THE case of the French mail packet Béarn, which was detained in this port a full week beyond her regular time on account of the inability of the government to decide whether or not to permit the landing of a large number of Turkish immigrants, is one which merits more attention than it has thus far received. We do not undertake to say whether the government should, or should not, receive immigrants of this class, but we do say that the authorities should decide every question of this character promptly and then adhere to it so that the steamship companies may not be subjected to unnecessary delays and expenses. We understand that many of these Turks brought money and merchandise with them, and that others came out to join relatives or were under labor contracts in this country. They are perhaps no worse than many others introduced from Italy and elsewhere, but, however this may be, if the authorities consider them undesirable then let the Brazilian consuls and the steamship agencies in Europe be advised that they will not in future be permitted to land. Waiting until their arrival and then refusing to permit their landing is sheer injustice, and if to this be added the delay of one week in the departure of a steamer carrying passengers, mails and freight, we have a case against the government of grave importance. And then, at the end of it all, the authorities are compelled to give way and the undesirable Turks are permitted to land! It is far from creditable to Brazil that so much weakness and indecision should be exhibited in matters like this. Add to this the continued assembling of impoverished immigrants in Rua D. Manoel, subjected to all the hardships and vices to which we have already called attention, and then the arrival of 180 others from São Paulo under the delusion that the government would send them back to Europe, and we have a state of affairs connected with the service of immigration which reflects very little credit on Brazil. Perhaps it will some day be admitted that the warnings given in these columns were not without cause.

Among ourselves the foreigner is, and we desire that he shall always remain so, a privileged guest, of whose liberty, security and rights we Brazilians of whose liberty, security and rights we Brazilians ought to be the principal guarantee and the strongest shield to defend him whenever he may be threatened or injured, be it by arbitrary and violent authority, be it by an excited or brutal individual, in the expression of his own native sentiment, of which there has been made, and is sought to make, a speculation which is at times political and at times simply mercantile.—O Paiz, 31st July.

If we are not mistaken our colleague of the Paiz is trying to take a position against the chauvinism which occasionally creeps into discussions of the rights of foreigners to express opinions in this country on questions of a political character. It is satisfactory to see Sr. Bocayuva taking upon himself this sensible view of the question, for it

is not so long ago that sentiments of a very different character were expressed in the columns of that journal. We may be permitted to state, however, that the rights and privileges which we have enjoyed thus far have not been materially jeopardized by the mistaken zeal of the Portuguese minister, nor are they likely to be secured to us more fully by the republican party, of which our colleague is the chosen leader. There may not be as prompt and just an execution of the laws as we could wish, the respect for contracts and agreements is not quite what we could desire, and there is at times more or less usurpation on the part of officialsbut in all this the native is quite as much a sufferer as the foreigner. We do not ask exemption from legal and uniform penalties where we break the laws of the country, nor do we ask for special privileges. In all this, however, there is an impression among us-perhaps an erroneous one-that all these rights and privileges will be better guaranteed under the present form of government than under the impending republic. We have really less to complain of here than have our friends in neighboring republics. The empire may not be very lively and ambitious, but it lets us alone in many respects where our nominally free neighbors are continually meddling. We are much obliged to the Paiz, however, for its kind intentions, but we trust we shall not be compelled to take shelter behind so uncertain an ægis. And, still further, we do not care to figure as "privileged guests." We are here by right, our money is invested here, enormous sums of capital belonging to our countrymen at home are invested in this country, and we consider it our duty and privilege to look after these matters in our own way and according to our own

PROVINCIAL NOTES

-A large number of counterfeit 20\$ and 200\$ treasury notes have made their appearance in Rio Grande

-The Amazonas provincial assembly appropriated 15,000\$ for the reception of the Conde d'Eu at Manáos.

—On the 31st ult. it was announced that the collector of revenue at Pirassununga, S. Paulo, had skipped, leaving his accounts 8,000\$ short.

Dr. Eduardo Ferreira and the Viscondessa de Embaré have given a house and land valued at 60,000\$ to the society for the protection of indigent children at Santos.

