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#### WEST COAST ITEMS.

—El Tiempo of Lima says that on the night of the 21st August an officer belonging to the American warship Marian was attacked by several men, on a pier at Callao, and was robbed of a gold watch and chain and some money. —It is now charged that the new government in Chili is favoring the conservative party in its distribution of favors, consequently the liberals are uniting for the purpose of defeating the ministry. And we presume it is all labeled "patriotism."

—According to telegrams from Chili the financial situation there is again becoming critical. And in all probability it will continue critical as long as these exaggerated military expenditures continue. As small and comparatively poor country can not waste its revenues in this way without feeling it.

The telegrams say that the Peruvian women are protesting against the civil marriage project, Nevertheless we hope to hear that the bill will be voted. To deprive Protestants of the right of marriage unless they abjure their faith and become Catholics, is an outroge and should not be continued another hour.

—Several attempts have been made to introduce salmon and other fish into Chilian waters, but they have invariably ended in failure. The task has always been confided to Frenchmen, and we have often pleaded for a chance for the Anglo-Saxon. This, at length, has been granted, Mr. Anderson Smith having arrived in the steamer Orrana, under contract with the government, to examine and report on some of the southern rivers with a view to the introduction of salmon and other fish. The local authorities have been instructed to furnish Mr. Smith with every facility for the discharge of his commission.—Chilian Times, Sept. 12.

-An international co-operative society is about to be established in this city, with a capital of \$250,000 paid up shares. Shares are to be valued at twenty dollars currency. It is intended to establish in Valparaiso a large concern for the sale of groecires, provisions, boots and shoes, and all other necessaries at mutual prices. Mr. F. Wilson Humpbrey, with another influential gentleman, is promoting the undertaking, and we understand that a large number of the leading merchants in the city have taken shares in the undertaking, which promises every success. —Since the first instant the government has taken over all the police in the capitals of departments. This measure had become necessary owing partly to the general impecuniosity of the municipalities, but principally because the appointment of police superintendents and officials had been converted into political questions, and was contributing to the demoralisation of the force. Through an oversight on the part of the framers of the act, which turned over the police to the government, towns with municipalities which are not capitals of departments, were not included in the act. A case in point is Viña del Mar. That town has a municipality, but it is not a capital of department. The police of that place, however, is just as much the battledore and shuttlecock of political parties as is the force of any capital of department, and it ought to be taken over by the government on the same conditions as all the other corps in the country. From advance sheets U. S. Consular Reports for September. PRODUCTION OF COFFEE IN MEXICO.

I am persuaded to prepare this report on Mexican coffee by the large number of letters I am receiving from every state in the Union upon that subject, from persons seeking commercial information, from persons seeking personal or community information, contemplating removal to Mexico, and from persons engaged in the historical investigation of the bean, and Mexico in connection with the bean.

I will attempt, in the first place, to give a history of the bean from its discovery to the present time, for which I am largely indebted to a work styled Cultivation and Preparation of Coffee, by Gabriel Gomez, agricultural engineer of Mexico, who, at the time of its composition, possibly had as comprehensive knowledge of the berry as any one who ever wrote on the subject. It is due to the readers to say I never saw comprehensive knowledge of the berry as any one who ever wrote on the subject. It is due to the readers to say I never saw coffee growing until I came to Mexico in 1893, that I know little of it now, that I am more of a collector of facts about it than an originator of ideas. No one, without practical experience in growing, cultivating, and curing the bean for market can have reliable information about it. I have sought this information from the best recognized sources, from those engaged in its production, and present it as it is imparted to me; second, I shall show how it is cultivated in Mexico, in what parts of the republic, the kinds of coffee, and the profits and sales of the same; third, how it is prepared for market; fourth, how it is prepared for market; fourth, how it is prepared for table use, giving receipts from those who have had large experience and can extract the beverage from the bean so skillfully as to make it most palatable. The question with all classes of our people is, how to obtain the best grades of coffee at the least price. I shall attempt to answer these points in a plain, simple way, so that even the unlearned can thoroughly understand what is said.

