According to article 2 of decree 733, published on the 12th instant, "the government reserves to itself the right to deduct from guaranteed interest due to those com panies not having made the deposits required of them, the amount of the proportion fixed for expenses of fiscalization." It would be interesting to know where the government gets its right to do this, or where it finds its gets its right to do this, or where it finds its authority. Has the executive power any right whatever to promulgate decrees which overthrow or modify laws and contracts? Or has the legislative power the right to annul a contract formally celebrated between the state and private individual, to the prejudice of the latter? Or, to put it differently, is not the government, in all its branches, bound to respect and uphold all laws and contracts just as much as any private citizen. Where is the justice of compelling the indi-Where is the justice of compelling the individual to observe and carry out every clause and condition of a government contract, when the government itself is at liberty to modify or annul at pleasure? The government can not and dare not defend such a government can be a properties. monstrous injustice, and yet it is calmly trying to enforce that principle just as though it had every principle of law and morality on its side. It would be interesting to know how many contracts are broken by this article 2 of decree 733. In one, to which our attention has been called, the concession distinctly states: "as despeasa que se fizerem durante o prazo da fança (guarantee) correrão por conta do Estado." existence and as long as justice endures,
these expenses can not be foisted upon the
company. If there were an independent
judiciary in Brazil, with a supreme court
like that of the United States, then these
executive aggressions would very soon be
set aside, but unhappily there is no such
recourse. In respect to the foreign companies concerned, who may have specific
exemptions from these charges in their contracts, we trust they will resist the imposition
and call upon their own governments to
assist them. In so doing they will not only
be defending their own rights, but they will
be rendering an incalculably valuable service to Brazil. The permanency of republican institutions in this country demand
constant and vigorous resistance to all such constant and vigorous resistance to all such aggressions as these. The people must have their rights respected as well as their liberties, but it will never be done until they unite to resist these violations of law and contract by the executive.

Our attention has been called to Our attention has been called to an occurrence here which may possibly lead to serious injury to the commerce of this port. A short time ago a vessel arrived here with a cargo of four, some of which had been damaged. It has long been the custom in this port to rate stains on the barrel as "light damage" on which a discount of \$500 is allowed, the contents being in selitivity are refered condition. 2\$000 is allowed, the contents being in reality in perfect condition. In case, however, of sea-water damage, in which the contents of the barrel are slightly injured, the damage is assessed as 'heavy' and a discount of 4\$000 is allowed, although only a few pounds of the flour may be "caked" by the water. The survey of the cargo in question showed about a thousand barrels light and about three hundred (we do not use the exact numbers) heavy dam-

age. The company importing the flour being very generally unpopular in the city, some unknown person denounced the cargo to the health board as damaged, although some five or six thousand barrels were in perfect condition. The cargo was at once embargoed, and, by a singular coincidence embargoed, and, by a singular coincidence, the dealers at the very same time put up their prices. A sanitary commission, which knows flour quite as well as it knows Sanscrit, went to examine the cargo, and in its report condemned the 300 barrels damaged by sea-water, but asked for a custom-house commission to examine the 1,000 barrels, as it could not decide. The custom-house commission was appointed and reported that the 1,000 barrels could be sold according to the custom of the port, and added that the 300 barrels of heavy damage was good enough for making sea biscuit. The board of health, however, refused to accept this recommendation and condemned the whole 1,300 barrels, but granted permission this recommendation and condemned the whole 1,300 barrels, but granted permission for its exportation. This loss therefore falls upon the underwriters, who find themselves the victims of an arbitrary order from which there is no appeal and which is against the usual practice of the port. They find also that a new risk has been forced upon them—that of denunciation by unknown and irresponsible parties who may wish to corner, or control, the flour market wish to corner, or control, the flour marke wish to corner, or control, the flour market by obstructing or preventing the dispatch of arriving cargoes. Everyone knows the power of the empenho, and how easy it will be for unscrupulous speculators to govern the action of the sanitary authorities. Under these conditions, the underwriters may decide *not* to insure any more cargoes of flour for this port, and as neither the millers nor the merchants will care to take miliers nor the merchanis will care to take the risks on their own account, we may soon find the flour trade seriously embarrassed. The sanitary authorities should not forget that all such arbitrary acts will sooner or later make their evil consequences felt in the country which permits them. Just and fair dealing is a basis on which all men and all nations can meet and when a recole all nations can meet, and when a people get outside of that the evil will in good time rest upon their own shoulders.

