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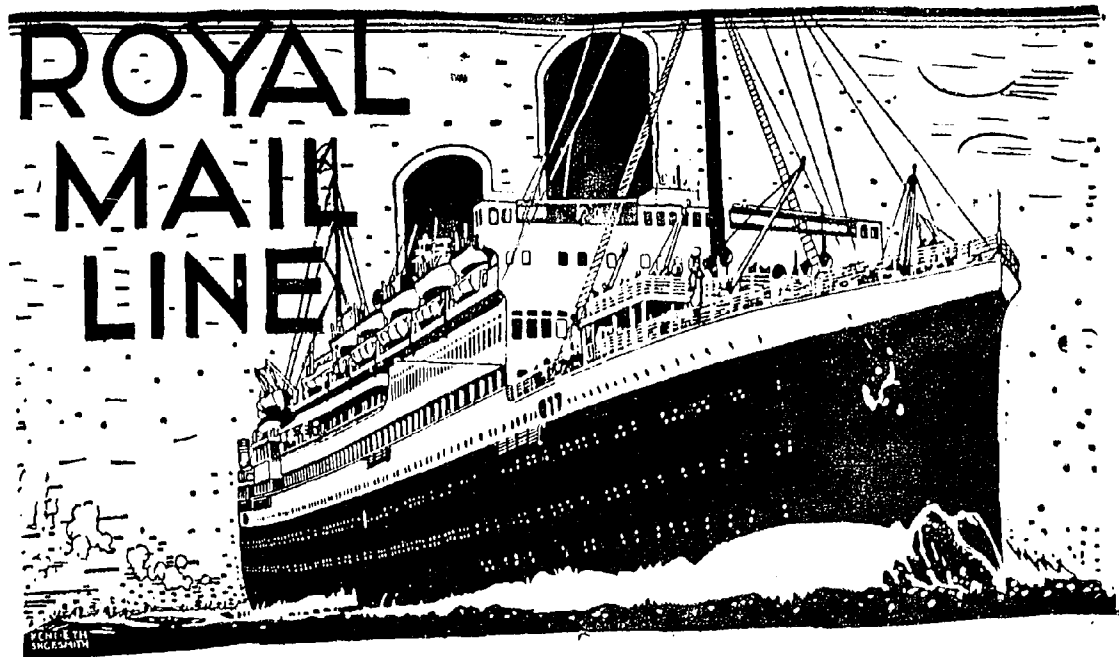
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Notes

Cement Imports of Cement into Brazil during June last totalled 10,269 tons, of value Rs. 1,548,460\$000 or £10,859; the figures for 1935 were 7,114 tons, Rs. 1,127,533\$000 and £8,400. Imports during May 1936 were 6,521 tons, valued at Rs. 988,162\$000, and £6,811. Total imports during 1936 amount to 46,814 tons, Rs. 7,330,989\$000 and £50,645, comparing with 57,762 tons, Rs. 7,539,080\$000 and £ 57,218 during the same period of 1935.

Motor Trucks Motor Trucks imported into the country during June last totalled 675 units compared with 682 in June 1935, and 506 in May 1936. Chevrolet imports were 220, International 193, Oldsmobile 96, and Dodge 90.

The weekly session of the Federal Federal Council of Council of Overseas Trade was held on Monday last, under the presidency of Minister Sebastião Sampaio. Following the usual procedure, the minutes of the penultimate session were approved, and the weekly subject matter read, this dealing with a variety of subjects, chief amongst which were: Petition from an exporter of this city requesting that steps be taken to facilitate the entry of Brazilian rice into Denmark, the present regulations permitting only imports of the Spanish product; Petition from two important Northern cotton exporters requesting permission to export to Germany three thousand tons of cotton each, against compensation marks, but not under the provisions of the agreement with this country; Telegram from the Matté Institutes of Paraná and Santa Catharina, communicating the signature conjointly of a contract with M. Le Comte Fleurien, of Paris, for the propaganda and sale of Matté in various countries of Europe.

