It is evident that Rio is making very rapid strides in stock speculations, and that the time is not far distant when we shall have to reckon with crises of a very dangerous character. The feverish activity of our stock market is not a sign of healthy business growth, nor is it an indication that the country is going ahead. It simply means that local speculators are plunging recklessly into the methods which have enriched and ruined so many elsewhere. The experiences of Buenos Aires are soon to be those of Rio de Janeiro, the organization of innumerable companies for the mere purpose of supplying material for stock speculations, the use of fictitious credit to promote public and private interests, the multiplication of financial risks and responsibilities, the degradation of business methods, morals and principles, and in due time the ruin of hundreds who have deceived themselves by the sophism that speculation and business are one and the same thing. It may not be necessary to inform our readers abroad that the subscriptions for the new companies organizing here and the increase of capital among the old companies, are in great measure purely fictitious, as are the largely increased sales on the stock market. If immediate payment of these subscriptions were demanded, there is not money enough here to meet the requirement, and eventually it will be found that there is not business enough to pay a decent percentage on the investments. It is a new phase in the life of this market, and its development should be closely watched.

It looks very much as though the Conde d'En had executed a skillful flank movement against the republican forces in his brief speech at Pernambuco on the 19th inst. on the occasion of laying the cornerstone of the new law school building. After acknowledging the courteous receptions accorded him at Pernambuco and other places throughout the northern provinces, he took up some of the political questions now before the country and expressed himself as warmly in sympathy with all the progressive movements of the day. Regarding the continuance of monarchical institutions, and speaking in the name of the imperial family, he said that they "desired only the happiness and prosperity of the Brazilian people," and that when the people signified by their votes "that the monarchy is embarrassing the progress of Brazil, the imperial family will retire from the country." Nothing could be more frank and explicit. The Princess and her husband-we do not include the Emperor, for there is very little likelihood that he will be disturbed in his occupancy of the throne are not indifferent to the prosperity of the country, but it is evident from this Pernambuco declaration that they do not think the Brazilian crown worth fighting for. -16

there were great revenues and honors in volved, the enjoyment of dignities and influence similar to those accorded to European sovereigns, then there might be something to covet; but when it is considered that Brazil is neither rich nor powerful, that she is a badly organized monarchy surrounded by republics, that she has no brilliant court, no organized society, no resources within herself for the enjoyment of a refined leisure, and also that she has no immediate career before her which might tempt the ambition of a progressive sovereign, then it will be easily understood how the Princess Imperial and her husband are willing to retire from the country whenever the people desire them to do so. They understand as well as any one how weak are the attachments of political parties, and how uncertain the support of any class or party in face of a real danger. They have seen also how easily the old-line conservatives of the slave-holding class have turned republican through mere mercenary motives, and they are fully aware how futile would be the attempt to make a stand for monarchical institutions in a society where such extreme changes can occur. In our opinion, the Conde d'Eu has shown rare tact and statesmanship in taking the position indicated in his Pernambuco speech. The little air bubble of a conspiracy against the crown, which some young casé parliamentarians are whispering about, has been pretty effectually pricked. There will be no opposition to the will of the people, to whom the agitators are invited to go with their schemes. There need be no conspiracy, no bloodshed, no revolution, nothing theatrical; when the people want a change, all they have to do is to say so, and-presto ! it is done.

#### Provincial Notes

—A Pará exchange says that the Amazon Steam Navigation Co.'s surplus in 1888 amounted to 330,000\$.

—Campinas has gone crazy too. They have re-christened their Largo Municipal as "Praça da Imprensa Fluminense."

—The good people of Mogy-mirim, S. Paulo, ave inaugurated electric light and other improve-ents, but they still bury their dead in the nurches.

—Fresh beef is selling at 500 reis per kilo. in Pará, or at 12½ cents a pound. The province pays a subsidy besides to the company furnishing the beef at this rate.

—The sculptor Bernardelli, whose José Bonifacis monument was recently sold at the Santos custon house for 3,000\$ has made an agreement with the purchasers for the erection of the same over the remains of the "father of Brazilian independence."

—A Rio Grande paper relates that a diamond was recently found by a poor camarada in that province which is as large as a pigeon's egg. The lucky fellow has been offered 10,000 for the stone, but declines to part with it for less than 250,000\$\$.

—On the 19th the minister of agriculture recommends to the president of S. Paulo the employment of all efforts to place the immigrants who have been loading so long at the station in the capital, upon colonies where lots have been surreyed.

—The people of Juiz de Fora, Minas Geraes had, according to the telegrams, a splendid time or the 22nd when the electric light was inaugurated A distinguished landscape painter was wounded by a dynamic bomb; the thieves broke into the church, etc. Nothing was lacking.

—A telegram to the Gazeta de Noticias says that on the 19th the image of Our Lady of Apparecida had been taken to Guaratinguetá, where small-jow has re-appeared. Both towns are in S. Paulo; the telegram does not say whether the image was vac-cinated, but the presumption is that it was.

