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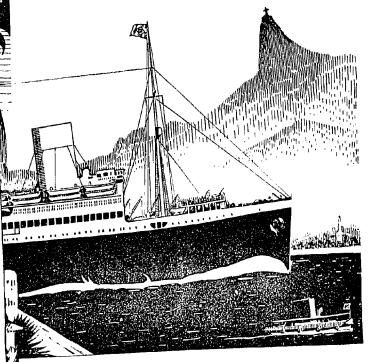

Federal Council of Overseas Trade The weekly session of the Federal Council of Overseas Trade was held on Tuesday last, under the presideney of the Executive Director, Minister

J. A. Barbosa Carneiro,

The subject matter included: Telegram from Sr. Filgueiras Filho asking that small shipowners be allowed to

join the Conferencia de Navegação de Cabotagem (Coastal Shipping Conference): Letter from Vistrada Ltd of São Paulo, asking if Germany has fixed a quota for the payment for beef tallow, and if not, whether such a quota could be obtained: Telegram from the Chember of Propaganda and Commercial Expansion of the State of Parana, requesting an urgent solution of the rail-transport problem, which is a great handicep to trade, and also the immediate approval of the project of law referring to the Pine Institute: Communication from the same source, enclosing two memorandums - one from Sr. Ewaldo Wendler regarding the classification of goods in the Customs at Paranagua and the other from the Industrias Chimicas Maro Brasileiro dealing with an unjust increase in freight rates charged by the Lloyd Brasileiro on acid they manufacture.

The Executive Director referred to the following matters which had been submitted to the Council by the President of the Republic;

- a. Letter from Dr. Raul Leite, pointing out the advisability of restricting the importation of foreign wines, as is being done in Haly,
- b. Memorandum from the Brazilian Automobile Club, asking permission to hold a sweepstake, once a year, on the international motor race which is run annually, and known as the "Circuito da Gavea".
- c. Telegram from the Cooperativa Agricola de Colia, asking that they may be guaranteed rapid transport for the produce they grow in the Parahyba valley, as at present such produce arrives in the markets in a deteriorated condition owing to the slow transport afforded by the Central do Brasil Railway.
- d. Memorandum from Sr. Raul Boulien, requesting the Government's assistance in expanding the national cinematograph industry.

The Executive Deirector furnished information supplied by the Ministry of War regarding the use of fuel by the Military Air Force, and Sr. Torres' report was unanimously approved by the Council.

Sr. Fleury da Bocha's report on the ante-project of the decree-law whereby it would be compulsory to mix anhydrous alcohol with gasolene produced in the country by refining imported crude oits, was read, and Sr. João de Lorenço proposed that the malter be sumified to the Chamber of Production, Consumption and Transport, in order that a more detailed study be made. This sugesstion was approved.

Finally, Sr. Fleury da Rocha submitted his report on the ante-project of the decree-law limiting the production quotas of sugar refineries, Sr. João Maria de Lacerda stated that he agreed with the conclusions arived at by Sr. da Rocha, except his proposal to submit an anteproject, reforming the Sugar and Alcohol Institute in accordance with the Constitution and on a corporative

After discussing the matter, Sr. Arthur Torres Filhe requested that the report be returned to the Chamber of Production. Consumption and Transport.

Sr. Adamastor Lima referred to the efficiency of the Sugar and Alcohol Institute and said that the ante-pro-

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ject which was now before the Council was contrary to the legal dispositions now in operation: He considered that the matter should be returned to the Chamber of Production, in order that a substitute project be drawn up.

Sr. João Maria de Lacerda read a paper regarding the placing of concentrated and solumble coffee extracts and coffee free from caffeine in foreign markets, and a further report dealing with the sale of large stocks of our principal products in foreign markets through the intermediary of experts who, in addition to travelling expenses, would receive an agreed commission. In some cases these experts could be sent at the expense of certain commercial organisations, Government supervision being limited to giving the mission an official character.

