RAILROAD NOTES

The minister of agriculture has authorized experiments with the Saurdin brakes on the Central railway.
The legislature of Minas Geraes has repealed the law authorizing the president of that state to guarantee 6% interest on \$9,000,000 to be employed in building railways.
A jury in Uberaba has for the second time acquitted Augusto Silva, formerly station-master there, from an accusation of having appropriated \$7,203,877 of the Mogiana company's funds.

COFFEE NOTES

The American government has decided that coffee actually shipped in a Venezuelan port prior to March 15th, although the vessel may not have sailed for some time thereafter, is entitled to free entry in the United States.
Out of eight samples of so-called coffees, collected at retail groceries in Montreal, not one was genuine, though they are all called "choice coffee."

LOCAL NOTES

In honor of Carnival the postoffice closes to-day at one o'clock.
Our June Carnival is considered a decided failure. It has attracted very little interest.
The Havas agency says that there were 45 deaths from influenza in Buenos Aires on the 14th.
The New York Herald has printed a South American bureau at No. 47 Calle Prati, Valparaiso.

Ecuador has just elected D. Luis Cordero to the presidency. If a revolution does not follow, then we shall be agreeably surprised.
The Comate says that on the 13th inst. Col. Baptista, commander of the Niterrohy police regiment, called at Itamaraty palace and informed the President that some of the officers of his regiment had plotted to depose him from his command.

The Diario Oficial of the 17th inst. denies the report that Minister Anão de Faria had tendered his resignation, but had consented to withdraw it on the government's agreeing to interfere on behalf of his political interests in the state of Rio Grande do Sul.
At 11.30 p.m., on the 13th inst. two men were attacked on Rua das Laranjeiras by a band of footpads who demanded their money.

A Lima telegram of the 15th announces the inauguration of the new hospital edifice in that city which was constructed for the Italian hospital. We recommend this item of information to the attention of the Mercicoria authorities, who are apparently opposed to hospitals for foreigners in this capital.
A Montevideo telegram of the 18th says that according to dispatches from Assunção, Admiral Firmino Chaves had resolved to leave that place for Matto Grosso on the 20th.

It is a pleasure to note that the commanding general of the national guard has taken steps to prevent disorders on the part of his soldiers. As the civil laws of the country are inoperative in such cases, it is highly satisfactory to see that measures are to be taken to restrain the men under his command.
On the 13th inst., between the navy yard and the Ilha das Cobras, an accident occurred to a boat containing two boatmen, a hydrophobia patient and his nurse; the latter and one of the boatmen fell into the bay and being drowned.

When the political prisoner Gen. Antonio Maria Coelho was arrested in April he was quite ill. As he grew worse in confinement, he was allowed to return to his house. A few days ago, however, he was removed to the arsenal, although, as he said, he has not yet recovered. The opposition papers severely censure the government for this.

A regard for the few molar teeth that remain to us prevents our advising Col. Sampaio Feroz, of the Dentists' battalion, to stick to his tooth-drawing and leave finances alone. If that aid to industries bill becomes a law, as reported by the ferocious colonel, we may see paper money sold by weight, as is already virtually in practice in the River Plate.

Is it not a little singular that a bill should be presented in Congress offering a large premium for the discovery of a cure for leprosy, just after it has been announced that such a cure had been found? It looks like a second thought on the part of the reputed discoverer. If such rewards are to be offered, then why not include beriberi and yellow fever?

An attempted murder and suicide at 67 Rua da Imperatriz on the 18th was the result of jealousy. A Spaniard named Montserrat stabbed his mistress because she had left him, and then tried to kill himself. Both were badly injured; the man has since died and the girl is in a critical state. We see the steadily drifting into the state of affairs which distinguishes the cities of the River Plate.

Quite a sensation has been caused by the refusal of the bishop to comply with the request of the irrepressible Col. Malvino and other officers of the national guard to bless one of their banners. The bishop says that the present flag of the country is merely the banner of a sect. Pope Lenon, however, asserts that the only thing about the flag that is positivist is the motto "Order and Progress."

On the 16th the local press announced that the representative, or agent, of the Empresa de Obras Publicas at Santos had committed suicide, because of a small deficiency in the accounts. The man was entirely too sensitive; when the higher representatives of this same Empresa have brought upon Rio a condition of affairs that may end in bankruptcy, a slight defalcation is venial.

It is a lamentable fact that the men who have been and are now entrusted with the duty of preserving order and protecting property in this city, are the ones from whom we have the most to fear. In a majority of cases the murders, assaults, robberies and disturbances occurring are due to the military or police. In view of this it is not time for a thorough reform in the police force, and for the removal of the military forces to camps outside of the city?