stand what is said. Heretofore, Mexico has not been considered by our merchants as an enlarged or promising field for coffee production, because producers have not shown much acti-cacao, then afterwards of the crange, the

vity in presenting the crop to the market. It is strange to those of us viewing it from the present standpoint and acquantanceship with the bean that the Mex. on coffee should have remained so long unknown to and unsold in our market. Since the government of this country has passed to capable hands; since the country has opened its gates to all home-secking people; since the world has become assured that financial investments, as well as afe and property, are as safe here as elsewhere, that a large part of the country is accessible by rail and water, a new life, a greater stimulus, has been given to the production of all kinds of tropical fruits, as well as the lower findes of the matter and to the manner born as by thousands of foreighers who have removed to Mexico for agricultural purposes. Mexico has shown its capacity to produce the higher as well as the lower findes of the berry—from the most delicate Uranjan to the rougher and less tasteful grain on the higher elevations—and she must become a greater producer for the matks of the world, shrinking from no compatison with the coffee of Brazil and elsewhete. There are already many agents from New Orleans, New York, San Francisco, and Battimore located in the coffee-producing rigions of Mexico, buying larger or smaller lots for their employers in the United States. I am of the opinion that Mexico has the capacity to produce every pound of coffee required in the United States, and as it is a part of the North American continent with our own country, its proximity has much lessened the cost of transportation over that from the more distance. own country, its proximity has much lessened the cost of transportation over that from the more distant South American and

from the more distant South American and Asiatic countries.

The history of coffee is interesting, and as it may not be generally known, I will present some of the most imperatant points pertaining to the beverage. Its original home is supposed to have been Upper Ethiopia, and it was transplanted from there to Arabia Felix. It is still a controlled to the controlled of there to Arabia Felix. It is still a controverted point with certain classes whether the beverage was known to the Groeks and Romans. The Persians adopted the berry after the Ethiopians, and the Arabs are entitled to the credit for its more general introduction into Europe. From Arabia, the use of coffee passed to Egypt, reaching Cairo at the beginning of the sixteenth century. From Egypt, it passed to Syria; from thence, to Greece and Constantinople, A. D. 1554.

Coffee was introduced into England in 1632 by a Greek named Pasquarosse, who was familiar with its preparation. Soon Pasquarosse opened a handsome caté in London, and there was great activity in presenting the new drink and giving the virtues of coffee to that city. France adopted the use of the berry ten years ofter England; Hally claims the home of having discovered its merits prior to France, and it is said that an Italian brought coffee to Muscilles in 1641.

The first coffectionse was opened in Paris twenty-five year later, during the reign of Louis XIV.

It is said the invention of newspapers, It is said the invention of new-papers, or gazettes, is due to the introduction of coffee into France. From the gessep of individuals gathered in the cafes over the cups of coffee, there was but a short step to the rude printing press, with its sheets of enlarged gossip, and the idea of such a sheet is said to have entered the brain of some genius as he was implifying the offer at genius as he was imbibing the coffee at that time.

genius as he was imbibing the coffee at that time.

Coffee was introduced in the early years of the seventeenth century into the islands of the sea, the West Indies, Martinique, Santo Domingo, Guadeloupe, the island of Réunion, into almost all of those parts of America in which it could be produced, and in 1748 Don Juan Antonio Gelabert introduced it into Cuba. It was introduced into Mexico from the West Indies toward the end of the seventeenth century, entitivated first at or near Cordoba, now on the Mexican and Veneruz railroad, 205 miles from the City of Mexico and 60 miles from Veneruz, at an elevation of 2,500 feet above sea level, and situated in the midst of the most productive tropical region of this wondrous country, now commanding the attention of the world to a greater extent than it has ever done before. It is of this special section of Mexico that Prescott thus special section of Mexico that Prescott thus speaks in his Conquest of Mexico:

"During the first day, Cortes's road lay through the "Tierra caliente," the beautiful land where they had been so long lingering; the land of the vanilla, cochineal, cacao, then afterwards of the crange, the

sugar cane, and coffee-products which, sight cane, and confee—products which, indigenous to Mexico, have now become the luxuries of Europe; the land where the fruits and the flowers chase one nother in unbraken circle through the year; where the gales are loaded with perfume till the senses ache at their sweemess, and the groves are filled with many colored birds and insects, whose enameled wings glisten like diamonds in the bright sun of the tropics. Such are the magical splendors of this paradise of the senses

there is one of the spots in this yet un-developed republic where some of the finest coffee known to the human appetite is grown and prepared for the markets of

As this part of Mexico is the birthplace of coffee in Mexico, and. I might almost asy, any other part of the North American continent or its contiguous islands, I have taken the liberty of giving it a more special notice and description. It is to-day the richest and most beautiful spot in Mexico, with Jalapa, Orizaba, and Cordoba rising from their emerald hills in all their beauty and freshness. No one has seen Mexico in all of its splendor until he has visited this enchanting spot.