The deposition of the governor of Ceará last week by the students of the military school at Fortaleza, the row which has arisen over the attempt to depose the governor of Amazonas, in which several military and naval officers have openly declared themselves against the course pursued by the government, and the news received from Matto Grosso of the forcible deposition of the governor of that state, are all in har-mony with the false and vicious doctrine advanced by the Floriano party that the state governments are so closely allied with the central government that the resignation of the President of the republic must be accompanied by the dissolution of the state governments also. In some states this absurd idea has been carried so far as to include the dissolution of the legislature, the suspension of the state constitution and the suspension of the state constitution and even the deposition of all the petty municipal governments. A more absurd idea never could have been conceived, and as long as it endures a federal republic will be an utter impossibility in this country. It is idle to argue that the deposed governors all supported Gen. Deodoro, for they had nothing whatever to do with the matter. In a federal republic the two governments should be kept distinct, and the states should let the political eats of the national should let the political acts of the national executive severely alone. Adhesions in such matters are gross absurdities, fully as absurd and mischievous as these depositions, In the matter of these continued state revolutions, the national government ought to have foreseen that no political advantage is to be secured which can in even the slightest degree compensate for the disorder, false precedent and loss of credit which must ensue. It will be impossible to restore confidence in the country just as long as these things occur. No capital will come into a country where a revolution is to be expected every three months, and where every new government feels itself at liberty to annul everything its predecessor had done. Such a state of things shows that anarchy has usurped the place of order, petty intrigue that of law, and violence that of legal action. There can be no security for life and property in such a country, no confidence in the stability of any contract or law, no credit either for the state or individual. An orderly, progressive vidual. An orderly, progressive govern-ment under such conditions is an absolute impossibility, and the sooner the men res-

ponsible for the present situation understand this, the better. There is no patriotism stand this, the better. There is no patriotism in these petty intrigues, and there are no other results than debt and disorder. The military must let political affairs alone and stop its ignorant, selfash meddling with civil institutions, and the people must make up their minds to entrust their affairs to men of character, responsibility and experience. Until this is done, we shall have nothing better than the anarchy which is now rapidly ruining the country. ly ruining the country

SÃO PAULO RAILWAY.

São Paulo, February 18th, 1802

To the Editor of THE RO NEWS:

SIR,—In your publication of the 16th inst. one of your leading articles was devoted to calling attention to the sanitary state of santos, and in it allusions were made to the São Paulo railway which it is necessary perhaps to c-rrect for those of your readers who are not dwellers in that city, and are therefore not acquainted with the occurrences alluded to in your article above named, but who may nevertheless be interested from one reason or other in what toases there.

First, allow me then to say that your informant has not fairly stated the case.

In regard to the special trains to enable business men to sleep in S. Paulo, when suggested, the proposal was readily agreed to, but with previous experience to guide in such matters, and in order to know how many daily travellers were likely to avail themselves of such a convenience the proposer undertook to ascertain the number which he at the moment estimated to be from fifty to sixty that could be considered certain.

Some three weeks passed during which time nothing more was heard of the subject. Great fifty ster made and the matter thoroughly canvassed amongst the business men with the result that at the end of that period, I am told, insteem versons were found willing to go to São Paulo, with the difference that then five persons were prepared to do the daily jumely if the railway would grant special accommodation.

From the above it will be seen that neither in the present nor in the post has there been a great number of people willing to escape the risks of sleeping in Santos.

Could the São Paulo railway do more than express its readiness to give the accommodation if there were travellers forthcoming?

Taking it for granted that the whole nineteen were prepared to go to São Paulo daily, would that warrant any railway company in running ances in the reading and the work of the reading would grant special rains had not the few business men desiring to Saleep in São Paulo ally exantos at 5 p. n., and the mornine express arrivin

fares reasonably look for such accommodation, which can only be granted in detriment to the other train service? I think you will agree that they can not.

Such a train in a modified form is now running for a few days as an experiment, on the assurance that many more beyond the nineteen persons already named will certainly now travel. The result will of course show.