Sr. Diogo Duarte Silva, who, as manager of the Bank of Brazil for many years, was well known and highly esteemed by the business community of Rio de Janeiro, died on the morning of the 18th inst. at the advanced age of 73 years. As a proof of consideration for the late banker, on the 18th the brokers held no bolsa, the banks half-closed their doors, and many business houses did the same. Although not, perhaps, irreparable, the death of Sr. Diogo will be a serious loss to the Bank of Brazil.

The petition to Congress by workmen against obligatory service in the national guard represents but one phase of the feeling. The workmen complain that they are compelled to suffer loss and annoyance through this service, which is quite true. In addition to this, the employers also suffer quite as much, for their employees are taken away, as in April last, without a moment's notice, and for an length time. We have an experience of this, and it was sufficiently annoying to one of our members to resolve not to employ henceforth any member of the national guard in any responsible service.

The provador of the Santa Casa da Misericórdia has addressed a representation to the minister of interior against the establishment of a hospital on the hill overlooking Rua da Passagem by English and American residents of this city, alleging that it is a menace to the healthfulness of various public and charitable institutions in that vicinity. The minister has referred the papers to the inspector-general of hygiene. As the license to establish a hospital on this site was given because of its complete isolation, it is difficult to see how the reasons given for this representation can be seriously considered. If this project is unsuitable, then there is not a site in Rio de Janeiro on which a hospital can be built.

Deputy Aristides Lobo writes to the Diario Popular of S. Paulo that he is filled with the most gloomy forebodings. He has been informed, he says, by good authority, that if the banished political prisoners are amnestied they will return, not in the humble and repentant mood in which Aristides would like to see them, but overflowing with an insupportable rancor, gall and bitterness. Aristides thinks that before this dangerous man reach here, Congress should place the frail and delicate institutions of the country under shelter, and nothing in his opinion will accomplish this better than the passing of a good bill for increasing the efficiency of martial law. Why not enact that Anstides shall take the country under his sheltering wing?

It would be interesting to know if the Misericórdia authorities have obeyed the orders of the general sewerage system of the city. All the drainage of this great hospital, inhabited by at least 1,500 people on an average, has been discharged into the bay alongside of the war arsenal, which is also a populous place and has a boys' military training school. This disposition of so much hospital sewage has long been considered extremely dangerous to the health of the neighborhood, but every effort and every order for its correction have proved unavailing. Now that the Misericórdia authorities have become solicitous for the health of the city, it would be pleasing news to hear that they have begun the good work at home.

One of the most noisome and dangerous establishments in the suburb of Botafogo is the wash-house of the Misericórdia hospital, where an enormous quantity of soiled clothes is cleaned by the rules of methods. According to the theory held by the provador of that institution, it is a pell to a number of public and charitable institutions. The military school is only a half mile distant, while the lunatic asylum, the Sr. João Baptista hospital and the orphan girls' asylum are not more than a quarter of a mile distant. The mountains of dirty linen taken there on the rivers of dirty, infected water coming from the place, not only create a nuisance, but are a source of deadly peril to the aforesaid public institutions and the neighborhood. We beg to call the attention of the minister of interior to the matter and to suggest that the Misericórdia wash-house be removed to Jacaré-pouca.

Shipping and Commercial List, New-York, May 18th.

Consular Invoices. We have been asked, "Of what use is the authentication of invoices of importations into the United States? American consuls are required to certify to the accuracy of invoices before the merchandise is shipped, and if of value is this service to the government or to the importers?"

The consular regulations relating to the authentication of invoices were prescribed by the president in 1858, and subsequently revised by the Treasury Department, with the view of furnishing information to appraisers and other customs officers in the United States relative to the classification of goods at the place of export before shipment. Invoices that bear a consular stamp are supposed to present a correct statement of facts, for which the merchant is held in strict regulation, but the documents are not rendered any more acceptable here by the official seal being attached, according to the treatment they receive upon their arrival. All merchandise is appraised irrespective of the seal of the consular and consular authentication, but should any invoice not bear the marks of examination and approval, it is promptly rejected and the goods put under general orders. The Treasury regulations must be obeyed while they are in force, although acknowledged to be of little use in determining values. As the system is costly, annoying, and a mere matter of form, it would be well for the Treasury Department to take the question under consideration, and if no necessity exists for the present requirements, to have them abolished or suggest another plan which would give better satisfaction. Considerable complaint has been made about the delay occasioned by the rush of business at the various consular departments, of the trouble experienced in getting proper service, and of the great expense attached to the present system. The fact that very little importance is attached to consular certificates by customs officials in the United States is evidence that the system has outgrown its usefulness, and that a necessity exists for a general pruning of the dead wood from the regulations.