Coffee is not indigenous to the country but it was originally brought from the West Indies about 1790. Still, it was not unti 1818 that the plant was properly cultivated

1818 that the plant was properly cultivated, when Don Juan A. Gomez, the benefactor of Cordoba, demonstrated to the world that Mexico truly had the soil and climate essential to the raising of coffee.

COFFEE CROI OF 1895.

The total production of coffee in 1895 was 24,537,959 kilograms (53,983,509 pounds), distributed among the different states as follows: Chiapas, 1,997,682: Colima, 338,283; Guerreo, 13,528; Hidalgo, 400,455; Jalisco, 116,216; Mexico, 106,799; Michoacan, 477,114; Morelos, 93,-132: Oaxaca, 9,784,443; Puebla, 1,278,772: Queretaro, 4,417; San Louis Potosi, 568,118; Tabasco, 268,201; Tepic, 63,-237; and Veractur, 8,977,482. The production of the country represents more than 237: and Veracruz, 8.977,482. The production of the country represents more than 50,000,000 trees. Since 1892, the states which have increased their plantations more than twofold are Chiapas, Oaxaca, Veracruz and Puebla. The ratio of increase in the total production for the last two or three years is about 33 per cent annually. The consumption keeps pace with the production. As railroads open up new markets and transportation becomes cheaper, the working classes are becoming habituated to the daily use of the aromatic bean. Moreover, the exportation is increasing in ratio every year. The United States imported from Mexico in 1888 more than 7,000 tons; in 1890, 10,333 tons; in 1891, 7,000 tons; in 1890, 10,333 tons; in 1891, 14,044 tons; in 1894, 16,080 tons; and in 1895, 17,631 tons.

VARIETIES OF MEXICAN COFFEE. The coffee plant mostly cultivated in Mexico is a subvariety of the Mocha, or The coffee plant mostly cultivated in Mexico is a subvariety of the Mocha, or Coffea arabia. This is an evergreen, partaking more of the nature of a shrub, which, in a state of cultivation, varies in height from 5 to 7 feet. The range of this species is at elevations of from 1,000 to 5,000 feet above sea level, south of latitude 220 north, where the temperature does not fall below 55° F.; still, the most avorable chanate for it would be where the temperature does not fall below 60° nor rise above 80° in the shade; as to humidity, there should be from 75 to 150 inches of rain during the year, and the plant should be irrigated during the dry season, if required. The myrde kind, which is considered as second in quality, is also extensively cultivated. It is very similar to the lava, and is distinguished from the Mocha variety by the leaf being larger and the corolls smaller. This plant is hardier than the Mocha kind and will stand higher temperature; it is mostly cultivated in the Cordoba district.

CONDITIONS OF SOIL AND CLIMATE.

As the coffee tree has a long taproot, it will thrive better on land where the soil is deep. The best soil in Mexico is a well-dramed, loamy one, either of a virgin mountainous composition, or of a volcanic nature, rich in humus. A rocky soil, where the earth is deep between the rocks, is very

suitable, and less manuring is then required for the plants, as the rocks are con-tinually adding to the soil by the decom-posing action of the air, rain, and other posing action natural forces.

The climate most adaptable to coffee in The climate most adaptable to chifee in Mexico is that found in the mountainous regions, with a range of temperature from 55° to 86° F. The best coffee is grown at elevations varying from 2,200 to 4,500 feet above the sea, in sections south of Veracruz; but in locations below latitude 21° north, the north limit of the coffee zone on the Gulf side the climate being cooks, the the Gulf side, the climate being cooler, the bush requires lower elevations, ranging from

bush requires lower elevations, ranging from foot to 3,000 feet.