In regard to the petition of the cotton exporters, it was decided that the newly created Committee for the Control and Execution of Commercial Agreements should be heard on the matter before any action is recommended.

The report of the Executive Director contained an invitation from the Director of the Fruticultural Services of the Ministry of Agriculture, Dr. Alves Costa, to the members of the Council to visit the installations of the Department at Nova Iguaçu; the occasion will be celebrated by the opening of a new packing house, and a luncheon will be offered to the members. The Council duly replied acknowledging the honour, and requested that a convenient date be fixed.

Minister Sebastião Sampaio also reported that the ruling of the Council regarding the exchange quota on lard exports had been duly ratified by the President of the Republic.

A Committee composed of Counsellors Victor Viana, Franklin de Almeida, Valentin Bougas, Lennhoff Britto, and Oliveira Castro, was nominated to study the question of facilities to be conceded to the entry of foreign literature and the necessities thereof into the country; this Committee will present a report to the President of the Republic for approval.

Sr. Arthur Torres Filho spoke on the urgent necessity for an entirely national "frigorífico", operated by Brazilian capital, as an incentive to the meat trade of the country. This is an enlargement on a motion passed at a recent Cattle Conference which approved a number of special concessions to national or nationalised frigoríficos.

Sr. Souza Mello moved that all the American Republics be invited to attend and exhibit at the National Exhibition to be held in 1938; this motion was passed to Sr. João Maria de Lacerda for attention, as the representative of the Permanent Committee of Fairs and Exhibitions.

Sr. Euvaldo Lodi read a report on the industrialisation of the fibre and cellulose trade, Sr. Victor Viana requesting the right to study the question, discussions being therefore postponed.

It was decided that as the following Monday (to-day) is a national holiday, the customary session of the Council

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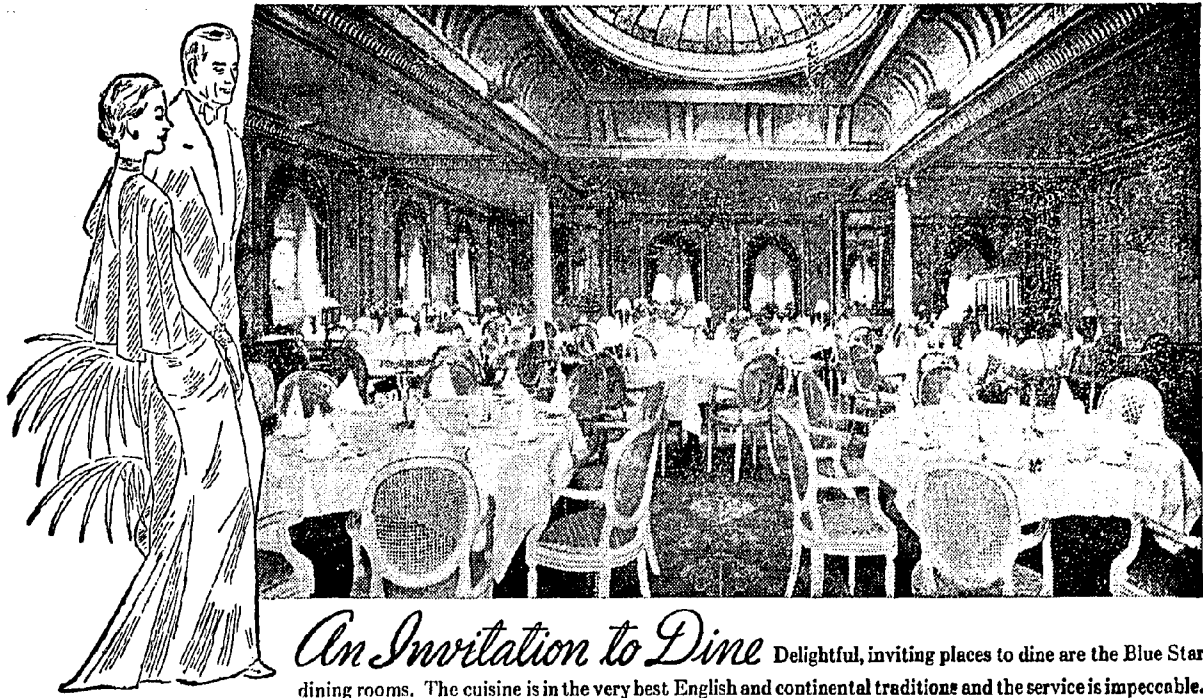
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would be held on Wednesday, September 9th., at the usual time and place.