One does not like to believe that your informant is one of the so-called nineteen daily travellers, who may wish to visit São Paulo twice a week in a cheap, quick and commodious way at the expense of the convenience of the majority.

But with the utmost desire to do what everyone feels it necessary to do for the relief of the suffering inhabitants of Santos, the São Paulo railway could have done much to relieve, I think you ought in fairness to be ready to accept the evidence of those who were specially appointed to report upon this matter. The commission appointed by the commercial body of the state of São Paulo visited Santos; its report has been widely circulated through the public press and certainly there is not to be found in it own word that attaches blame to the São Paulo railway, neither is there in it any suggestion which could be immediately acted upon.

The persons composing the commission were competent men whose experience has extended beyond Brazil and who were capable of doing justice to the subject they undertook.

The São Paulo railway can therefore refer to that report as a proof to the contary of what you say you have maintained, though of course no one desires to question your great authority or that of your informant upon such matters, but there may chance to be some why we wall in preference accept the statement of re-possible local men, to the irresponsible declarations of others who may not have given the matter their special attention and looked at all sides of the question.

By the foregoing remarks endeavor has been made to state succinctly the case for the São Paulo railway, and I hope that sufficient proof has been add

dent wilfully misled you when stating that this company had refused to do anything towards establishing a quicker train service; indeed, were further testimony needed in support of this it would be found in your first article giving the public notice that such a train was to be run, seeing that such information must have had its origin in something tangible and been received from some presumably reliable source.

As to the "block" in Santos I hand you the printed report of the commission above referred to, and this company's remarks on its two suggestions, as their publication in the newspapers may have escaped your observation, and as I feel you desire to do justice to the cause to which you have so freely opened your valuable space.

THE PORT OF VALPARAISO.

The following statistics will furnish an idea of the importance of Valparaiso as a scaport, and also of the loss of trade sustained by the port during the late civil war. In 1891 there landed 14,633 passengers, against 21,044 in 1890, or a decrease of 6,441 as compared with 1890. The number of passengers who left in 1891 was 12,929, or a falling off, as compared with 1890, or 3,868. The arrivals in 1891 exceeded the departures by 1,704. The shipping returns give the following figures: Arrivals in 1891, 1050 versels of 1,204,445 tons in 1890. The departures in 1891 were 1,022 vessels of 940,955 tons, as compared with 1,270 vessels of 1,203,077 tons in 1890. These returns afford a pretty true indication of the importance of Valparaisos as seaport, and it will hardly be credited abroad that a port which is frequented by 35,000 passengers, and 2,000,000 tons of shipping a year possesses only one passenger pier, and that scarcely worthy of a fishing village. Is there nobody here capable of submitting to the government a plan for a floating pier, or a pier of some kind, from which passengers could step into or out of a boat or a tender without running the risk of breaking their limbs or of losing their lives? There is kardly a port on the coast of any importance which cannot boast of better landing accommodation than Valparaiso, jeter. There is some talk of the government intending to provide letter accommodation, but if the againtion we have started on the subject is allowed to subside there is a possibility that the government's intention will end in talk and nothing more.

In dealing with the interesting birth statistics which we publish in another column to-day, it seems to us that the director general of the civil registry has overlooked the most important deduction of all, namely the fact that 68.8 per cent, or more than two-third of on the side of one or both of their parents, the number of children born of Oriental parents being only 31.2 per cent, or less than one-third.

Unfortunately, the statistics before us are only for the year 1890, and we have not those of any previous years to refer to, but we have no reason to suppose that the proportion is exceptional or has varied substantially for many years.

These figures prove beyond all question the assertion, made by us on more than one previous occasion, that the present so called Oriental nationality is an unstable quantity which is fast changing its character. Indeed we could hardly expect otherwise when we remember that for at least ten years the population of the republic has owed as much to increase to immigration as to births, and that if the republic is ever allowed the development which it deserves, the rate of immigration will increase to eight or ten times what it ever has been yet.

In fact it is no exaggeration to say—nor do we mean any offence in saying it—that Oriental autionality is at present little more than a legend, for of two-thirds or less of the population who can claim birth on Oriental territory, there is a very small proportion indeed who can go back two generations without finding foreign shoot, that is to say, very few indeed who can go back two generations without finding foreign alood, that is to say, very few indeed who can go back two say, very few indeed who can go back two one or both sides.