The plant is, however, cultivated by some planters at much lower levels, and even within a few miles from the sesshore. For instance, in Misantla, Acayucan, Minittlan, and Tuxtla, Veracruz; and in Cardenas, Comalcalco, Cunduacan, Nacyuca, and San Juan Bautista, Tabasco, An extremely wet climate; in per forceable to the and San Juan Bautista, Tabasco. An extremely wet climate is not favorable to the coffee plant, and it will not thrive it very exposed situations.

If proper aspect, as regards sun and winds, can not be obtained, the exposure can nearly always be modified by shelter

belts of trees.

On the Pacific side, the prevailing south winds must be avoided at low elevations, and on this side the tree can be planted at much higher elevations, as the range which brunches off at Jalisco and joins the Toluce mountain and the Popocatapetl peak breaks off the cold north winds and shelters the regions below it. As to direct sun expo-ure, when it is desirable to take advantage of the heat at high elevations, it is always convenient to acquire, as far as possible, a southern exposure, but where the elevation is low and the temperature is high, such an exposure would be injurious to the plant, in which case it is better to procure an eastern exposure. Generally, the action of the rains modifies the temperature in the tropics, and at elevations between 2,000 and 4,500 feet above sea level, clouds gather along the mountains almost every day before the rays of the noon sun bear their strong influence in those localities. On the Gulf side, the trees that have an eastern sun exposure, so that the sun strikes them during the morn-ing, thrive better and yield more.

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#### SEA-BATHING.

By Dr. Andrew Wilson.

Let me begin by noting an important fact in connection with sca-balhing. With some people it does not agree; and openair bathing altogether, whether in the sea or in fresh water, is subject to the same remark in connection with many persons. They will tell you that after bathing in the They will tell you that after oathing in the sea or river, they experience headache, or feel uncomfortable all day thereafter. Take what precautions they will, they feel the bath has not done good. It is not a question, this, of want of re-action, or of feeling tion, this, of want of re-action, or of reeing cold and chilly after the plunge. I have already said that it is folly to attempt to bathe in cold water if reaction is wanting; but many people who have perfect reaction and no feeling of chill at all, cannot bathe in the open, sea or river because of headache and other symptoms following the

Then, there is the curious fact also to be noticed, that many of these persons can take a cold bath at home without any of the disagreeable after-effects experienced through sea bathing. Why this should be so I know not. It must depend on some personal peculiarity or other which is difficult of determination. But whatever be the cause of the head tole or other symptom produced by bathing in the open, I should say it is most wise to take the hint nature gives us, and to cease from bathing if it is thus shown that it does not agree with us. We should never neglect the hints which are thus given us that the system rebels against some practices or other Then, there is the curious fact also to be tem rebels against some practices or other unsuitable for it.

Next, take special care of the ears in sea bathing. This is an all-important point. Diving from a height has been known to produce rupture of the drum-head of the produce rupture of the drum-head of the ear, and, in any case, it is unwise to allow salt water to gain admittance to the ear. Man is not a water-living animal, and even seals have muscles for closing up their ear-openings when they dive. Besides, it is not intended by nature that water should get into the ears at all. This is not good, I say, for healthy ears, which should have a little cotton wool placed in them when we hather. but for ears that are weak or unbathe; but for ears that are weak or un-healthy, the want of precaution here may mean serious illness, or even death. If any tendency to ear-ache exists, it is likely to be excited by the presence of sea-water in

Still more earnestly do I warn my readers that if they have any ear weakness—say any

discharge from the ear, such as occurs after scarlet fever or other ailment, or after ear-riche—salt water in such a case, or indeed fresh water itself, will perhaps set up inflam-mation of a serious kind. The danger here is that the ear-inflammation may extend to is that the ear-inflammation may extend to the brain. Nothing is more apt to happen in sea-bathing than that a weak ear should have salt water entering it, and setting up trouble of the kind I bave named. A wave deshing on the ear will have much the same effect. A distinguished judge, who had suffered from a weak ear, died from brain inflammation produced by a wave striking his head, and by the inroad of salt water to the ear. Mothers should look to it that no child is allowed to bathe without placing cotton wool in the cars, and that placing cotton wool in the cats, and that no child with car weakness should be allowed to bathe at all. These car troubles should be seen to at once by an ear sur-

should be seen to at once by an ear surgeon, and be cured in time.

