The partisan intrigues in Rio Grande do Sul between Julio de Castilhos, the deposed governor of the Deodoro regime, and the friends of the present administration, have at last reached a critical stage, out of which an armed conflict will be difficult to avoid. The situation at the present moment is highly critical, not only because of the disputed governorship, but principally because the Castilhos faction, partisans of the Deodoro government, is now uppermost in the state capital. It appears that the intrigues of ex-governor Julio de Castilho had reached such a point some weeks ago, that the Floriano administration, composed of Barrete Leite and Barros Cassal, was compelled to resign. THE REVOLUTION IN MATTO GROSSO.

A subscriber has favoured us with the following interesting setract from a letter from an English lady—perhaps the only one—living in Cuyalak, in the house of the expovermor, Dr. M. J. Muttinho, II is dated Cuyabá, April 7.—

".... The until is just in, but there is nothing from you. I trust you are all well. Cuyabá is in a learful state of revolt. For some days the false governor has taken relage in the arsenal, surrounded by the nullitary, for fear that Sr. Ponce may enter the city and drive him ont. Sr. Ponce with Dr. Firmo de Mattos, have got together more than 1,200 men well armed, about six miles away. They have only been waiting for the mail to arrive m order to assist General Ewhank and Dr. Murtinho, but as the latter have not come, I should not be surprised if they made an attacks soon. For any part I shall be content if they do so, for really it is quite miserable living in this state. Many of Dr. Murtinho's party have fled from the town, as the 'soldiers were sent to the different houses, threatening the lives of the immates, or imprisonment. Every man, or I may say, every boy of 15, is forced to become a soldier. Our man servant has not been able to go home for a week, as the streets are watched night and day, and the soldiers even enter the trams and make prisoners of the men. Another thing, the town will soon be on favnine allowance, as the troops outside lay hold of all they can in the way of eatile, tice, etc., and the governor of the town has ordered all that enters to be seized and to be taken to the arsenal. Sra. Murtinho and in a stock of provisions a few days ago, owing to Dr. Gama's noivee that she should do so. Almost all the families here have moved from their houses, and either left the town for different farmhouses, or else taken soldren the laftmar and were stopped at Coinbra. They have returned on Assonion, telegraphing to Rio for assistance and may in favour of Dr. Murtinho, and the familia here is no provision

Sr. Galvão and family are here, having fled from Corumbá, i fare they have "jumped out of the frying pan into the fire."

They wish to leave Matto Grosso entirely when they can do so with safety, for all business is at a standstill and will remain for some time. As soon as it is twileight, all the doors and windows are made fast; the town being left to the care of women and children, the men residing in the arsenal during the night to protect the valliant (2) governor. The heat continues, which does not add to our comfort, and the mosquitos are nearly as sanguinary as the military. The mail-large were opened at Corumbá, and the letters opened as well, but in a revolution one can expect nothing better."

REVOLUTION IN RIO GRANDE.

REVOLUTION IN RIO GRANDE.

On the 16th inst, we were advised through a private telegram received here from Porto Alegre that an insurrection was imminent in that city, and that the secession of Rio Grande was one of its purposes. This of course referred to the intrigues carried on by the deposed governor of the Deodoro receive, Dr. Julio de Castilhos, who has stubbornly refused to accept the results of the November revolution in that state. His party, which includes Gen. Frota, Col. Flores, the Maciels and other prominent men of Rio Grande, calls itself the "unitia republicana," while the other party is known under various titles, such as "federatista," "gasparista," etc., and comprises such names as those of Visconde de Pelotas, Silveira Martins, Gen. Silva Tavares, Barros Cassal, and others,
On the 17th the cosp occurred, but owing to the customary interference with the telegraph lines only one paper in Rio de Jameiro had information of it. Everyone knew that something had happened, but just what it was no one could conjecture. On the 19th some of the particulars were known, and on the 20th the Parz published the following telegram (dated the 18th and retained at Porto Alegre) which gives the fullest details we have thus far seen.

The general having withdrawn, by force of circumstances, diverse pickets of police marked up in front of the office of the Ficheratia, where were assembled Dr. Julio de Castilhos, Gen. Frota, Col. Thomaz Flores and many armed citizens. There, the aforesaid force to the number of 150 men having been drawn up in line, the above-mentioned citizens came out and all weat to the governor's palace, whose guard surrendered, its commander, Easign José Francisco da Costa Picitas, being captured.