- e. Letter from Sr. Bento Lins da Costa, of Parana, putting forward suggestions for organising the matte industry.
- f. Telegram from various interested parties in São Matheus, Parana, requesting the oproval of the National Matte Institute of Parana and Santa Catharina.
- g. Communication from the Brazilian Ambassador in Berlin regarding the working of iron and maganese in Brazil.
- h. Communication from the Brazilian Ambassador in Paris, regarding Franco-Brazilian commercial exchange.

Information was received from the Brazilian General Information Office in Buenos Aires regarding imports of meat into England and the fixing of quotas for the second half of 1938.

Sr. Arthur Torres Filho read his report dealing with the mixing of gasolene and anhydrous alcohol. In his re-

port. Sr. Torres spoke at length about the problem of sugar production all over the world, and especially in Brazil, pointing out that besides the economic side, there was also the aspect of national defence. Since 1929, the capacity of consumption of both cane and beet sugar in world markets has diminished, giving rise to the acute crisis while hthe Brussels Conference of 1931 tried to mitigate by limiting exports, though the producing countries did not adhere to this plan, and thus defeated the campaign against everproduction. The International Sugar Conference, which was recently held in London, under the presidency of Mr. MacDonald, was more successful in an allempt to fix an equilibrium between supply and demand in world markets; under this agreement the quota for Brazil was fixed at 60,000 metric tons. The difficulties of world trade further aggravated the situation and it was a happy inspiration when the Government decided to

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substitute the sacrifice quota by the production of combustible alcohol. When the entire overproduction of sugar can be converted into motor spirit, this will constitute port with the following table:

a safely valve for the sugar industry.

12,459,000 bags, a decrease of 701,000 bags compared with 1935/6. Of this total Brazil contributed 7,257,000 bags (1,522,000) bags less than 1935/6) and other countries 5,202,000 = 921,000 bags less than 1935/6.

For the 1936/37 crop Europe imported 11,336,000 bags compared with 11,433,000 bags from the previous crop, to which Brazil contributed 5,542,000 as compared with 6,097,000 last crop, and other sources supplied 5,794,000, an increase of 458,000.

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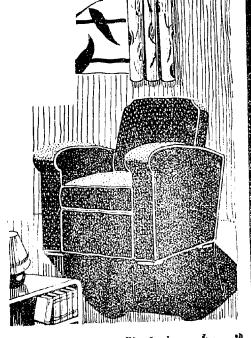
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EXTRACTS FROM THE BRAZILIAN REVIEW

After a terrible lot of fuss and bother and loungers of our fashionable Bond Street, the Rua do Ouvidor, being almost asphysiated with the awful stinks that came from somewhere undergrond at the corner of the Uruguayana, the matter was investigated and it was found that the Improvements' sewers were innocent of blume and that the real offender was the surface water conduit from ble Largo da Sé. A reporter of the Tribune who came to curse remained to bless and certified, in the mest spontaneous manner that "not a suspicion of a smell proceeded from the sewerse which were clean and well flushed, whilst the surface water conduits, in charge of the Municipality were broken in several places, full of slime, and not flushed at all". Political events of the past week, and the increased anxieties which they have created in regard to world's buying power, have only added to the many worries by which the coffee growing world was already beset. The result has been decreased resistance on the part of primary markets and lower offers, causing our markets to react, although only moderately, as prices were already to low to permit larger declines. March Santos went down from a high of 6.58 on March 9th to 6.19 on the 19th. It closed today at 6.42, 130 tenders were delivered and promptly received. December declined from 6.08 to 5.76, and Contract Rio from a high of 4.62 for March on the 9th to 4.22 on the 19th. It closed at 4.40 today. As to distant months, Rio is now quoted at 3.85, at which price we consider it is practically being given away.

