#### Business Notices

Companhia Industrial de Seda e Ramie.—
It was Dr. Francisco Portella, governor of the state of Rio de Janeiro, who, seeking to endow his state with diversified productions, conceled favors for the establishment of the culture of ramie and the use of its fibres in the manufacture of rope, pc king and sewing-thread. This concession was granted in January, 1890. Fulfilling the terms of its contract, the company acquired 3,000 hectares of land at Belém, a station on the Estrata de Ferro Central, where, besides lands suitable for such culture, there exists a natural hydraulic motor force superior to 150 horse-power.

The first employment of the company was the selection of varieties most productive, and the choice fell on the ramie verde (Buchmaria Luncissiana) as having decided advantages over all others. This variety was very fare, and with difficulty and much labor there is to-day under cultivation an area of about 25 hectares and there are thousands of shoots for reproduction which, two years ago, were entirely wanting.

The development of the stalks is enormous, and there are fields in which their growth reaches three and four meters. The production is abundant, and three cuts a year are regularly made.

The company expects from Europe two Faure machines which in a trial last September gave the best results in decoritation, judged even then very deficient.

Ramie is a dicotyledonous plant of the nettle Companhia Industrial de Seda e Ramie.

machines which in a trial last September gave the dest results in decortication, judged even then very deficient.

It is a dicotyledonous plant of the nettle family, having its origin in the islands of the Indian Ocean, where it develops with much beauty. Its fibres are used for manufacture of woven fabrics, cords and similar products which are superior to those made of lax and hemp. Fishing-nets made of ramie are far better than those made of any other textile, not only for remachy but for unlimited duration of the threads of which they are composed. The ramie is a hardy plant, of deep roots, producing abundant stems of 1.5 to 3 meters high. The nature of the plant and its roots indicate that rich fresh soil, without being lumid but deeply cultivated, ought to be preferred. In grounds well prepared, the crop of green stems reaches 35,000 kilos per cut, or too to 120 tons per year and for every hectare, yielding a large profit to the grower. The life of the plant in Brazil is 30 years. The fibres produced by the grower are delivered to the manufacturing industry which bleaches them by the action of steam, bicarbonate of soda, chlorily them to combing, carding and other mechanical processes, they are eventually transformed into labries of the greatest beauty and durability. Ramie enters into the preparation of products of considerable value, competing with wool and silk, and for white underwear there is no textile that equals it.

Besides the unlimited market of Europe, the factories of textile fabrics already established here and those to be equipped for this new manufacture will consume enormous quantities of this precious textile. In addition to the culture of ramie, the company has established in the municipio of Itaguahy, the culture of the mulberry tree and the silk-worm (benikir-mori), having now more than 4,000 mulberry trees in full growth. There is a vast establishment for raising cocoons, to which belong houses and dependencies for all the help.

Besides the mulberry trees which exist there, not only new shoots from Italy have been added, but also ecocons of the best variety of silk-worms. The vegetation of the mulberry tree in Brazil is so luxuriant that from six to eight crops of ecocons are obtained annually. While in Europe costly nurseries are necessary, in Brazil excellent trees are rapidly obtained by transplanting shoots. The average crops of ecocons give a kilo to 1.5 kilos for every mulberry tree of eight years of age.

THE elections which have recently taken place in this city and in various states show an apathy and indifference on the part of the people which augurs ill for the future of Brazil. The stability and prosperity of a republic depends directly upon the active and intelligent interest which its citizens Brazil. and inteligent interest which its cluzens take in its affairs, and in no other place is this interest better shown than in elections. If the better classes of citizens refuse to perform their civic duties, the government is sure to fall into mercenary hands and evil is sure to follow. In the United States this has inveitable beam the result in civies. this has invariably been the result in cities where the best citizens have kept away from the polls. In the senatorial election which took place in this capital on the 20th, only one out of seven registered voters went to the polls, and the result was the election of a man who is capable of doing incalculable a man who is capable of doing incalculable mischief. It is a serious mistake for the better classes to thus surrender their country and its administration into untrustworthy and inexperienced hands. Prosperity will never return until the government is first purged of these elements. And to secure this every man who possesses a vote must make the fullest and best use of it possible. No matter if official influence and pressure is used in favor of unprincipled candidates is used in layor of unprincipled candidates; no matter if trickery and corruption defeat his efforts; if good government is ever to be secured, he must keep up the struggle. Refusing to vote because the government is using all its influence and power against his ticket, is cowardly and unpatriotic. It should be remembered that the best element in parliamentary government is an active and courageous minority; it can do more to prevent mischievous legislation and to deprevent mischievous legislation and to de-teat corruption than all other agencies com-bined. We sincerely trust therefore that the opposition leaders in Brazil will sus-pend their suicidal counsel to their follow-ers to keep away from the polls, and will use every effort henceforth to secure a good and courageous minority in Congress. To do this they must organize a national party do this they must organize a national party and their followers must vote on everoccasion.