Cotton

Classifications of Cotton in São Paulo during the second half of August totalled 50,644 bales amounting to 8,762,924 kilos, which brings the totals for the month to 123,764 bales and 21,304,747 kilos, the high percentages of better grades being maintained. Crop totals to 31st. August are: 918,288 bales and 158,924,247 kilos, three-quarters being above type N° 5; these figures compare with last year's totals of 495,011 bales and 918,288 kilos, the percentage of better grades being less than 50.

Reports from the North state that the Parahyba cotton production during the year ended June 1936 totalled 45,000 tons, slightly under one half being exported overseas, and only 3,000 tons being consumed locally.

The latest State to attempt the improvement of its cotton crops is Santa Catharina, whence a request was sent to the Secretariat of Agriculture in Campinas, S. Paulo, for a quantity of selected seeds and a technical expert in cotton growing. There are now only or two Northern States where improvement measures are not regularly enforced.

Shipping

The conquest of the Blue Riband by the "Queen Mary" was to be expected after the East to West record run, but the satisfaction of the English nation is not diminished by this; the reduction of the "Normandie's" time brings the record crossing under the four day period — another vic-

tory. Clyde Bank in particular was jubilant, perhaps more deservedly than any other part of the country — except, of course, the offices of the Cunard White Star Line in London, where Sr. Percy Bates, President of the Board of Administration of the Company, was presented with a silver trophy by the Insurance Companies covering the vessel.

The question now under discussion is the construction of the sister-ship — whether this will take place at Clyde Bank or the Tyne. Clyde Bank claims priority due to the specialised equipment still available from the construction of the "Queen Mary", whilst Tyneside argues that the unemployed yards there should be given a fair share of the country's shipbuilding. However, it is probable that the contract will be placed at Clyde, particularly as the unemployment question is not as chronic at present as it was earlier on in the negotiations for the new liner.

In the harbour last week the S. S. "Alderamin" of the Rotterdam-Zuid Amerika Lijn ran aground in what was charted as 30 feet of water, although the vessel was only drawing 27 feet. As the Agents truly protested, the extra tax collected by the Port Authority could be well applied in keeping the main navigation channels clear of silting.

It having been definitely decided that the electrical power for the operation of the new services of the Central do Brazil Rly. of the new services of the Central do Brazil Railway is to be supplied by contract with an independent Company, the Light & Power has submitted a further proposal, the rate for the first year's supply having been reduced in comparison

with the previous quotation. The actual signature of the contract will probably be somewhat delayed.

The S. S. "Bonheur", (Lampart & Holt Line Ltd.), is due to arrive on September 16th. with the first lot of rolling stock for the Railway, consisting of one driving unit and two passenger coaches. Trials are expected to take place between the Dom Pedro II terminal and the station of Engenho de Dentro, the track and overhead system being almost completed on this section; the trolley wires have still to be installed, but this will not take more than a few days.

The Railway has lodged a petition through the Ministry of Transport with the Ministry of War, requesting the annexation of a piece of land which is the property of this last Department; this area is of vital importance to the completion of the control stations at Deodoro, where all the major electrical departments are situated.

The change of terminals for the São Paulo and Minas expresses from the Dom Pedro II terminal to that of Alfredo Maia will probably take place next week. Contrary to previous information, all traffic to the Dom Pedro station will be paralysed, the suburban trains running from Francisco Sá, the first station on the main line.

