The direct mails are discovered to transfers on this co-volvich largely increase the risks of loss. As postal authorities in the United States are are tomed to hold the mails for direct steamers, the on lopes should be distinctly marked with England.

The situation in Rio Grande is simply beyond all comprehension. The so-called beyond all comprehension. The so-called government victory at Inhanduhy is still a mystery, and no official reports are forth-coming. The combat at Ibicuhy on the 12th, although claimed as a victory by both sides, is left unexplained. Since then several skirmishes have occurred near D. Pedrito where the federalists claim to have won a signal victory at Panela Venta have won a signal victory at Ponche-Verde over the forces under General Telles, en-trapping and routing his vanguard which lost tag killed trapping and routing his vanguard which lost 140 killed, 90 prisoners, 200 horses and two pieces of artillery, besides arms and munitions. This telegram was received on the 18th. This victory has of course been denied by the Castilhistas at Porto Alarga, but it is known that larga numbers Alegre, but it is known that large numbers of wounded men have arrived at Livramento and that some sharp fighting has lately occurred. As the Castilhistas are not claiming victories, a safe conclusion is that they have suffered a reverse. A telegram published here this morning says that Gumersindo Saraiva attacked a government force near Bagé on the 17th and captured 1,500 horses. A private telegram to the chief editor of the Paiz from Senator Pinheiro Machado one of the Cavillian. chief editor of the Paiz from Senator Pri-nheiro Machado, one of the Castilhista chiefs, says however that the enemy is dis-persed and the "revolution is suffocated." This is probably intended for political effect. These contradictory reports make it impossible for us to know the real situa-tion there, but the probabilities are that the revolution is as strong as ever, though the federalist may not be seened. the federalists may not be prepared as yel to accept battle in the open field.

THERE is but little of practical value to record in connection with Congress during the past week beyond two votes adverse to the past week beyond two votes adverse to the policy of the President. On the 18th Deputy Demetrio Ribeiro, of Rio Grande, asked for a discussion of affairs in that state in committee and the request was conceded by the Chamber. In the discussion which followed, the policy of the government was severely criticised, and resolutions lamenting the situation in that state were proposed. On Saturday these resolutions, harmless but still implying censure, were adopted by a vote of 62 to 52. Yesterday the second blow at the executive was struck in the Senate by a refusal to confirm struck in the Senate by a refusal to confirm the nomination of Dr. Barata Ribeiro as prefect of this city. The nomination had been under consideration by a committee for some days, and it was believed that an adverse report would be rendered. Yes terday this anticipation was realized and the nomination was thrown out by a vote of 29 to 16. This action of the Senate meets with almost unanimous—approval in the city, for the official in question—has been playing the rôle of municipal dictator in a way that promised bankruptcy for the city treasury in a very short time. It is a pity he could not have been rejected long ago, for he has already accomplished an immense amount of harm, and has covered the ad-ministration of the city with incalculable discredit. The protection of such men by President Floriano can be only a source of weakness, and it is to be hoped that this

experience will show him the need of strengthening his government by the appointment of a very different class of men to such important offices.