Although every effort to secure better service on the Central railway have thus far been fruitless, we consider it a duty to continue making reclamations to the end. How far the merchants of this city and the How far the merchants of this city and the trade of this port have been prejudiced by the bad management of this railway, no one can compute, but surely no one will undertake to deny that the losses have been enormous and the discredit incalculable. Not only has the road failed to carry away the merchandise offered for interior destinations, to the loss of both shipper and consignee, but it has permitted enormous thefts and irregularities in its service, it has refused to be held responsible for the loss of merchandise through the neglect and dishonesty of its own employés, it has held back enormous quantities of machinery and distincesty of its own employes, it has acid
back enormous quantities of machinery and
material for up-country railways and industrial enterprises, and it has continued to
occupy a considerable part of the lighters
of this port with material and merchandise
of its own, to the serious prejudice of commerce and the discredit of the port. There
is not a compensial nation in the world merce and the discredit of the port. There is not a commercial nation in the world which would have permitted such an abuse of power. Add to this the tricks and oppressive requirements to which the ships

consigned to this railway have been comconsigned to this railway have been compelled to submit, and we have enough to make the name of this great railway a synonym for trickery, inefficiency and dishonesty the whole world over. In a short time it will be almost impossible to find a shipowner who will accept a charter-party for this railway, or for the government to which it belongs. Already, as we are informed, the boards of trade and shipping associations in various parts of the world are beginning to take cognizance of the state of affairs in the ports of Rio de are beginning to take cognizance of the state of affairs in the ports of Rio de Janeiro and Santos, and it will not be long before we begin to feel the effects of the disgraceful incapacity and dishonesty which is arming the whole shipping world against us. It is idle to say that we can get along without them, for we cannot. The "boy-cott" of these two ports by shipowners would cause incalculable misery and loss to the country—and all this merely for the sake of keeping a lot of incapable and dishonest officials in positions of responsibility and trust. It is quite time for the government to consider the results of so mistaken a policy. a policy.

The terrible experiences of the season just closing show how necessary it is season just closing show how necessary it is for us to have a properly equipped hospital in this city, and now that all the preliminary steps have been taken and the principal expenses met, it will be a serious mistake to let the undertaking fail for the want of a little more money. CIGARETTE SMOKING.

The late Sir Morell Mackenzie strongly objected to the cigarette. He says that this form of smoking is "the worst form of indulgence, from the fact that the very mildness of its action tempts people to smoke nearly all day long, and by inhaling the fames into their langs saturate their blood with the poisson. It should be borne in mind that there are two bad qualities contained in the fames of tobacco. One is postsonous nicotine, the other the high temperature of the burning tobacco. Most people, however, can smoke in moderation without injury; to many tobacco acts as a useful mere sedaitive; but, on the other hand, an excessive indulgence in the habit is always injurious."

To anyone who finds total abstincere from tobacco too heroic a stretch of virtue, Sir Morell said: "Let him smoke only after a substantial meal. Let him smoke only after a substantial meal. Let him smoke a mild Havanna or a long-stemmed pape charged with some cool-smoking tobacco. If the charms of the cigarette are irresistible, let it be smoked through a mouthpiece which is kept clean with ultra-Mahommedan strictness. Let him refrain from smoking pipe, cigar, or cigarette to the bitter and, it may be added, rank and oly end."