It was announced last week that the first of a new service of Pullman trains to Belo Horizonte, capital of the State of Minas Geraes, was run last week, on the occasion of the return to that city of certain notable persons, to attend the Eucharistic Congress. This service will now be permanent.

Samples Fair

Preparations for the Ninth International Samples Fair in this city are proceeding apace, and the meetings of the Organising Committee are of increasing interest. These meetings are now held every Wednesday, under the Directorate of Tourism and Propaganda of the Municipality.

The Argentine exhibits will surpass anything previously exposed in the Fair; the Wine Growers' Association has convoked a special Committee to control the flow of barrels and cases for exhibition in Rio, and select the finest only, there being comments on the possibility of the Argentine taking over a considerable portion of the trade with this country, which is at present practically monopolised by Portugal. The Province of San Juan (Argentina) is making special efforts under the guidance of the Directorate of Industry; freight concessions have been made, and subsidies granted.

At present the expected exhibitors are counted from Germany, Argentina, Denmark, Czechoslovakia, Great Britain, the United States, Finland, France and Italy, apart from the majority of the States of the Federal Union. Portugal is apparently unable to exhibit this year, due to export decreases, chiefly in the wine trade.

An innovation this year is what is termed the "Concurso de Vitrines", — a competition for window-dressing; judging by the efforts of some of the more important houses regarding new buildings and installations in the city, this should present a very fine show indeed.

Communications have been received by the Organising Committee from many of the Companies operating passenger and freight services to and from Brazil, offering considerably reduced rates. The Leopoldina Railway, as previously stated, has confirmed that the reductions granted on passenger fares and freights in 1935 will be maintained this year. Similar concessions have been made by the Central do Brazil Railway. At the latest meeting of the Com-

mittee, the President acknowledged communications from the Lloyd Brasileiro, conceding 50% reductions on passages and freights, and from the Federal Inspectorate of Railways, notifying that 50% reductions would be applied by all the lines under its jurisdiction.

The Custom House has advised that duties on exhibits for the Fair will be waived, and rigorous inspection measures are under debate at present to ensure that this concession is not abused.

A pavilion is to be reserved for an exhibition of tropical plants, flowers, and fruit, special diplomas being granted to the finest exhibits; this is a novelty which will prove of particular attraction to foreign visitors, as even in the finest Botanical Gardens of the world the luxury and beauty of Brazilian vegetation has never been more than imitated.

Aviation & Air Mail Services

There is much talk of the transatlantic Air Race to take place shortly, though there is as yet very little of interest to report except from Paris, where an entirely new method of construction has been embodied in the French entry. It is said that one or two women will compete.

The South African Air Race for the Schlesinger Trophy to take place at the end of this month is also attracting interested attention all over the world. The race commences at Portsmouth on September 29th., and the imperial aerodromes will serve as route indicators, remaining lighted all night until October 1st.

It is rumoured that a new air mail and passenger service will be initiated next year between England and New Zealand, regarding which negotiations are already in an advanced stage.

There is again some talk regarding the legality of the Sacrifice Quota, a group of coffee lawyers in São Paulo affirming that Article 113 of the Constitution states that disappropriation for the public good shall only be effected subject to just and previous indemnisation. In point of legal fact, it would probably be possible to argue on these lines, but the first stumbling block is that even regarded as disappropriation, the sacrifice quota is not enforced by any but the representatives of the actual classes affected; it cannot, therefore, be regarded as a measure enforced by Government on the country at large, but on a class by an entirely autonomous body, the juridical situation of which is inviolate. However, perhaps too much notice is taken of a mere storm in a tea-cup, as the quota will certainly be applied, and that rightly and strictly, and the opposition will probably be shown the error of its ways by the very people on whom it inflicts its ridiculous ideas.

Of greater interest and importance is the Bogotá Conference, regarding which there are many different opinions. There can be little doubt, however, that the two main lines which will be taken by the Brazilian representation will be first, to limit the evils of overproduction, and secondly, to come to some agreement regarding co-operative world wide propaganda campaigns. A third possibility, though of a rather sweeping nature, is the general elevation of selling prices on wholesale markets; this has its attractions, but due to the unrest in the coffee world it would perhaps be wiser to avoid this issue for fear of greater complications.