Having entered the palace, the government was at once installed of Dr. Julio de Castilhos, who immediately made his appearance at one of the windows and made a speech in regard to the victory of the União Republicana, concluding with the declaration that he had resigned the office of president of the state and had nominated vice-president Dr. Victorino Monteiro. This citizen then spoke and said he desired that his administration should win the public esteem by its spirit of good will, fraternity and magnanimity.

The Visconde de Pelotas, who is in this capital, has received the following telegram from Bage, dated yesterday:

"In virtue of your telegram of to-day and official letter of the 14th inst, advissing my nominaminity at oue at the same time the office of government, I beg to inform you that I have this date assumed the functions of the office of governer in this city.—General Sithe Tirearex."

The sub-treasury, post-office, telegraph and custom-house have been since yesterday, on the occurrence of these recent incidents, occupied by federal forces.

The government fiscal yesterday prohibited our sending any telegrams on these events during the first hours of to-day.

General Taxares had established his capital at Bagé, and was collecting forces to maintain his authority. It was reported there that the revolution had succeeded everywhere except in Bagé, against which a force under General Isidro would march. It was also said that large forces of political refugees on the Uruguayan frontier would join the Castilhos narty.

WORRYING THE ARGENTINE PHAR-MACISTS.

MACSTS.

In one of the Intervals between its troubles with creditors and pronunciamento promoters, the government of the Argentine republic has foun I time to issue regulations describing the manner in which wounded persons who are brought to a pharmacy for first aid shall be dealt with, the object being, apparently, to secure uniformity of treatment prior to the removal of the case to a hospital. Fresh wounds must be washed with a 4-per-cent, solution of boracia ead, or a ½-per-cent, solution of salicylic acid. Hemorrhage must be treated with moist wadding or by compression of the arteries, the edges of wounds joined by small strips of plaster, which do not cover the wound. Suppurating wounds are to be covered "half a millimetre thick" with a layer of iodoform, covered with wadding and tied round with gauze. Wounds caused by burning are to be covered with wadding soabed in lime-liminent. No pharmacist will be allowed to practise any modes of treatment other than those prescribed in the order. Carbolic acid, corrosive sublimate, sessiculchoride of iron, linen landayes. Re., are especially prohibited, and after rendering first aid to the person injured the pharmacist unist at once hand him over to the care of a medical man. From the minuteness of the directions, of which we have only given an outline here, it would appear either that the Argentine pharmacists are a class of fools, which we refuse to believe, or that the object of the government is simply to pester them with a show of pedantic solicitude for the public, which seems a far more likely explanation.—London Chemistand Druggist. I EGISLATIVE NOTES

LEGISLATIVE NOTES

JUNE 11.—The committees on the constitution and legislation reported a substitute bill for those introduced by Senators Virgilio Damasio and Amaro Cavalcanti regulating the declaration of martial law. Chamber of Deputies.—A petition of the S. Paulo Railway Co., asking for permission to build another track or a narrow guage line was referred to the committee on public works. Deputy Caetano de Albuquerque called attention to affairs in Matto Grosso, and moved that the President of the republic be asked to furnish information on the subject and to adopt measures for putting an end to the said, that the republic would be a government of peace and harmony; but unfortunately this has not been the case. In Matto Grosso outrages are daily committed that are not only incompatible with the fraternity that was promised, but even with the ordinary instincts of humanity. Deputy Bellarmino de Mendong introduced a bill, signed by himself and others, graning amnesty to all who took part in the arracel movements in Ceará on Feb. 16 and 17. He also moved to inquire whether the national guard has been called out and, if so, for what reason. There was read a petition from a workingmen's organization memoralizing Congress on the loss and annoyance caused to the laboring classes by obligatory service in the national guard.

JUNE 3.3.—Senate.—Senator Rangel Pestana spoke against the bill granting the assistant inspector of customs, Hasschman, the honors of the post of captain in the navy, and Senator Virgilio Damasio spoke in its favor. Chamber of Deputies.—A message was received from the President asking for an extraordinary appropriation of 618,575\$-515 for enlarging and improving the police barracks. There was also received a message from the President remitting the decree on consular invoices for Congress to take action thereon. Deputy Epitacio Pessoa spoke in regard to the student Rodrigues Fortes, belonging to the fatalhão Academico, who was left a prisoner at Park. Deputy Friança Carvalho, in defending the r

-Robberies of ships in the port of Rosario are said to be of frequent occurrence.