When to bathe is, of course, an important matter. First, I should say, never bathe within at least two hours after a meal. The morning bath is justified by the fact that the bather enjoys his bath on a empty stomach. The presence of a full meal in the stomach is a barrier to bathing, because, feet disection is likely to be dispersion. first, digestion is likely to be disordered by the plunge; and second, it is probable that "cramp" is much more likely to occur if "cramp" is much more likely to occur it we indulge in the exercise just after eating. I do not doubt that many cases of "cramp" leading to drowning arise from want of attention to this rule: therefore, it is wise to bathe only before digestion begins, or after

bathe only before digestion begins, or after it has practically ended, in so far as its earlier stages are concerned, at least.

Another excellent rule is never to bathe in the open when the body is exhausted or chilled. Vou might as well bathe when delicate, or when recovering from illness. The body in an exhausted or tired state will be trevived by a warm bath. A cold bath will only further depress it, because the body has not sufficient power of reaction. As regards bathing when a person is warm, that is a different thing. As a rule, tion. As regards bathing when a person is warm, that is a different thing. As a rule, no harm will be done, always provided the body has not begin to cool, and that there is no chill or cooling experienced during the work of undressing. A person who is warm, or heated, should undress very quickly so as to avoid cold, and then the plunge will not be attended by ill effects. It is a very different matter for a person who, after exertion, has perspired profusely, and who is cooling as the sweat evaporates from the skin, to enter the sea or river. Then, he will be most liable to acquire a chill, with its after effects of cold or lungtrouble. trouble.

There are great variations regarding the time which should be occupied in the seabath. A strong, powerful swimmer may, perhaps, indulge in a prolonged bathe. Others will do wisely if they shorten, rather than prolong, their bathing: and it is of equal importance that they should dress quickly after the bath. The chills that result from bathing are most frequently caught by prolonging the bath unduly, and by carelessness after it in not drying the body very quickly, and in lottering about after leaving the sold very quickly, and in lottering about after leaving the sea. A brisk walk is advisable after bathing, especially for those with a feeble circulation, inasmuch as the walk serves to promote reaction, and to en-courage the healthy glow and feeling of warmth which teach us that the plunge in the sea has been productive of good effect.

WE are now in the month of October, and the great heat admonishes that we have entered upon an exceptionally carly sum-mer. In addition to this, there has been a ner. In addition to this, there has been a long period of dry weather, and the water supply of the city is already beginning to fail. Last week, the reservoir which supplies the hospitals and asylums in Bottfogo ran dry and those institutions had to look elsewhere for water for a day or two and are now on a very short supply. even now on a very short supply. In view of the dirty and unsanitary condition of the city, this early heat and failure in the water supply compel us to anticipate a bad summer. We do not like to be making such prognostications, but experience comthe conditions which we see on every hand. We know to a certainty that heat and drouth are sure to produce fever wherever the streets and habitations are in an unclean condition. And if the heat and drouth streets and habitations are in an unclean condition. And if the heat and drouth begin in September, we also know that the chances for an epidemic of fever are augmented because of the longer season. Still further, the chances of taking fever are always greater toward the end of the hot season, as shown by the greater mortality in March and April, because of the exhaustion of our physical forces. We can not resist tendencies to illness as well in March as we can in December. If, then, our hot season is to begin at least two months earlier than usual, we may expect to reach that period of physical exhaustion much earlier period of physical exhaustion much earlier than usual, and therefore we may logically expect to see more cases of fever. Under such circumstances, it would be good policy to make careful preparations for a bad season and adopt every measure for the prevention of a lever epidemic which experience can approve. Two measures ought not to be delayed another mome it the improvement of the water supply, and the cleansing of the city. We do not believe that the water supply is really insufficient, but it is so badly distributed and so shamefully wasted that it is wholly wanting in some localities and scarce long before it

