at 5 1/8d.

## THE MINERAL INDUSTRIAL OF BRAZIL

### DIAMOND MINING

The history of diamond mining in the Diamantina region would be incomplete without a reference to the Post Extração period when mining was thrown open to the general public instead of being a privilege exercised exclusively by the Crown.

The Extração Real, which had shown progressive decadence towards the latter years of its existence terminated in 1841 when its gang of from 3,000 to 5,000 slaves had dwindled to one feitor and a few men whose salaries were in arrears.

This gang was to carry on desultory operations about 8 kilometers east of Diamantina in a small tributary of the Rio do Inferno, the major tributary of the upper Jequitinhonha. The military patrol of the region had by this time become a mere farce carried out by about 25 badly equipped men and clandestine mining was being practised more or less openly. The discovery of a rich area on the hill top above the valley in which the Extração gang was working caused the new field to be rushed by hundreds of miners who defied the authorities to evict them. Lacking the means to enforce order the Intendente tacitly threw mining open and for the time since the discovery of diamonds in Brazil 120 odd years previously the general public was allowed the unrestricted privilege of mining.

By subsequent legislation this privilege was confirmed under certain conditions which, however,

were not of an onerous nature and which with few exceptions are still in force.

The scene of the discovery that ended the Extração gave birth to the village formerly known as Curralinho but which is now officially called "Extração" in remembrance of the despotic days of the Extração Real.

The new field was eventually extended to include the Cafundão and Corrego de Bom Successo and thus embraces the region in which the Serrinha, Cavallo Morto and Boa Vista mines are situated.

During the Post Extração period river mining was principally confined to the remnants of areas partially or imperfectly exploited by the Extração.

In river mining it frequently happened that an unusually early rainy season would cause the abandonment of a "catta" before it was completely stripped. Such areas and also the space occupied by the dams of the previous miners generally repaid the cost of deviating the river from its course.

Certain sections of the Jequitinhonha and Rio do Inferno rivers were known to be "virgin" owing to the abuse of the clause stipulating that the Contractors should prosecute mining systematically upstream. The Extração itself was guilty of picking the easiest or most promising sections.

These virgin sections generally proved highly remunerative and some of the Post Extração miners reaped rich rewards. Lavra do Mato proved practically inexhaustible. The Pocão de Moreira,

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Itaipava, Mata-mata, Canteiras and sections of the Rio do Inferno gave rich returns.

In the last mentioned river it is related that a single pothole yielded 23,000 carats during the course of one afternoons' work.

By way of comparison it may be mentioned that a pothole on the farm Klein Zee in Namagualand, South Africa, produced £40,000 worth of diamonds from an excavation 4 feet deep by 4 1/2 wide.

It was the discovery of diamonds in South Africa that eventually put an end to the Post Extração period by completely ousting Brazil from the position it had occupied for over 100 years as the chief diamond producer of the world.

The abolition of slavery in 1888 coincided with the low price of diamonds and ended by paralysing the diamond mining industry in Brazil for a number of years.

Although Brazil contains a larger percentage of high grade diamonds than South African it has never succeeded in regaining its former glory in the diamond world nor is it likely that it will ever recapture that proud position.

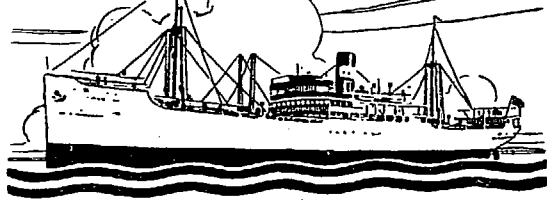