BRAZIL - It is really very difficult to say just where our Brazilian friends stend but, frankly, details in this regard are not so very important either, as everbody is fully conversant with their statistical difficulties and their problem of over-production. What everybody does understand is that there can be no permanent improvement in the coffee situation until these difficulties have been settled one way or another. We know that the Government, under President Vargas, realizes this and that it is looking for ways and means of adjusting the situation but that its efforts are limited by considerations of national economy and by the necessity of conciliating, as far as possible, politically powerful coffee growing interests. Time alone can show in how far it will be successful in its endeavors, and whether it will get by with the situation. But this is only one side of the problem. The other consists of the damaging effect which present price levels are apparently already exercising on production in different countries, thereby accelerating the process of the elimination of the weakest. To understand this side of conditions, it is not necessary to read the bifter complains from certain growers who see their life's work menaced - it will be unite sufficient to use our own judgment, in order to realize that at the present price of about 4e a pound for Contract Rio, which includes at least to for transportation from the interior to New York and another cent for taxes by Governments in primary markets which they need for current expenses, the planter gets barely 2e for producing a pound of coffee. In addition, the Government has decided on a sacrifice quota of 30% on the next crop, at a nominal remuneration. This confirms that, under present conditions, the coffee grower has little chance of surviving, and that we are faced by a sifuation which must right itself automatically, and in the not very remote future. The same may be said of the D Santos contract, now selling below 6c. As to cup quality, this represents the pick of a large crop while at the present time there exists an undeniable shortage of such grades. Let us point out once more that the producer of ceffee (Rio contract) would have to take to market five pounds of his product to get a shoe shine for which we pay

It would be a mistake to picture Brazilians just standing around, hanging their heads and awaiting with resignation whatever Providence may decree for them. This may be true of some planters who no longer know which way to turn but, on the whole economic life in Brazil is pulsaling as their population expands and extraordinary attention is being given to the production of other articles, especially cotton. The area planted with this article is rapidly increasing. Most people in Brazil realize that coffee has had its day, and they are trying to make up for it. — the great shortage of labor now existing, is the best proof of this.



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Due to favorable weather during the growing season, large crops of foodstuffs, rice, beans, corn, etc., are expected this year.

DESTRUCTION during February amounted to 721,000 bags in January. During the first half of March 498,000 bags have been eliminated. 11,571,000 bags have been destroyed since the first of July and 59,520,000 bags since 1931.

The Coffee Department let it be known on the 10th that the preferential treatment given to washed coffees,

would also be accorded to unwashed coffees, provided they are well dried; uniform in color, Screen 17, type not inferior to No. 3, fine roast, strictly soft drink and Screen 18 with the foregoing requisities except that they may be "soft drink" instead of "strictly soft drink". We mention this just to show the complications which have developed in the Brazilian crop movement, and what exporters in Santos have to content with.

A cable received yesterday gives stocks in the interior of Brazil owned or controlled by the D. N. C. as follows:

Of the São Paulo stock of the D. N. C., 8,629,000 bags were pledged against the loan. As a rough guess, therefore, we may estimate that there still exists at this writing, about 23 million bags of coffee in the interior of Brazil with a

crop of about 22 million in sight for next season, or about 6 million bags in excess of requirements. These figures are unsatisfactory indeed. We estimate present world consumption at about 25 million bags.

Mr. Oswaldo Aranha has now been appointed Minister of Foreign Affairs in Brazil. His nomination has been very welcome here, as he is known to attach great value to friendly relations between Brazil and the United States. He was the negotiator of the 1934 agreement regarding the readjustment of payments of interest on Brazilian foreign loans.