-The enrolment of national guards in the city f Buenos Aires numbers about 26,000 men. of B

—The Uruguayan finance minister, Dr. Ramirez, has succeeded in getting the President to accept his resignation.

—The paper money men in Uruguay have begun to agitate in favor of new issues for the improvement of the situation.

—A telegram says there were 34 deaths from influenza in Buenos Aires on the 17th and that there are 30,000 cases in the city.

—Although impoverished and practically bank-rupt the Uruguayan Congress has voted \$600 to enable a man to carry on experiments with a flying machine.

—A Montevideo telegram of the 18th says that a report is current to the effect that the government will order the coinage of \$2,000,000 in silver to be put into circulation at once.

—In Rosario it requires a municipal licens before a merchant can hang out a signboard. The amount of liberty which the Argentine citizer enjoys is simply oppressive.

—The director of *La Razon*, of Rosario, sent up some rockets on June 1st, to advise the public of bulletins issued from the office of that paper. He was promptly arrested, and had to pay a fine.

—The Uruguay News of the 5th says that the British correcte Striut, which recently arrived at Montevideo to take the place of the Cleopatra, will soon go to Rio and then up the ceast as far esparie.

-The schoolmasters in the province of Santa Fe have recently been paid up to August, 1891, and they were glad to get even that. Ten months arrears on the salaries of teachers is not a particu-larly good record, especially where so much cash is found for executive salaries, parasites and jobs.

—Two youths desiring to settle some personal dispute between themselves repaired on Wednesday evening to the Caté San Martin, where both drev revolvers, with the result that one lies in gaol accused of causing the death of the other who was shot in the chest. —Argentine News, Rosario, June 4th.

—The President of Uruguay, it is stated, will soon issue a message calling upon the people to exercise the severest economy in view of the financial crisis in that country. He denies the reports that more paper money will be issued, and says that the obligations of the nation will be faithfully met.

—The Standard seems to have stirred up a hornet's nest in Buenos Aires by its uncomplimentary references to the mother country as "the old milch cow" and to Europe in general as "enfeebled and anemic." Some of its readers actually propose to "boycott" the paper for such discourteous remarks.

-Municipal elections were held in the state of Fio de Janeiro on the 16th inst. These elections appear to have been free from official pressu e, and in .ome localities opposition candidates were elected. An unusually large number of voters weat to the polls.

—It appears that Dr. Ubaldino do Amaral has been elected in the state of Paran to succeed him-self in the national Senate. It would be interesting to know why these men resign. Elections are not pienies, and in unsettled times as now they are not without danger.

—The official count of the recent gubernatorial election in the state of São Paulo shows that Dr. Bernardino de Campos received 31,120 votes, Dr. Ezequiel Ramos 20, and others a still smaller number each. Evidently two parties cannot exist in the Brazilian republic.

—The Espirito Santo legislature passed on the 18th a bill authorizing loans for the railway recently decreed by the governor (who gave us the impression that he intended to build it from revenues instead of loans), and another granting a subsidy of 12,000 for river navigation.

In Bahia on the night of the 16th, there was a serious fight between policemen and a band of disorderly persons who had intrenched themselves in a house. The latter at first repulsed the police, who afterwards returned in larger force and captered 19 of the rioters. One policeman was killed and several wounded, and some of the rioters were also wounded.

—We hear that Her Majosty's consul at Bahia, Mr. E. Nicolini, gave a very enjoyable little dinner at Bahia on the Queen's birthday last month. These little courtes's not only serve to strengthen the friendly relations between a consul and his fellow-countrymen, but they go far to keep alive the feeling of love and devotion for the old country. It is to be regretted that these social opportunities do not occur elsewhere and oftener.

—The action of the governor of Pernambuco in postponing the congressional elections to September 20th, has aroused much adverse criticism on the part of the "historical republicans." On the 18th a vote of "want of confidence" was passed in the senate, after a bitter denunciation by Martins Junior, with but one opposing vote. Great excitement prevailed in the city. This same governor was welcomed with acclamations of delight, fireworks and brass bands only a few weeks ago, and is probably now reflecting on the surprising changeableness of political favor in republics.

RAILROAD NOTES

-The minister of agriculture has authorized ex-riments with the Saudrin brakes on the Central perimen railway.