should be in others. It is a common experience to hear water running to waste in your neighbor's yard all night, and to see it running to waste continuously in corticor where washerwomen live. It is sometimes estimated that the waste is equivalent to fully one third, if not to one-half the whole supply. Surely this might be remedied, and especially at a time like this. As for cleaning up the city, it seems hopeless to expect such a thing; but still, until this is done we shall never be free from invasions of fever. The prime cause of all such disorders is uncleanliness—personal, domestic and municipal. The elaborate recommendations of the commission which recently investigated this subject, will be of no avail whatever if not accompanied by the thorough cleansing of the city and its water front. All the talk we hear about the present defective drainage system of the city is simply for effect, and may be looked upon as the forerunner of some gigantic piece of jobbery. No system will be effective unless the people observe the laws of health and sanitation in their daily life and keep their residences and surroundings clean, and any system will give good results as long as these matters are carefully observed. We can afford to dispense with all these elaborate schemes for the moment, but we can not dispense with an abundant supply of pure water and wholesome food, and we can not dispense with thorough cleanliness.

The proposal of the budget committee of the chamber of deputies to reduce the duties on news paper to 20 reis a kilo is duties on news paper to 20 reis a kilo is nothing more than a trick to purchase the favor of the press. The duties on this class of paper are already too low when compared with the better grades. They are scheduled at 60 reis at present, against 200 reis for the better grades imported for books and other periodicals. If the first deserves a reduction, then the latter deserves a still greater reduction. There is neither justice nor wisdom in the distinction made, for the newspaper is not allogether a peneficent. newspaper is not altogether a beneficent agency and does not always deserve the favors heaped upon it. It might be a most valuable agency for the education of the people, for the development of the country, and for the protection of popular liberty. But it will be very difficult to the country and the But it will be very difficult to credit the newspapers with these important services here in Brazil. They are in reality dan-gerous instruments of personal ambition and senseless agitation much oftener than intelligent guides and teachers of public opinion. However, we are not at war with the press, for while it has its faults and weaknesses it has also its value. Like the society which it serves, it must develop by slow stages into a well-organized state and into a full appreciation of its true mission. With all its defects, it still serves a good purpose and is worthy of the appre-ciation in which it is held. And to this it may be added that it will develop and improve just as rapidly as the society in which it is established. But, at the same which it is established. But, at the same time, it should be remembered that the grant of exceptional favors will neither ben-efit the newspaper nor serve any good purpose. The book publishers of Brazil have just so much design on the country as have just as much claim on the country as the newspaper publishers, if not more. They the newspaper publishers, it not more. I ney are publishing works of greater importance, such as school text-books, periodicals of permanent value, and literary works o merit. And so great are the cost of publication at the present moment that many books are now printed in Lisbon and Paris, to the great prejudice of the Brazilian publisher. He pays heavy duties on his paper and typographic material, wages and rents are high, taxes are oppressive, and his occupation is so uncertain and unprofitable that he can not develop it as it has been developed in other countries. The result is that printing is in a shamefully backward state in Brazil, and the text-books furnished to the schools of this country are a disgrace to those entrusted with its government. To take a familiar illustration, while the Jornal do Brazil and other daily journals pay only 60 reis a kilo on their paper, The Rio Netze is compelled to pay 200 reis a kilo on a paper only a triffe better in custin. For a paper only a trifle better in quality. For a long time we imported a calendered paper, but as the costs of importation became heavier we concluded to order an uncalendered article of a slightly inferior quality, thinking that the custom-house would mass it as new paper. But in this important in the custom-house would pass it as news paper. But in this we were deceived. This periodical is printed on

nothing but a good quality of news paper, and no customs classification will make it any different, but still we are compelled to pay a heavy tax simply because the authorities choose to consider the paper as belonging to a higher class. From this the reader will see how the government discriminates against all the periodicals and books using a better paper than the miserable stuff used by the daily press. If congress really wishes to confer a benefit on the public, it will place all publishers on exactly the same footing and will encourage the employment of better paper in the manufacture of books, especially for the use of school children. And in doing this, it will help to give more work to the native printer by rendering it possible to print those books in the country which are now sent to Europe.