THIRTY FIVE YEARS AGO

Extracts from "The Brazilian Review" of
September 10th., 1901

President McKinley The attempted assassination of President McKinley is, perhaps the most wanton and shocking outrage on record. That misguided men should be driven by centuries of oppression and misery to right themselves and society by terrorising and eliminating kings and princes, the representatives of the class they regard as their oppressors, seems not unnatural if horrible; but that the arm of the anarchist should be raised in the States, where liberty and equality have found their greatest development, must alienate even those by whom they were blamed but pified.

Local Items The decision of the lower court throwing the Sorocabana Railway Co. into forced liquidation has been reversed in the Court of Appeal and the Company thus allowed a new lease of life which, it is to be hoped, it will endeavour to deserve. The affairs of this unhappy concern are so mixed up that nobody seems to know what to do or how to do it. The new management made a good show at first but whether anything has come or is likely to come of the promises, of which they were so liberal, we suppose not even the directors themselves can tell. Their intentions, we have no doubt, are excellent, but so were those which pave the infernal regions.

São Paulo It is proposed to start permanent exhibitions of Brazilian Coffee at the different Brazil — and Consulates in Europe and elsewhere; but it is to be hoped so useful a propaganda will not stop there, but that visitors will be supplied with a cup, ground and made whilst they wait, and for the first time in their lives, perhaps, discover what real coffee is like.

LONDON FINANCIAL POSITION

AUGUST, 28th. 1936

The French Government has been successful in the first stage of its neutrality proposal, as a few days ago the German Government announced that it would put an embargo on the export of arms and war material to Spain into immediate operation. Portugal has also prohibited the export of war material to Spain. The British and French Governments are now pressing those countries which have agreed to prohibit the export of arms and munitions to Spain, but have not yet put their undertaking into practice, to impose an embargo without further delay. These countries are: — Austria, Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Denmark, Finland, Greece, Russia, Sweden, Turkey and Yugoslavia. The next step appears to be to invite the Powers concerned to take part in further discussions on the question of non-intervention. The French Government has suggested the creation of a committee, which might sit in London composed of representatives of all the interested powers. Its task would be to enable those representatives to keep one another informed of the measures already taken by their Governments to ensure non-intervention, and to consider any fresh problems arising out of the situation. The British Government is now giving full support to the proposal that there should be an international humanitarian appeal to both sides to mitigate the horrors of the civil war in Spain.

There is now less agitation in various countries for intervention in the Spanish conflict, interest having been partly diverted by the latest decree of Herr Hitler increasing the period of military service from one to two years. This decree, it is believed, will have the effect of increasing the German military strength by about one-third. The German nation had evidently been prepared for some such step to be taken because of the attention given in the German press lately to the question of Russian re-armament.

Meanwhile London financial circles continue to be unaffected to any serious extent by the course of international politics. The foreign market has been firmer in tendency. French Government Loans and the Railway Sterling issues having improved on the visit of Dr. Schacht, the President of the Reichsbank, to Paris, where he paid a visit of courtesy to the Governor of the Bank of France. He has also had conversations with the French Ministers. The discussions have apparently been perfectly friendly and have covered foreign affairs affecting the two countries and economic questions. Chinese Bonds have been a much better market, on the offer by the Chinese Government in connection with the payment of part of interest on two of the railway loans. Brazilian Government Bonds have hardened slightly. Home rails were neglected for a time, on the possibility of a coal miners' strike over a question of membership of rival organisations, but have rallied since the publication of excellent traffic receipts, which point to the increase of industrial activity, particularly in the areas of the two Northern lines.

British Government stocks have continued to rise owing to the pressure of plentiful money and further buying by foreigners who wish to place their money in safe stocks.