THE COFFEE LOAN has, in the meanwhile, sold at 25 from 96 at the beginning of the year. The bendienders are looking forward with keen interest to the result of the yearly survey of the quality as well as the quantity of coffee now on hand. This is supposed to take place after April 1st, when substitutions will be termineted. Creditors would like to know why amotrization of the loan, through the sale of coffee, remains suspended while the D. N. C. continues to rapidly dispose of its own stock. There appears to be no good reason why at least 100,000 bags of the loan ceffee should not be sold every montheither in Santos or consigned to consuming coaptries and sold there. This would permit the buying up every month, of bonds to the nominal value of at least one million dollars, at the present dopresed value. Does there exist an iron clad loan agreement? That is, are the rights in regard to the collateral only imaginary or arc they real. and why are bondholders continually expected to take a back seat? In this connection it is interesting to note the recent decision of the Supreme Court relative to lawsuit brought by a Colombian Bond Holding Committee. It pointed out that it is averse to arrangements under which a so-called independent trustee surrounds himself with exculpatory barriers, and decided therefore, to appoint a referee to examine causes and to determine in how for the trustee of this loan had done his duty in looking after

the interest of the bondholders and the observation of the

loan contract.

Under the circumstances, it is also interesting to see that Mexico has just confiscated American oil properties worth \$400,000,000. This may prompt our State Department to lend a more sympathetic ear to the rights of Americans in foreign countries who have risked their capital, confident of the protection of their own Covernment. As it is, the P. A. U. (Pan American Union) seems to have taken on another significance, i.e., "Pluck Americans Ummercifully". In this regard—the non-fulfillment of her obligations—Colombia is one of the worst sinners. It is a most deplorable state of affairs.

Exports of coffee from GUATEMALA, up to February 10th amounted to 370,977,263, quintals, compared with 428,451.02 quiitals last year. Severe whole in the lowlands seem to have done a great deal of berm to flowering in Jamary, and may result in the loss of a part of the next crop.

The SALVADOR crop is not supposed to exceed 700,000 bags this year.

Exports from JAMAICA during 1937 totaled 7,398,590 lbs. compared with 10,320,821 ibs. in 1936.

Reports from ECUADOR are to the effect that arrivals curring. December Jenuscy have been about normal, but that considerable stocks are being held back on plantations in expectation of higher prices.

Exports from CUBA amounted to 155,496 cwt. in 1937 congared with 48,736 in 1936 — 40,950 in 1935 and 26,281 in 1934

COLOMBIA exported during the eight months of the crop year 2.758,336 bags against 2.912,880 (1936-37) a decrease of 154,544 bags or 5.3%, Exports to the U.S. totaled 2.112,274 bags against 2.108,877 in 1936-37.

Exports to the U.S. from the DOMINICAN REPUBLIC for 1937 amounted to 48,998 bags (60 kilos) against 34,902 bags in 1936, an increase of 40.3%.

Arrivals from HAITI to New York totaled 105,932 bags during 1937, 38,234 of which were destined to New York and 67,698 bags were marked for re-export.

COST & FREIGHT, and SPOTS - All offerings are lower, Cost & Freight prices for Santos 4s are ioday from 6.10 to 6.70 but sales have been reported as low as 5.65c (for coffee of past crop, lightish color Victoria $7/8\ensuremath{^{\circ}} s$ sold yesterday at $3.99\ensuremath{^{\circ}} c$ cost & freight, and $4\ensuremath{\,\%} c$ spot. Colombians are slowly following the price reductions of Brazil growths, and Manizales Excelso is now offered at 8% c and Medellin Excelso at 9%/9%c, for prompt shipment, delivered ex-dock here. Stocks in this market are not large and slight premiums are paid for desirable lots. There is a good supply of Haiti coffees here at the moment, which is moving into consumption at a satisfactory rate, at prices ranging from 5% to 6%c, in Natural Robusta and West African coffees have been made here, on a basis of 414 to 4.90c C. & F. New York, the lower price applying to deferred shipments. Roasters seem to have once more adopted the policy of letting their supplies run down to a minimum. Invisible stocks must be very small.