As we anticipated the planters congress recently convened at São Paulo was devoted exclusively to schemes for raising money. Nothing was said about the necessity of improving existing methods of cultivation, nor of reducing the costs of production, trans portation and marketing, and nothing of a better system of labor. Apparently the waste ful methods inherited from the days of slave labor are still considered good enough, and the unnecessary expenditures conand the unnecessary expenditures con-nected with the sale and exportation of his product are still unworthy of serious con-sideration. While coffee cultivation elsewhere is receiving careful study and is being benefitted by improved methods of cultivation and preparation, the Brazilian planter is content to remain stationary. To be sure, he enjoys many and important advan-tages in the great fertility of his soil and the beneficence of his climate, and he is the beneficence of his climate, and he is not compelled therefore to study and experiment like many of his competitors in order to improve his output by even a fractional percentage. But the times are coming when all these subjects will be as vital to him as to others, and for the simple vital to him as to others, and for the simple reason that we are rapidly approaching a period of over production, when the low prices obtainable for coffee will make every small economy worthy of consideration. Instead of sitting down and appealing to the state to help him, he should be actively studying how to reduce the costs of production, and how to save something of the expense incurred in marketing his product. expense incurred in marketing his product. It is worth his consideration whether it is It is worth his consideration whether it is good policy to locate so large a number of laborers on his property merely for the purpose of having a sufficient number of pickers in the harvesting season. In other countries better wages are paid for harvest, and the laborers go out from their small farms and from the towns to take advantage of them. In Argenting the wheat harvest of them. In Argentina the wheat harvest attracts laborers even from Italy. In the United States they travel hundreds of miles for haying, harvesting and hop-gathering. Then, why not locate immigrants in convenient localities on small holdings and venient localities on small holdings and offer good wages for their assistance in the actual coffee-picking season? There are also the questions of clean-picking, instead of stripping the branches, of pruning, of manuring, of country roads to facilitate transportation, of lower rates on the railways, and of the abolition of some of the intermediates in the marketing of the are intermediaries in the marketing of the product. All these subjects are worthy of consideration. We find, however, that the Sao Paulo planter overlooks all these practical results. Sao Paulo planter overlooks all these practical matters, and concentrates his efforts on one subject only—the interposition of the state to assist him to borrow money. Although his plantations are held at high valuations and his annual crops represent very large sums of cash, he is always asking for advances and is always in debt. It has always here, like this, and he composable. always been like this, and he apparently knows no way to escape from it. It has never occurred to him that he might sell some of his land and pay his debts with the proceeds, nor is he inclined to reduce his rejected consents. the proceeds, nor is he inclined to reduce his princely expenditures and thus remove a burden from his estate. He lives in Rio, or São Paulo, or Campinas, or the seat of his municipality; he makes frequent visits to Paris; he gambles furiously and spends his money in ways that will not always bear publicity; he speculates and entangles himself in politics; and then when he runs short of cash he borrows from his commissario, at a high rate of interest, against his sario, at a high rate of interest, against his next year's crop. It is to save himself from the consequences of such mismanagement that the aid of the state is solicited, and not from the consequences of low prices and paid labor. The margins on coffee

—According to the Diario Popular of São Paulo, Major Matheus Gomes do Val has refused 1,300,000\$ for his coffee plantation at Ribeirão Preto.

—A Rio Clare correspondent of the Commercio de São Paulo says that the drouth in that region has already caused great injury to the future coffee crop. Had it rained, the complaint would have been the same

—The burden of discussion at the meeting of Sac Paulo planters which was opened on the 30th ult, is the poverty and unprofitableness of their industry, and their need of financial assistance. And yet S. Paulo now produces 35,00,000 bags of coffee annually, which at 15\$ an arroba represents an aggregate of 21,00,000\$. Such a gross income as this surely does not represent poverty!

—The Reporter of Ribeirão Pieto, São Paulo, gives the following interesting particulars of the Fazenda Dumont which was recently sold to an English syndicate. The estate contains 300 square kilometres, or 30,000 hectares, [say 74,1]4 acres], of the best terra reva lands in the state. The coffee plantations cover an area of 5,250 hectars 112,972 acres] and contain 4,118,800 cofee trees, of which 2,006,700 are from 6 to 12 years old, 406,800 are 5 years old, 648,700 are 4 years old, 530,600 are 3 years old, and 463,000 are 2 years old. The plantation is served by 60 kilometres of railway. If also possesse 24 settlements of colonists comprising 800 families, nearly all Italians, who live in 334 houses, of which 273 are of brick.