In his frenzy to carry out so-called muni-In his frenzy to carry out so-called municipal improvements, the prefect of this city is doing incalculable harm by the destruction of shade trees. It is a species of vandalism so common that it is never noticed, for there appear to be very few true lovers of trees in this country, and almost none who truly appreciate their real value in the economy of life. No one seems to know that trees and shrubs are the lungs of nature, the purifiers of the air we breathe. There are some who appreciate the lungs of nature, the purifiers of the air we breathe. There are some who appreciate the shade they give us, but even among those there are but few who will spare the tree which litters the dooryard with leaves, shades or conceals the house, or interrupts the view. Most Brazilians, we notice, prefer to have their dwellings stand out free from trees and tall shrubs, so that the imnates can keep a watchful eye on the passing world, and so that the passing world can see the and so that the passing word can see the ornamental appendages of the house and the dresses of the ladies as they sit at the windows or in the doorways. For this they are willing to have the tropical sunshine in the windows and on the roof all day long. the windows and on the root all day long. There is also a prejudice against the dampness which shade trees cause, it being forgotten that this dampness is caused principally by the lack of drainage and ventilation. If a shaded ground is carefully principally by the lack of damage and ventilation. If a shaded ground is carefully drained and is open to the wind, and if the dwelling is also well ventilated and left open during the day, there is, in reality very little to be feared from dampness. A proper study of this subject can not fail to show that there are not all to show that trees are of the greatest value to the health of a city, and that they should be protected by the most stringent of laws. Neither the people nor the municipal officials should be permitted to cut them down, without the clearest and best of reasons. In this city we have seen large and beautiful trees cut down because their roots interfered with the unnecessary paving of a little square, and we have seen many a little patch of a square, which would be far more beautiful and ungell as early list. patch of a square, which would be far more beautiful and useful as a public garden, given over to the ugly stone pavement. Why it is that the people of tropical countries are so partial to bare, stone pavements, we have never been able to understand. Perhaps they facilitate revolutionary operations, or are more easily cleaned and kept in order. However this may be, the planting of trees in the streets and public squares should be encouraged, and then they should be jealously protected. An old tree has an intrinsic value in it which no municipal legislator can afford to ignore. no municipal legislator can afford to ignore and this in itself, if not for its beauty and comfort, should be sufficient to insure its protection against the vandals who wish to lay paving stones where it stands.

The report of the minister of finance just presented to Congress contains much valuable information on the financial state of the country, though perhaps the recommendations will not meet with general approval. Its discussion of the situation opens with a statement of the revenue and expenditures for the calendar year 1890, of which a provisional report was given last year. In the hadget for that year the ordinary revenue was estimated at 175, 241,544890 and the extraordinary at 21,468.870820; a total of 195,010,4148495. —The Journal correspondent in Montevideo telegraphed yesterday that news had been received Join Melo to the effect that Gameriside Saraiva with 800 men attacked a government force near Bagé, on the 17th, which was gararding 1,500 horses. —Some days ago at Ribeirão Preto, S. —A Rivera telegram of the 17th says that Gen. Telles was defeated at Upamaroty on the 12th, losing 70 killed (including Col. Pedrosa) and over 100 wounded. On the 14th another battle was fought at Ponche Verde where Gen. Telles' vanguard, under Col. Portugal, was drawn into a trap and completely routed. Santa Rosa and Montevideo telegrams of the 18th confirmed the report of the Ponche Verde victory, stating that Telles lost 140 killed, prisoners, horses, two cannon, arms and ammanition. These reports are denied from Porto Alegre.

—A telegram of yesterday gives the report that the federalists have resolved to divide their forces in order to better secure needed recourses.

-Our Santos correspondent says that the weather there has become quite cold. The deaths from yellow fever now average about five a day, one sailor to four landsmen. The city, however, is full of intermittent fever, just to keep the people in good humor.

-On the 19th the superior court of the state of —On the 19th the superior court of the state of Pennamburo decided, in response to an application from Governor Barbosa Lina, and by a vote of 5 to 3, that the suspension of the governor lately pronounced by the legislature is unconstitutional and void. The legislature now asys that the court has no authority and proposes to initiate proceedings against it for an illegal decision. If this quarrel continues much longer in Pennamburo it will take something more than an army to put matters straight. A recent telegram says that the legis-lature has adjourned to June 30th.

Speculation in the coffee market has been very active this week. Values have suffered considerably and the great "bull" operator of Paris, a dealer named Kattenbach, was forced to abandon his representatives in this market. In consequence of the failure to obtain further remittances from Kattenbach, the firm of Thos. M. Barr & Co., one of the most conservative and best known houses in the trade, was compelled to suspend on Tuesday, with liabilities of about \$\$25,0,000\$. The announcement of the failure was followed by intense excitement and a semi-panicky feeling, prices failing to a level not reached before in months. It is to be hoped that the situation will soon improve and a more settled tone succeed to the irregularity caused by the manipulations of contending speculators. The demortization in options has, of course, affected the market for spot coffee, restricting business and weakening values. The statistical outlook is favorable to holders of coffee. New York Merchants' Review, April 21.