—On the night of the 18th inst, some playful lunatics in Campos, who appear to have a grudge against the drainage company, tried to inutilize a street syphon, but succeeded only in spoiling a valve. The idiots did not understand apparently that the people would suffer more than the company, had their purpose succeeded.

—The São Paulo Athletic Club announces a meeting at the Dulley *chacara* on September 7th for athletic games and races. There are to be 18 contests in all, which for the most part are similar to the Rio programme printed elsewhere. For hilarious purposes there will be an "obstacle race," "egg and spoon race," and "wheelbarrow race." The São Paulo meetings are always highly enjoyable events. events.

—A revolt among the immigrants on the "Cabras" estate in the municipality of Campinas, Sāv Faulo, took place on the 17th inst. A police force of 30 men was sent to suppress the disorder. A conflict ensued, which resulted in the killing of one and the wounding of three Italians, and in the wounding of eight others of the attacking party. The difficulty originated in fines imposed on the colonists.

—The province of Amazonas is paying the following steamship subsidies: 36,000\$ to the Amazonas Co. for the line from Pará to Manáos, 120,000\$ to the same for the Rios Negro, Purús and Madeira service, 22,000\$ to the same for the Rio Juruá service, 72,000\$ for the service from Manáos to Liverpool, 48,000\$ for the service from Manáos to New York [Booth line], \$4,000\$ to the Manáos company [national] and \$4,000\$ to the Companhia Brazileira [Manáos to Rio]; total 466,000\$.

—There is small-pox enough in Rio Claro, São Paulo, to induce the editor of the Commercio to suspend publication. That may not, however, in-dicate a very serious epidemic.

—It appears that the poor blacks who were driven off the "Capella Velha" plantation at Guarchy, São Paulo, by a military force, being shot like outlaws and having their houses and crops destroyed, had been settled on the lands for fifty years. They were industrious and peaceable, and were engaged in growing small food products. It is said that the soldiers shot them down while trying to escape, and that two children were burned to death. The more we hear of this barbarous act, the more cruel and disgrace all it appears.

—If the local press is correctly informed the officers of the Chilian ironclad Almirante Cochrane are going to have a high old time here, soirées and canquets till you can't rest!

On the 17th quarantine was ordered by the Brazilian authorities against arrivals from the Philippine Islands. So many vessels arrive from these islands that quarantine is necessary.

—All the garrison of Rio and the cadets at the military school are to be re-vaccinated, by order of the minister of war. The order is caused by the appearance of some cases of small-pox in this city.

The organizers can readily secure a secular management which is in every respect the most suitable in such an institution.

—A cricket match between local players and an eleven from the British naval vessels in port was played on the 20th, the latter winning. Score 70 to 71.

—Among the arrivals on the 25th inst. per the American steamer Finance was the new United States consul-general at this port, Mr. Oliver H. Dockery, and his consular clerk, Mr. C. C. Pool, both of North Carolina.

—The minister of agriculture has informed the Sociedade de Immigração that a large part of the settlers that left the Blumenau colony have alread returned from the River Plate. The minister ha further authorized the furnishing of passages to Italian immigrants from Montevideo, who ma have relatives in Brazil.

—It is said that the Turkish immigrant arrivals here are for account of two or three Hospicio dealers in cheap-jack notions, the Turks making good peddlers for such wares. If this is true, the government should call upon them for contributions to pay the honeward passages of these undesirable immigrants.

—The Italian government having put a stop to the wholesale recruiting of colonists for Brazil in Italy, Messrs. A. Fiorita & Co. Lave amounced that they are obliged to suspend their contract for the transportation of these poor people to this country. And perhaps the contractors are not sorry to find so good an excuse either.

—The Jornal do Commercio of yesterday states that the trenty between Brazil and Argentina regarding the Missiones boundary will soon be signed, and that it designates President Harrson of the United States as arbitrator. The two commissions are to leave at once to complete the surveys of the territory in dispute.

—The Jornal do Commercio hears that the committee of bankers charged with organizing the clearing-house here have drawn up various projects and will shortly meet to arrive at a definite arrangement.

—On the 21st, the Minas Geraes provincial loan for 7,000,000\$ gold at 95 per cent., interest 5 and sinking fund 1 per cent., was finally given to a syndicate of Portuguese bankers represented here by the Banco Internacional.

—Subscription lists for shares in a cotton mill at Ouro Preto, Minas Gernes, to be known as the "Companhia Industrial do Rio Preto," were open-ed at the Banco da Industria Nacional in this city on the 21st. The proposed capital is 200,000\$\frac{1}{200}\$ shares

The Banco Internacional announced on the 20th that it would receive subscriptions for the 6 per cent. Ioan raised in Portugal for the Petropolitana mill here. The lists were closed on the 23rd. The debentures are for 90% fortes each and par was asked.