The new account on the Stock Exchange has started off with a cheerful tendency, but with a reduced volume of business, activity being mainly confined to buying of special shares which have already reached high prices. Leyland Motors, Standard Motors, Turner & Newall, Triplex Glass, Woolworth and other market counters have

further risen well on prospects or rumours of increased business, but the market has now started to "boil over" and Woolworth and one or two others have reacted on profit-taking. The tendency is still cheerful, sentiment having been helped by further evidence of expanding trade. In the more speculative markets interest centres in the firmness and activity of West Wits and other developing properties. Rio Tintos showed some recovery when it was known that the mines had fallen into the hands of the insurgent forces in Spain and that the property was safe. Rubber shares have become a firmer market, the commodity have risen slightly on reported purchases on a larger scale by Russia.

Favourable factors influencing markets include the announcement that rayon production in Gl. Britain during July was the highest monthly total on record. The output was 13,810,000 lbs. or 840,000 lbs. above the previous record of 12,970,000 lbs. established in May last. The total for July 1935 was 10,910,000 lbs. so that the output for July last shows an increase of 2,900,000 lbs. against July last year. The returns of retail trade published in the Board of Trade Journal show that the money value of sales for July, 1936 was 5.8 per cent higher than in July 1935.

An indication of a return of prosperity to the heavy industries is the increase in the dividends declared by the Slaveley Coal & Iron Co., the Sheepbridge Coal & Iron Co., and Hawthorn Leslie & Co., shipbuilders. The better prices obtained for tea at the auctions have led to a further improvement in share prices.

Among recent company reports of outstanding interest is the substantial increase shown in the profits of the Triplex Safety Glass Co., showing that undertaking has benefited from the activity in the British motor industry. Net profits rose by £35,588 to £147,091. The distribution for the past year is 6s. per share, or 30 per cent against 3s., or 30 per cent for 1934-5.

The Bank of England continues to increase its stock of gold, the influx since January 1 last having amounted to well over £45,000,000, the total holding now being over £246,000,000, and as the Bank has resumed buying at a period when the note circulation is declining, it is assumed that the Central Institution is preparing for the larger volume of currency that may be needed by the increase in internal trade, with the expectation of a new high record in the note circulation just before Christmas.

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LONDON PRODUCE NOTES

LONDON, August 28th. 1936

SUGAR — A steady tone ruled in the sugar section but business generally was quiet. There was a better day to day demand for refined sorts at unchanged prices, while refiners took small quantities of raws at from 4/5½d. to 4/ per cwt. c. i. f. for prompt positions. Very limited transactions were recorded on the futures market and values after a fractional improvement fell back to previous levels. Better weather was reported in the beet growing areas on the Continent but root development is understood to be irregular.

RUBBER — The plantation rubber market opened the week dull with some September liquidation in progress. This, however, was soon over and firmer conditions ruled latterly with an improved trade demand for spot and near delivery. Smoked sheet, spot, recovered from 7 9/16, to 7 11/16d. per lb. but distant positions were neglected, as there was very little speculative interest in the market. The U. K. stocks have shown a decline for 25 consecutive weeks, totalling in all 47,394 tons, reducing the warehouse total to 106,461 tons against 175,363 tons a year ago. World consumption for the first six months of the current year is estimated at 497,732 tons against 472,132 for the corresponding period of 1935. The production of motor vehicles in the U. K. for the nine months ending June, 1936, totalled 359,184 units, compared with 311,992 units for the corresponding period last year, and this shows an increase of just over 15 per cent. Business in the shipment market was quiet, with only moderate demand from the United States.

COCOA — On the London Produce markets the chief feature has been the activity and strength of the Cocoa market. If the present rate of consumption is maintained the statistical position is likely to become tight, as surplus stocks have been decreasing rapidly during the past year. For good fermented Accra, new crop, sellers advanced their prices at one time to 32/- per 50 kilos c. i. f. Continent, but the best business reported was at 31/6. The futures market has been very lively with a large day to day business and a record turnover was done on Aug. 25, with sales totalling 3,580 tons. The American market has also been very firm.