Regarding the future, we have not changed our epinion. We consider that coffee prices prices are cheep enough to warrant purchases for a long pull. They are doubly interesting at this moment, when time honored ideas as to what is euphemistically called investors "securities" have largely become "insecurities". Now, as formerly, we admit that the necessary processess of readjustment which are under way, may force prices down further temporarily, but we also cannot forget that in the past we have often seen an article in an apparently hopeless situation, change as by magic, almost over night. A further decline of prices, although working more hardship on growers would, from the buyers' point of view. almost appear as an unprecedented opportunity -- the only thing to do then, would be to average down to lower levels. However, we are extremely skeptical about this, with so many uncertainties surrounding the present basis of currencies.

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LONDON FINANCIAL POSITION

LONDON, March 25, 1938.

The Prime Minister has defined the policy of Great Britain in regard to foreign politics, and to this extent the situation has been clarified. The speech was well received here, and was followed by an improvement in Stock Exchange securities. A point about present-day markets that should be realised is that quotations may fluctuate considerably as a result of quite a small amount of business. For the time being markets are unusually narrow, the result largely of the recent political tension. Ordinarily the dealers would not hesitate to quote a price for a thousand industrial ordinary shares, for example, but now they will only operate in 200 or 300 at a time. Frequently, too, they ask that any buyer should not press for delivery at the due date. This is because the dealers (or jobbers) have very little stock on their books, and they see few if any sellers, so that if they satisfied a buying order a long time might elapse before they could obtain the stock and thus complete the transaction.

From this it may be inferred that during the shump about the middle of March there was very little selling by real holders, the fall in prices being largely due to professional operations - bear selling or a precantionary marking down of quotations. All this means that movements in prices have much less significance now than they did in the past. Not infrequently we see "old" Consols change in price in one day by one per cent, but is is virtually certain that it is the result of transactions in quite moderate amounts of Stock. In some foreign government bonds the market is particularly narrow, only a small volume of buying or selling being enough to move prices several points. Thus on one day Czechoslovakia 8 per cent dropped 13 points, but on the next day it rallied about 8 points, the first movement having been due to a rumour of some incident on the frontier which was not confirmed. The narrowness of markets applies also to the foreign exchanges, where rates may fluctuate rather violently as a result of very little business,

A subsidence of the hoarding demand for gold is to be noted, and yesterday no premium over the American shipping parity was included in the London price. The amounts dealt in are now much smaller, and it would seem that a good deal of the new arrivals of the metal drifts to the U.S. A. The monetary situation here is unchanged. Lombard Street is discussing the advisability of an issue of short-dated bonds, bearing, say, 1 per cent interest. which would appeal particularly to the discount houses who are unable to satisfay their requirements in respect of such securities because of the market searchy, and they cannot get all the bills they want (even at a rate that is scarcely remunerative, having regard to the cost of bank loans) mainly because of the competition of "hot" money that is pressing for safe employment in London. If the discount houses were offered short-dated bonds of the kind indicated it is considered that they would get some compensation for the very long period during which bill vates have ruled at a level that gave little or no profit.

With respect to the trade situation here, it is considered that any major recession will be prevented by the acceleration of the rearmament programme now virtually certain, for this should help the general commercial movement of the country. Annual company reports are still showing up well, for increases in profits are the rule, and in many instances Ordinary dividends have been raised.

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SÃO PAULO

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The Mexican Eagle Oil affair has created an unpleasant impression, especially as it is thought that the unfavourable attitude of the Mexican Government may be extended to the mining industry in which a large amount of British capital is invested. Strong protests will be made, it is to be expected, by the Governments of U.S. A. and Great Britain, but it is difficult to see that they will have any effect.

Stock Exchange business is likely to continue quict for some time to come, for apart from the very important political factor there is a disposition to await the Budget on April 26, wish its indication of the probable expenditure upon defence in the coming fiscal year, the extent to which the money needed will be obtained by loans, and whether it will be necessary to increase the burden of taxonical.

This week's Stock Exchange pay day was surmounted without the disclosure of any difficulties, although the differences that had to be met were very heavy owing to the recent slump. Fortunately, the slump came when the open speculative position was very small, and because of this it is probable that the total of the monetary losses was not unduly large.