-A S. Paulo planter has recently been granted free transportation over the D. Pedro II railway for 20 animals for his stock farm at Franca. And still he is not satisfied!

-An item published here on the 31st ult. states that the Santos harbor improvement contractors had obtained permission to extend the quays to the S. Paulo railway wharf and to build a dock.

-A telegram published in the local press dated Maranhão on the 1st states that on the eve of his departure Conde d'Eu had an enthusiastic mani-festation from freedmen, and that an hour after the leaders of the manifestation were impressed for service in the navy.

-The Diario of Santos of the 31st ult. says that the gang of thieves which has been operating that the gang of thieves which has been operating so successfully for some time past in that city, has at last been discovered. Ten arrests have been made and others are implicated. The gang is principally composed of Italians.

-Thieves broke into the Carmo convent at São Paulo on the morning of the 30th ult. and carried Paulo on the morning of the 30th ult. and carried off a considerable booty in the shape of silver candlesticks, gold crowns and collars, precious stones, money from the alms boxes, etc. They appear to have had their own way in the place.

-The minister of agriculture has declined to —The minister of agriculture has declined to sanction the purchase of a piece of land by the president of Amazonas where Ceará immigrants are to be sheltered. The minister says the price is too high, besides which the state owns lands in the province suitable for the purpose in question.

-On the 2nd inst. the province of Ceará was granted another credit, this time for 1,000,000\$ for drought-stricken people. Ceará will pretty soon be covered over with government funds, at the expense of the rest of the empire. On the same day Pianhy gets 200,000\$, Rio Grande do Norte 500,000\$ and Parahyba 500,000\$ for the same purpose,

-It is a crying shame. The Aracajú corres-—It is a crying shame. The Aracaja correspondent of the Fornal do Commercia writing under date of the 16th ult, says the new president of Sergipe has occupied himself in taking bread out of the mouths of poor fathers of families. -Here is one for the benedicts! According to the Sul de S. Paulo, there is an old farmer living at Santa Quiteria, Minas Geraes, who is 150 years old and is still able to work and retains all his mental faculties. More than that, he is a bachelor. Few married men ever survive their hundreth

Coffee Notes

—The provincial taxes on coffee exports at Santos have been modified by the abolition of the 10% surtax on the provincial export duty of 4%, and the capatazins tax has been reduced to 40 reis and the capatazara tax has been reduced to 40 reis and 25%. Other products will pay 4% ad valorem and 1¼ reis per kilo.

-According to the report of the auditors of the —According to the report of the auditors of the "Commercio e Lavoura" (coffec-packing) company, the profits for the twelve months ending June 30th last permitted dividends of nearly 12 per cent. on the paid-up capital, "distinctly justifying not only the advantage of employing capital in this branch of trade, but also the judgment of the directors, managers and the candamental regime of the company."

-Messrs. Andrew Muir & Co. of this city have —Messrs. Andrew Muir & Co, of this city have commenced legal proceedings to recover from Sr. Antonio Ferreira Ramos Sobrinho, a partner of an important firm here, the sum of 7,271\$600, representing losses on coffee operations on the New York Exchange. The defendent is absent from Rio and has been given 60 days within which to plead. So far as we know this is the first case of the kind brought before Brazilian authorities and the result will be very interesting to those in the trade.

—For 22 vacant clerkships in the postoffice here, there were 168 candidates. There will be 146 republicans as a result.

-The "Sportive Centre" has fallen out with the Derby Club and will enter none of the horses belonging to its members at the club's races.

—The department of agriculture and Herr Watzl, the wine expert contracted to cover S. Paulo with vineyards, appear to have fallen out.

-The Jornal on the 31st ult, hears that Dr. José Carlos Rodrigues, at present in Europe in the employ of the department of agriculture, has been ordered to report here.

-The Emperor has selected Conselheiro Antonio Carneiro da Rocha as senator from the province of Bahia to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Barão de Cotegipe. The new senator is a liberal.