Practically speaking, then, Oriental blood is a small and rapidly diminishing factor in the present population of the country. The present mixture, in which European blood (though fully 85 per cent from Latin races, that is to say tralians, Spanish and French, in the order named) predominates, will go on, perhaps, for two or three generations, varying as the rate of immigration varies and according to the more or less rapid development of the country. —A Montevideo telegram of the 17th says that advices from Ladario confirm the news of a revolt at Corumbá, and that the revolutionists are moving on Cuyabá.

—On the 15th a police force, and on the 16th a detachment of 50 soldiers of the 31st battalion left Curo Preto for Viçosa, where the municipal council had been deposed.

—A Porto Alegre telegram of the 15th says that at Caçapava a band of partisans of Julio de Castilhos was defeated with the loss of some of their number, including their leader Astrogildo Costa.

—A telegram of the 16th from Ceará states that the federal troops have been withdrawn from the capital to Maranguape and that a collision between the governor's partisans and his enemies was hourly expected. The collision took place that evening, the students of the military school attacking the governor's partisans and strillery. After 13 hours' firing the governor surrendered, having lost 13 men killed and many wounded. The students lost one killed and a few wounded. The palace was left in ruins. The state government was turned over to Col. Bezzeril.

—At the request of the minister of Chili the

—At the request of the minister of Chili the governor of Rio de Janeiro has reinstated the two police officers who had been dismissed for insulting that minister. They can now try the game on another diplomat.

—A cavalry lieutenant, Manoel Joaquim Machado, left for Santa Catharina on the 17th to assume the provisional administration of that state. There'll be a chance for the sergeants and corporals a little later on.

—On the 18th inst. Gen. Clarindo de Queiroz, the deposed governor of Ceará, took passage on the steamer Espirito Sante for this city. He is accompanied by Councillor Rodrigues, Junr., Dr. Samuel and several of his relatives.

—At S. Luiz, Rio Grande do Sul, a body of Julio de Castilho's partisans under Gen. Francisco de Lima, Senator Pinheiro Machado and Col. Apparicio dispersed on the approach of a detachment of the governor's troops and took refuge in

-There were 182 deaths in Pará during the north of January.

—The governor of Rio Grande do Sul hes issued orders for disbanding the volunteers.

-The gubernatorial election in Alagóas appears to have resulted in the choice of Dr. Gabino Be

—The January exports of rubber at Pará amounted to 1,802,331 kilogrammes, of which 820,252 came from the state of Amazonas and 28,438 from Perú.

—It seems to be decided in Bahia that ex-Sen-ator Saraiva will be the candidate of all parties for the governorship in the election to be held on March 20th.

-A telegram from Pernambuco on the 21st says that the people in great part kept away from the polls in the election of that day. This is called a victory for the boys who "won't play."

—There was a serious row at Vicosa, Minas, last week, and the chief of police of that state went to the scene of disturbance with 100 soldiers. When he arrived there he found nothing but pease and hominy.

—The receipts of the S. Paulo post office last year, from all sources, amounted to 275,3358533 in the capital and 554,2338790 in the agencies throughout the state, making a total of 829,5695-623. The total in 1890 was 682,2648683.

—The contractor of the Ypiranga lottery monument in S. Paulo has brought a suit for the payments due him for work done up to the present. It is stated that the unfinished monument is threatened with sale at auction for raising money to meet these payments.

—On the 15th the Nictheroy police arrested a quack called Juca Breves. His office was full of patients at the time and many of them ran away, but the police arrested 74. They also arrested a doctor who receives 20% for lending his name two days in the week to the quack.

—Dr. Rodolpho Faria telegraphs from Ouro Preto that he is now willing to accept the gover-norship of Minas do Sul, which he had at first declined, and that he counts on the protection of Gens. Campos Salles and Glycerio. In case of war will these two generals take the field?

—The minister of justice has received a telegram from Col. Luiz Benedicto, dated the 12th inst, informing him that the sender of the telegram is supported by a majority of the people, of Matto Gosso who rejoice to see right and justice restored, that he has triumphed over the revolt and that peace reigns supreme at Cuyabá.