In the annual report of the Union Corporation (a leading South African mining and finance consenty) is is estimated that the total world stock of monetary gold at the end of last year was \$16.2 million ounces, against 778.8 million cances in 1936. Of this, the amount in Central banks and Treasuries is computed at 715.4 million, against 676.2 million ounces. Six of the great demogracies of the world hold more than 80 per cent of the gold in Central banks and treasuries, and, in addition, probably nearly all the gold in the exchange equalisation funds

LONDON PRODUCE NOTES

LONDON, March 25, 1938.

SUGAR. -- The firmness in the Sugar market noted in last report continued up to the end of last week, New York apparently construed the political events in Europe as decidedly bullish and short covering and new buying took place in the No. 4 world f.o.b. contract, The London market reflected the upward trend, while distributors of refined sorts supplemented their previous purchases, and it is estimated, covered their requirements for about three weeks. The lessening of the political tension at the beginning of this week completely reversed the trend of the market. There was good deal of liquidation in New York of purchases made during the previous day or two, and this brought prices back to their previous levels. In London the May position on the Terminal market fluctuated from 5/2 1/4d, to 5/5 to 5/1 to 5/1 1/2d the tone latterly being quiet but steady. Raw business was not large and after 5/4 1/2d, per cwt. cif has been paid for May shipment parcels were small sold down to 5 - per cwt, for affoat. It is understood that the United States have ratified the International Agreement; also that further renouncements of part of their quotas have been made by some countries, including Brazil, 30,000 tons, Germany 20,000 tons bringing that country's released up to 90,000 tons, while Peru renounces 25,000 tons. The free market quotas for the current season now amounts to 3,518,500 tons against the original amount of 3,611,000 metric tons. Exports to the free market during the five months ending Jan. amount to 1,024,053 leaving of 2,494,447 tons.

RUBBER. - The further depression in stocks and commodities in the United States brought about a sharp

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decline in rubber prices. At one time smoked sheet spot, was quoted no better that 6 1/8d, per lb. buyers, but there was a quick recovery to 6 5/16d. The poor support accorded to the market by American manufactureres leaves the London market to absorb most of the selling from the East, which however, was mostly by dealers for actual producers show no disposition to press sales. It is hoped that the action of the market during the past week will be given serious consideration by the International Regulation Committee when they meet on Tuesday. The present price is not renumerative to producers working on the present reduced output, but is seems that the only remedy would be a still further reduction in the export quotas so as to bring supplies more into line with requirements and to bring stocks down to more normal proportions.

COCOA. - Business on the cocoa futures market continues restricted. While substantial premiums can be obtained for near positions on the London market, such is not the case in New York. The Commission arrived in Accra on the 23rd of this month, and the inquiry officially opens tomorrow. Reports circulated that the hold-up was being continued owing to the weakness of the market. The heavy rains are accelerating the deterioration of the Cocoa, and it is estimated that of the total crop in storé, only about one quarter is first grade, about one half second/third grade and the balance of one quarter comprises sub-grades. The Department of Agriculture estimates that about 1000 tons were marketed during the first half of March.

TEA. - There was a very strong demand for all grades of tea at this week's auctions and prices marked an advance of farthing to three-farthings per lb. Demand at the coffee auctions again centred on the fine parcels and these made satisfactory rates but ordinary kinds were slow and as bids often did not reach sellers limits, withdrawals were frequent.

JUTE. - Raw jute prices declined about 6/3 per ton in sympathy with Calcutta but there was more activity at the decline. First Marks, sold latterly at £18.5.0. and Lightnings at £17.8.9 per ton, c.i.f.

TIMBER. - Forward business in softwoods is still very backward. The fact that the Russians, who apparently sold about 100,000 standards of their first schedule fairly well, have not made further headway, caused some surprise and has not improved the situation. The leading Swedish and Finnish shippers are exercising as much patience as the situation warrants and they are not altempting to force matters. One feature of outstanding interest is the steady flow of business in small parcels from South Finnish ports.