—The legislature of Minas Geraes has repealed the law authorizing the president of that state to guarantee 6% interest on 50,000,000\$ to be employed in building railways.

— A jury in Uberala has for the second time acquitted Augusto Silva, formerly station-master there, from an accusation of having appropriated 27,203\$477 of the Mogyana company's funds. The jury was influenced by reclints of the prisoner's previous good conduct and efficiency. In future it may be necessary for companies to employ bad characters if they wish to have them held responsible for criminal acts.

—The president of S. Paulo has signed the bill for building a railway from the port of S. Sebastião to the boundary of Minas Geraes. The law provides for guanateeing interest at the rate of 6% per annum on the capital invested in the road, not exceeding 30,000% per kilbmeter. It also grants other favors, including exemption from taxation and a subsidy of 20,000% per kilbmeter, for the line between S. Sebastião and the top of the canst range of mountains. The government will expend 60,000% in surveys and, when these are completed, will call for tenders for building the road.

Coffee Notes

—The American government has decided that coffee actually shipped in a Venezuelan port prior to March 15th, although the vessel may not have sailed for some time thereafter, is entitled to free entry in the United States.

—Out of eight samples of so-called coffees, col-lected at retail groceries in Montreal, not one was genuine, though they are all called "choice coffee," but contained roasted peas, beans and maize. One maker, name unknown, puts husks and corn-starch into his coffee. Out of twelve samples collected in Hamilton and Toronto, only two were pure coffee, the others containing flour and other farinaceous matter.—Monetary Times, Toronto.

-Why should gold be worth 306% in Buenos Aires and only about 270% in Rio? Perhaps Quintino will let us know?

—The Jornal says that Vice-President Floriano is urging forward the proposed police reorganization in this city. There is certainly need of it.

—Conde Sebastião Pinho failed to obtain the writ of habeas corpus for which he had applied. He has now appealed to the Supreme Court.

—President Baptista of Bolivia announces his purpose to build railways and confer other inestim-able blessings on his country—just to keep it quiet.

—Corpus Christi was a decidedly nervous day, and it was a mercy that there was no business doing. There were all sorts of peculiar rumors afloat.

New York telegrams of the 15th announce another battle in Venezuela, in which the revolutionists were victorious. It is reported that Dictator Palacios has fled.

—It is announced that Gen. José Simeão, chief of the Chicago Commission, will leave for Europe on the Pacific steamer Entlannia on the 23rd, en route for the United States.

—The ex-director of the house of correction, Belarmino Braziliense Pessoa de Mello, who was turned out of his place by the Fonseca family, has been placed on the retired list.

—According to advices from Montevideo no fur-ther vestiges of the Nolimões have appeared. It is now believed that the Russian vessel with rescued Brazilian sailors on board, is a myth.

—A Valparaiso telegram of the 18th reports a destructive fire in that city on the Delicias avenue, which occasioned a loss of about \$\frac{1}{2}\pi_0,000. The Salvador asylum was completely destroyed.

—According to a Buenos Aires telegram of the 17th, the Brazilian squadron sent to suppress the Matto Grosso revolution, composed of the Bahta, Cariena and Incolomy, had arrived at Asuncion, Paragnay.

—The government is sedulously engaged in appointing officers for the national guard. Nearly every day the Diario Official publishes a long list of officers appointed. It reminds us of the palmy days of the monarchy.

—The marine arsenal laborors have appealed to the Jornal do Commercio against the orders of the major of the 7th battalion of national guards that they shall report for drill. They state that they are exempt from this service.

—A Caracas telegram of the 18th announces the resignation of President Raimundo Anduezo Palacios. The successes of the revolutionists have convinced him that it has always been his desire to sacrifice himself for his country's welfare.

—Ecuador has just elected D. Luiz Cordero to the presidency. If a revolution does not follow, then we shall be agreeably surprised.

The Combate says that on the 13th inst. Col. Baptita, commander of the Nictheroy police regiment, called at Itamaraty palace and informed the President that some of the officers of his regiment had plutted to depose him from his command.

—The Diario Official of the 17th inst. Command.
—The Diario Official of the 17th inst. Comies the report that Minister Antão de Faria had tendered his resignation, but had consented to withdraw it on the government's agreeing to interfere on behalf of his political interests in the state of Rio Grande do Su.

—At 11.30 p.m. on the 13th inst, two men were attacked on Rua das Larangeiras by a band of footpads who demanded their money. They resisted and succeeded in arresting two of the robbers, one of whom proved to be a man that had been expelled from the police brigade.