—According to news received from Corumbá the revolutionary expedition reached Cuyabá on the 1st inst. and deposed Gov. Murtinho, appointing a junta composed of Cols. Marques Fortes, Benedicto and Major Annibal da Matta. Consequently Matto Grosso now has one appointed governor, two elected governors and one revolutionary junta. Is it possible that Matto Grosso requires so much governing?

—On the 18th the court of appeals at Porto Alegre, Rio Grande, granted a writs of habear corpus in favor of Judge Salustiano Orlando. It was proceeding to activo no the applications made by Cols. João Pinto and Carvalho, when the spectators began to hiss and the court adjourned. A number of persons then called on the governor asking him to abolish the court, which he accordingly did. It would be interesting to know if this is the independence of the courts which the constitution refers to.

tution refers to.

—On January 30th the public prosecutor at Pará formally denounced the directors of the Companhia Mercantil for fraudulent transactions in connection with the management of that company. He charges that they obtained money under false pretensions and that they committed various frauds through the medium of clandestine transactions. The company was organized to control the rubber trade, and at one time secured a bonus on all exports from the state government which, had it not been suppressed in obedience to the protests of foreign houses, would have made it master of the situation.

#### RAILROAD NOTES

-At some of the stations on the Rio Claro railway there is said to be still coffee that was de-ivered there for shipment in November.

—At Santos on the 16th 350 laborers began work on the English railway for the purpose of repairing the damage caused by the rioters.

—We learn through a private letter that a fast express was started between Santos and São Paulo on the 19th, as an experiment. We are confident that it would be of incalculable henefit to Santos business men if they would make use of it. Why not try our sungestion as to a boarding-house at some convenient point on the terra section?

THE directors of the Royal Mail Company have had under their consideration the case of the men of the Movelle, the steamer which was wrecked some time ago of Colon. Their pay stopped immediately on the vessel striking, and all of them lost the whole of their sea-going kit, and had to encounter dire hardships before reaching Colon. The directors have determined, in view of the conduct of the men, to give them half-pay from the time the vessel struck until the men were landed at Southampton. This decision, which affects over a hundred men, has been received with the greatest satisfaction at Southampton.—Liverpool Journal of Commerce, January 25th.

—The S. Paulo branch of the British Bank of South America, Ld., was opened for business on Wednesday last.

-Executive Decree No. 733A, of the 12th inst., approves the alterations made in the statutes of the Banco da Republica.

—The January receipts of the Pará custom-house amounted to 634,579\$755, while the state recebedoria took in 756,388\$731.

In January the customs receipts at Ceará were 188,126\$741 against 136,414\$679 in the corresponding month of 1891. -The customs receipts in January at Victoria were 37,263\$992, against 74,264\$857 in the cor-responding month of 1891.

—The custom-house receipts in Sergipe amounted last month to 22,957\$490, against 24,602\$237 in January, 1891.

—The postoffice receipts last year in the state of S. Paulo were \$29,569\$623 against 682,264\$683 in 1890 and 601,902\$910 in 1889.

—The receipts of the Maranhão custom-house in December, 1891, were 140,270\$651, against 170,132\$198 in December, 1890.

—In January the public revenue receipts in the state of Alagoas amounted to 50.476\$847 against 75,830\$901 in the corresponding month of 1891.

--In S. João da Boa Vista, S. Paulo, the mer-chants are issuing shin-plasters of 100, 200, 300, 400 and 500 reis for the purpose of making change.

—In December Desterro shipped to other ports of Brazil products officially valued at 77,690\$780. The trade in farinha de mandioca represents over half of this sum.

-The new board of directors of the Banco da Republica took charge of that institution on the 17th, the Visconde de Guahy being elevated to the presidency of the bank.

—The official value of the exports from Espirito Santo last year was 12,779,786\$\$49, of which coffee figured at 12,374,446\$400. The state export duties amounted to 579,166,\$836.

—Advices from the interior state that business has become almost impossible because of the uncertainty connected with the validity of the currency. It is generally known that the various notes of the issue banks have been called in, but no one seems to be able to state just what they are, consequently the country people hesitate to accept aughting.
