THE situation at the south is undoubt The situation at the south is undoubt-edly critical in every respect, or the national government would not be continuing the extraordinary measures adopted on receipt of the news of Wandenkolk's expedition against Rio Grande. The cable and tele-graph lines south were closed on the 9th inst, and continue closed up to the present moment. No telegrams from the south have been delivered, no matter how inhave been delivered, no matter how innocent of war news they may have been.
All code telegrams to other parts of the
country, and all political news have also
been forbidden. Rigorous measures have
also been adopted to prevent the departure
of vessels from this port without passes, and
all steamers for Rio Grande ports have been
stopped. One steamer was sent out, fully

On Saturday the Pairs amounced that the President had received advices of the flight of the Jupiter, on Sunday other telegrams were reported (not published) which partly contradicted the preceding advice as to the destination of that steamer, and on Monday other telegrams were reported (not published) announcing the capture of the Jupiter, with Wandenkolk on board, near Santa Catharina. The telegraph lines remain closed, however, and there are many who doubt the news. It is to-day announced that the Aquidaban and Tirudentes are being hurriedly prepared to go south, which is in itself a confession that something is seriously the matter, of which we are not advised. If the siege of Rio Grande has been raised, the Jupiter captured and Wandenkolk's expedition frustrated, why is it that communications remain closed and other naval

vessels are being prepared for the south. Is is whispered that something more serious is in the wind and that Uruguay is to be is in the wind and that Uruguay is to be held responsible for assistance rendered to the federalists, but of this there is no certain information. The situation is aggravating and unsatisfactory to an extreme, and it is feared that other troubles are impending outside of Rio Grande. In Santa Catharina the state authorities are being deposed again by the nationalists (if we may call the President's friends by that name), a row is brewing in Parand, an "armed peace" characterizes the situation in Pernambuco, and in this city the forces are held in readiness and the streets are full of urly rumors. iness and the streets are full of ugly rumors. We are living practically in a state of siege, although martial law has not been declared. What the result is to be no one can say, but all know that only one course is open for a satisfactory. a satisfactory settlement of the complications which beset us.

Coffee Notes

—The people of the United States in 1892 con-sumed, per capin, 6,54 pounds of coffee, and 1,3 pounds of tea. Coffee is initiated there in many ways, besides being adulterated, and when the price of coffee is high the substitutes are largely purclassed by poor people.

—A Santos telegram of the 15th says that the receipts of coffee during the week had been 26,000 bags, and the sales 30,000 bags. The stock on that date was 116,000 bags.

—According to the Jornal do Brazil a prominent member of the bench rendered a decision a few days since to the effect that the Bauco da Republica has no juridical existence, nor can have until Congress approves the decree of December 17th last. In view of the large and important transactions effected by this bank, this decision can not fail to exerts serious apprehensions. It ought, also, to arouse Congress to the necessity of prohibiting such executive acts, which may involve heavy losses where Congress fails to concur.

LOCAL NOTES

-The Republica left for the south at half-past three on the morning of the 11th.

-The two chambers of Congress have voted the bill authorizing the removal of the naval arsenal from Bahia.

—The coasting steamer Mapsink left for Santa Catharina, via Paranaguá, on the 11th with ammunition and supplies.

There was a personal encounter in the Chamber of Deputies on the 11th inst. between Deputy Espirito Santo and an editor of the Tempo.

—The coasting steamer Santos left, by order of the government, on the 17th for Santa Catharina, carrying passengers and military supplies. She carries an armed force for defence in case of attack.

—On the 11th the state telegraph lines refused to send a press telegran to Pernambuco amouncing the suspension of telegraphic communication. Aristides ought to be rejoicing mightily at this spectacle of lurid freedom.

—The British minister called on the minister of foreign affairs on the 12th and had a long conference with him. The Jornal intimates that the embargo imposed on telegraphic communication was the subject of conversation.

—It is reported that the Jupiler was not seized by Wandeskolk, but had been bought, armed and manned for the purpose in view. The stim paid is said to have been £55,000, and it is also said that she carried 700 men, instead of 100 as at first

—A small mob paraded Rua do Ouvidor on the night of the 11th inst., shouting "Long live Marshal Florianol." and "Death to the Federalists!" It scared the timid shopkeepers, of course; but the revolution in Rio Grande was hardy enough to go right on.

The minister of industry has removed Dr. Alexander Hang from the post of district chief-engineer in the state telegraph department. The aforesad official disappeared a short time since, and it now appears that he left for Europe under an assumed name.

—The Jornal do Commercio of the 12th says that one of the last telegrams received from Rio Grande, dispatched at 6 p.m. on the 19th and received here on the 10th, was as follows:—"Wandenkolk on board has captured eight more vessels which are all armed. Our port blockaded."

—It is a curious fact that while the newspapers in this city were publishing no telegraphic news whatever from Rio Grande last week, the provincial papers were publishing telegrams from Col. Valladio, the President's private secretary, on the course of events in that state. Comment is un-

—According to the Jornal the steamers inside the Rio Grande bar when Wandenkolk took possession were the Rio Parala, Aynané and Merceles of the Lloyd Bazileiro, and the Habea, Hapaia and Hanema of the Nacional Costeira. It is also believed that the Halia of the Frigorifica Co., had likewise been captured.

—The minister of foreign affairs has revived the phrase "Sande e Fraternidade" for closing official communications and has prohibited the use of titles of nobility among the employés of his department. It is a sign that he is still young and emotional, and an entiusiastic disciple of the Desmoulins school of republicanism.

—Not content with arbitrarily closing all tele-graphic communication with the south, the govern-ment also closed the port last week to the free wovement of merchant vessels, all departures being prohibited without the pass from the captain of the port. It looks as though the government had deras about some of the vessels in this port—and perhaps some which can hardly be described as merchantmen. perhaps some merchantmen.

—It was said on the 12th that Wandenkolk had moved all the channel buoys at the Rio Grande bar, that the gunboats had gone over to his side, that he had taken several merchant steamers found there which he had manued and arned, and that with these he had bombarded the fortifications of Rio Grande. As the government has prohibited the delivery of any telegrams from the south, it was impossible to determine how far these rumors were true.

—The weak point in Admiral Wandenkolk's attack in Rio Grande was his confidence in receiving support from his frieuds. No one supports anything in Brazil until its success is certain, and then everybody wants the credit for it.