—A Lina telegram of the 15th announces the inauguration of the new hospital edifice in that city which was constructed for the Italian hospital. We recommend this item of information to the attention of the Misericordia authorities, who are apparently opposed to hospitals for foreigners in this capital.

—A Montevideo telegram of the 18th says that according to dispatches from Asuncion, Admiral Firmino Chaves had resolved to leave that place for Matto Grosso on the 20th. In all probability we shall soon be hearing war news from that part of the world; that is, if the telegrams are not fiscalized.

It is a pleasure to note that the commanding general of the national guard has taken steps to prevent disorders on the part of his soldiers. As the civil laws of the country are inoperative in such access, it is highly satisfactory to see that measures are to be taken to restrain the men under his command.

—On the 13th mst., between the may yard and the Illa das Cobras, an accident occurred to a boat containing two boatmen, a hydrophobia patient and his nurse, the latter and one of the boatmen falling into the hay and being drowned. It is states that the accident was caused by a struggle between the boatman and nurse, who, it is said, was intoxicated.

—When the political prisoner Gen. Antonio Maria Coelho was arrested in April he was quite ill. As he grew worse in confinement, he was allowed to return to his house. A few days ago, however, he was removed to the arsenal, although, it is said, he has not yet recovered. The opposition papers severely censure the government for this.

—A regard for the few molars that remain to us prevents our advising Col. Sampaio Feroz, of the Dentists' battalion, to stick to his tooth-drawing and leave finances alone. If that aid to industries bill becomes a law, as reported by the ferocious colonel, we may see paper money sold by weight, as is already virtually in practice in the River Plate.

—Is it not a little singular that a bill should be presented in Congress offering a large premium for the discovery of a cure for leprowe, just after it has been amounted that such a cure had been found? It looks like a second thought on the part of the reputed discoverer. If such rewards are to be offered, then why not include beri-beri and yellow fever?

—An attempted murder and suicide at 67 Rua da Imperatriz on the 18th was the result of jealousy. A Spaniard named Montserare stabled his mis-tress because she had left him, and then tried to kill himself. Both were badly injured; the man has since died and the juri is in a critical state. —On the 16th the local press amounced that the representative, or agent, of the Empreza de Obras Publicas at Sautos had committed suicide, because of a small deficiency in the accounts. The man was entirely too sensitive; when the higher representatives of this same Empreza have brought upon Rio a condition of affairs that may end in bank-ruptcy, a slight defalcation is venial.

—It is a lamentable fact that the men who have been and are now entrusted with the duty of preserving order and protecting properly in this city, are the ones from whom we have the most to fear. In a majority of cases the murders, assaults, robberies and disturbances occurring are due to the military or police. In view of this is it not time for a thorough reform in the police force, and for the removal of the military forces to camps outside of the city?

—Sr. Diogo Duarte Silva, who, as manager of the Bank of Brazil for many years, was well known and highly esteemed by the business community of Rio de Jamero, died on the morning of the 18th inst. at the advanced age of 73 years. As a proof of consideration for the late banker, on the 18th the brokers held no bolas, the banks half-closed their doors, and many business houses did the same. Although not, perhaps, irreparable, the death of Sr. Diogo will be a serious loss to the Bank of Brazil.

—The petition to Congress by workingmen against obligatory service in the national guard represents but one phase of the evil. The working-men complain that they are compelled to suffer loss and annoyance through this service, which is quite true. In addition to this, the employers also suffer quite as much, for their employers are taken away, as in April last, without a moment's notice, and for any length of time. We had an experience of this, and it was sufficiently annoying to occasion the resolve not to employ henceforth any member of the national guard in any responsible service.

The providor of the Santa Casa da Misericordia has addressed a representation to the minister of interior against the establishment of a hospital on the hill overlooking Run da Passagem by English and American residents of this city, alleging that it will perjudice the healthfulness of various public and chairtable institutions in that vicinity. The minister has referred the papers to the inspector, general of bygiene. As the license to establish a hospital on this site was given because of its complete isolation, it is difficult to see how the reasons given for this representation can be seriously considered. If this property is unsuitable, then there is not a site in Rto de Janeiro on which a hospital can be built.

We beg to call the attention of the minister of interior to the matter and to suggest that the Misericordia wash-house he removed to Jacaré-pagaá.