—A recent writer estimates the total number of

A recent writer estimates the total number of coffee-bearing trees in São Paulo at 280,000,000, which at an average of 285,000 each represents a total value of 700,000,000\$. He aids to these 60,000,000 young trees not yet bearing, which he values at 18000 each, or 60,000,000 in all. This gives a total valuation of 750,000,000\$ to the coffee trees of the state. If these figures are cyrrect, it will not be difficult to estimate the resists of a direct tax on the industry instead of the indirect tax now levich. A tax of to reis a tree, which represents less than one-laid of one per cert on the average valuation of 285,000, will yield 34,000,000\$ a year, while an export tax of 11 per cert on an estimated aggregate valuation of 210,000,000\$ will yield 23,100,000\$.

-The representative of the Singer Manufacturing Co., Mr. J. W. Heward, advises as that he has removed from No. 13 Conselheiro Saraiva to No. 34 Candelaria.

—It is asserted that both the treasury and the Banco da Republica are reissuing notes of the Banco Emissor da Bahia which had been withdrawn from circulation and which, it is announced, are to be cancelled at the end of the present year.

—Deputy Pedro Moacyr has introduced a bill authorising the government to aid wheat culture in the states of Rio Grande do Sul, Santa Catharina, Paraná, Minas Geraes and Perambuco, and also the culture of similar products in those states.

—It took an executive decree to establish the wage (4,200\$ a year) of the pressman in the government printing-office at Para. If less attention were given to these trivial matters, perhaps a little necessary and useful legislation might be accomplished.

—In consequence of Deputy Glycerio's proposal to convert into mortgage bonds the deposits in the government sawings bank [aixa econoxica] depositors have been making a run on that establishment, from which, it is stated, large sems have been withdrawn.

—According to the Jornal do Commercio the excess of withdrawals over deposits at the government savings bank (caixa economica) during the five days from the 28th ult. to the 21d inst. amounted to 84,2798664. This was of coarse due to Boss Glycerio's project to convert them into mortgage bonds.

—Much reserve is displayed in regard to the failures that are occurring in this city. Up to the end of last month the aggregate of the respective liabilities is said to have amounted to over 80,00,000\$ and new failures are reported every day. The total number is said, we know not with what foundation, to be over 300.

The price paid for the Chá viaduct in São Paulo, just disappropriated by the municipal council, is 750.0008 in 6 per cent bonds redeemable half yearly during a period of 100 years. Some day the steamship companies will see the value of this diversion, and will seek to encourage it, but it takes time and talk to bring it about.

—At the second session of the planters congress at São Paulo a project was introduced and defended by Dr. Carneiro Leão favoring an increase in the facilities for making loans to planters. He favored an authorization for the Banco de Credito Real to issue mortgage bonds, with the guarantee of the state, to ten times the capital of the bank, and that the state should subscribe 5,000,000\$ to the capital of the bank in order to increase the emission. The total emission in his opinion should be 68,000,000\$.

—Another scheme presented to the São Paulo planters congress provides for the creation of a state bank with branches in the municipalities for the purpose of making loans to planters on account current against growing coffee crops. The interest on these loans should be 10 per cent, and the amount loaned, for a period not exceeding one year, should not be over 105000 per arrola on the estimated crop. To found such a bank the state should raise a foreign loan of ten millions sterling. The scheme was submitted by Sr. Antonio de Medeiros, who thinks that the commissarios should no longer be compelled to act as bankers for the planters.

—Still another scheme for the braft of the

—Still another scheme for the benefit of the poor planter was presented to the S. Paulo planters congress by Dr. Carlos d'Assumpção. It combines several remedial measures. The first is that of municipal banks, founded and managed by the associated planters, which shall make loans at 7 to 8 per cent. These banks will also include a commercial section and will furnish the planters with new bags for the shipment of their coffee. Another large bank is also suggested, to be founded with foreign capital, secured by the growing coffee of all the planters in the state. The operations of this bank, like those of the municipal banks, are to be restricted exclusively to advances to planters. Besides these, the national congress is to be asked to issue mortgage bonds, with curu-forçade (legal tender). To obtain these the planter may mortgage his plantation to two-thirds its value, and with the proceeds he can create his municipal banks and meet running expenses.