Although by this decision the property of the shareholders in the Geral becomes reduced to almost zero, the debentures which were sold on the 21st at about 3\$500 jumped to 6\$500!

—The minister of the interior has authorized the Intendencia Municipal to purchase a painting, by Amelio Figueiredo, representing the execution of Triadentes, which will be placed in one of the rooms of the city hall. The price is not mentioned.

—Art. 114 of the "newest" constitution of the state of Rio de Janeiro declares that no elector can be arrested 30 days before, nor 30 days after, an election, save in Jagrante delico. This is the gryest old constitution we ever heard of. Nietheroy will soon be a paradise for thieves and cutthreats.

—The government has authorized the expro-priation of the stable of Count de Herzberg on Rua Visconde do Rio Branco, for the purpose of erecting there a monument to Tiradentes.

—It is hinted that Gen. Rny Barbosa, by his 65 page habeas corpus pamphlet, knocked all the bottom out of the grand annesty scheme. Little men with big heads are always top-heavy, somehow.

—The Union Sportsmen's Bank appealed to the Junta Commercial to make the Banco União pay over funds deposited; the Junta Commercial replied that this is somebody else's funeral, not theirs.

—It is stated that Barão de Aguiar de Andrade will be sent on a special mission to the United States. His mission is supposed to refer to the reciprocity treaty and to the boundary question with Argentina.

—It is said that the government has permitted the Companhia Agricola de Campos to relinquish guarantee of interest on the capital employed in the Ayrizes central sugar mill and to modify the Barcellos mill.

-Dr. Francisco Portella, late governor of the state of Rio de Janeiro, one of the parties implicated in the sedition, presented himself to the minister of justice on the 22nd, and was sent to Fort S. João.

On the 22nd a number of workmen of the Companhia Construcções Urbanas went to the 4th police delegate and asked him to obtain from the company the payment of their wages. They threatened to strike if they are not paid.

—Congratulations and adhesions still continue to come in from the provinces, in spite of the ex-perience of last November. It is simply disheart-ening to think what the consequences would be were the Deodoro faction to win the next trick.

—The Pair publishes the report that the government intends to issue on the 13th prox. a decree granting annesty to the political prisoners confined in the forts in this harbor and banished to the state of Auazonas. If it does, it will deserve to be overthrown next time.

overtirrown next under the telegrams recently published here, the state of Matto Grosso has assumed great prominence in London circles. As the Brazilians themselves know little of this wilderness, what can London know about it? The Argentine finger is clearly in this Matto Grosso pie.

—We are glad to say that the death-rate from yellow-fever continues to steadily decrease, the deaths on the 23rd being only 6. Should the rains and cool wenther continue we shall soon see the last of what has been one of the worst epidemics experienced in this city for many years.

The Banco Emissor da Bahia has obtained per-ussion to deposit in the treasury 2,000 government ands as a basis for the issue of paper money.

—The receipts of the Para custom-house in February were 764,7568052, of which the sum of 197,2018311 were derived from the additional import duties. The Amazonas are being investigated by the solice authorities. It is desired to know where the noney paid in has gone to.

—The police investigation into the affairs of the Companhia Geral is still going on. The records of neetings were discovered a few days ago and have added new interest to the proceedings.

Thirty-seven concessions for colonies of im-migrants, representing 160,000 families and calling for 6,685,000 hectares of public lands, have been declared lapsed, the grantees failing to meet the provisions of the law.

—What has the Companhia de Lavanderias a Vapor done with all the money which it has re-ceived? It strikes us that 500,000%, more or less, ought to be sufficient to start a first-class laundry, even allowing something for the directors.

—The Treasury wants the Banco de Credito Popular to pay \$\int\_2\$.012 or. 5d. for notes furnished by the American Bank Note Company. But how can the bank pay 40,000\$, unless the Treasury permits it to put the new money into circulation?

—Questions are again being raised as to the notes of certain hanks of emission, to the great inconvenience of the public. The government should take steps at once to settle all these doubts so that one may know what notes are good, and what are not current.

On the 21st the Jonal do Commercio is informed that the committee appointed to investigate the 4-assistance to national industry problem, have reported that they can specify what is needed, but think another commission should be appointed to determine which companies deserve assistance.