TEA — A better tone ruled at the auctions of Indian teas. Common sorts were often farthing per lb. higher while the better liquoring teas from Assam and Darjeeling met with strong competition and made satisfactory rates.

Leaf teas, suitable for export, met with good inquiry. Common Ceylon teas also made a farthing per lb. advance, but medium sorts were distinctly irregular and, apart from leaf grades, which moved off well, the quality parcels sold disappointingly.

COFFEE — Offerings at the coffee auctions were small and mostly odd lots. The best feature was the good competition for Jamaica sorts, which made full rates. Other kinds, where sold, made about valuations.

JUTE — The Indian Government's official forecast for the jute crop was again issued in sections, spread over several days. About four-fifths of the area has been covered so far and production shows an increase of about 21 ¾ per cent. over last year. This was more or less expected as the preliminary acreage forecast showed an increase of over 15 per cent. The market closed the week dull and rather easier. First marks, new crop, made £17 3/9, per ton, while new crop lightnings were offered at £16 5s. c. i. f.

TIMBER — The demand for mahogany of character was well maintained though only a few logs remain in first hands. Only just over 100 logs were in brokers' possession at the commencement of this month, and this number has been but slightly augmented since. The market for teak is a firm one, with a good call for available sticks at steady prices. The African wood Iroko is gaining much favour among consumers. It is appreciated both in its log and lumber form and a steady trade may be expected in the future for this wood.

FRUIT — There was an active demand at better prices. Brazilian, Peras, boxes, 150/176, quoted 15s.3d. to 15s.9d.; 200/216, 16s.6d. to 17s.6d.; 252/288, 18s. to 20s.; South African, Navels, 96/13s. to 14s.; 112/13s.9d. to 15s.; 126/15s. to 17s.; 150/15s.9d. to 17s.3d.; 176/16s. to 18s.; 200/16s.6d. to 18s.6d.; seedlings, 126/150, 14s.6d. to 15s.6d.; 176/200, 15s. 3d. to 16s.6d.; 252/17s.9d. to 18s.6d. Bananas; Brazilian and Jamaican 6s. to 6s.6d. per 10 dozen. Imports from Brazil last week included 44,000 bunches of bananas and 39,000 boxes of oranges.

HIDES — The demand for hides was rather quieter but prices remained steady. B. A. Americanos were quoted at 7d.; B. A. Beceros 7½d.; B. A. Anchos 6½d.; B. A. In-servibles 5½d. and Chubuts at 7¼d. per lb. Further business in salted Brazils included Barretos at 4½d., and Bahias at 4d. to 4¼d. per lb. African hides were firm with dry first Capes at 7¼d. and seconds at 6¼d., whilst D/S were at 6½d. and 5½d. respectively. Australians were dull but steady.

ILHEOS: -

Three steamers are at present loading in Ilhéos for New York, and two more are expected to load this month all these steamers will sail in September. Stocks ashore and afloat are estimated at between 40 and 50,000 bags on account of arrivals having increased considerably lately.

CROP & WEATHER: - The weather has improved and roads are in better condition favouring larger receipts from now on, at least during the next 30/45 days, as in October and November a diminution of arrivals may be likely.

News from the interior regarding the crop in general is unchanged and the general opinion is that total crop clearings will finally attain about 2,000,000 bags.

MARKET & PRICE: -

Owing to the continuous advance of price on the New York Cocoa Exchange local short coverings and speculators continued forcing the market with the result that within a few days prices rose about half cent per lb. Local sales were made on the basis of 7 to 7½ cets, c. & f., both for prompt and future delivery.

Some European and South American markets have bought on the rise and continue to show interest. All sel-

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lers in the interior have withdrawn and are unwilling to sell owing to the advancing and firm tendency of the market and also in view of their large engagements still to be fulfilled. The remaining 15 to 25% of the present crop will only be marketed gradually until the end of this year or the end of the crop, specially in moments of larger fluctuations.
