# RIVER PLATE ITEMS

The *Piaz* published yesterday the following telegram from Buenos-Ayres:—"In the performance of our duty we make known that arms are collected and shipped from here for the purpose of promoting a revolution in Brazil. There is no one here who is not aware of the fact. Everything is done openly, and the Argentine government folds its arms, because it has not been approached on the subject by the Brazilian authorities. One of the brokers in the work of the monarchists is a well known Portuguese merchant, whose name we need not mention, because he is the only one with a French name. This merchant has made consecutive shipments of arms and ammunition, and is now actively engaged in forwarding a supply to Santos and Bahia to Antonio Conselheiro and to his leaders in the State of S. Paulo. The shipments are openly made through the custom-house, and Dr. Cavalcanti Lacerda, the Brazilian minister, who is informed of everything, takes no action and seems indifferent, consenting to these preparations for attacking the republic that he represents."

At Belgrano, on the 20th ult., a very serious accident occurred to Mr. Baker, U. S. Consul at Buenos Ayres. He had been dining at the house of a friend at Belgrano and was about to take the train to town on the Rosario line. He reached the station just as the train was leaving and was already in motion, when he fell and the wheels passed over his right arm near the shoulder. A medical examination showed that it was impossible to save his arm, which was consequently amputated at the shoulder joint.

At Buenos Ayres, on the night of the 22nd ult. one of the cars, says the *Times of Argentina*, was invaded by a number of hilarious Britishers bent on singing God Save the Queen wherever they went. A very large number of them visited the bar and the liquor having gone the rounds, God Save the Queen was sung to which some of the foreigners objected and refused to raise their hats. This was considered an insult by the visitors and a general charge was made for everyone with hats on and in less time that it takes to relate, it is said that the place had been cleared by the charge, hats and sticks being distributed in every conceivable place. At another bar the Britishers took the place by storm and cleared out everybody who was not British, and then, having shut the street door and barred it up, commenced singing God Save the Queen. Rule Britannia and almost every song that could be given with a chorus. The chief of police, adds that journal, very considerably issued orders for exempting for that night only all drunken and disorderly Englishmen from arrest.

RIO DE JANEIRO, JULY 6th, 1897.

Our readers will remember that on the 26th of last August there arrived here a party of gentlemen representing the National Association of Manufacturers of the United States of America. These gentlemen, as was then stated, came for the purpose of seeing the industries of Brazil and of holding intercourse with the business men of the country in order to inform themselves of the conditions of trade with a view to promoting the development of commercial relations between the two nations.

In a publication recently issued by the Bureau of Publicity of the National Association they make known the impressions they received during their short visit.

Under the circumstances those impressions could not fail to be favorable. The judicious action taken by the United States minister, Mr. Thompson, whose cooperation had been solicited, assured them not only a cordial reception but also all the requisite facilities for the successful accomplishment of their objects, as far as it was possible, during the limited time at their disposal, to surmount the numerous obstacles to such an undertaking. The federal government, the presidents of the States of Rio de Janeiro, Minas Geraes and S. Paulo, the Associação Commercial of this city, the press and, through the press, the commercial community and the general public were duly apprised of the date at which the visitors were expected to arrive and of the nature and scope of their mission, so that when these visitors reached Rio de Janeiro they found that the most careful and thorough preparations had been made for their comfort and

entertainment and for efficiently aiding them in the useful work which they had come to perform.

Mr. Thompson went on board to welcome them on their arrival, gave them a reception, at which prominent business men were invited to meet them, at the legation, accompanied them when they called on the president of the republic, his ministers and the president of the State of Rio de Janeiro, placed at their disposal a large amount of statistical and other valuable information which he had with much labor collected and did everything else that could be suggested by the most thoughtful and anxious interest in their comfort and in the success of their mission.

Such action produced the natural and desired result, and Mr. Harper, the secretary of the commission, says in his report that their visit to Brazil was most delightful and instructive and that the facilities offered to them were such as could have only been produced by perfect cooperation on the part of federal and State authorities and of municipal and commercial organizations. Business men, he states, were generous in their offers of entertainment and of opportunities for the visitors to become acquainted with the way in which trade between the two countries can be developed.

In thus expressing himself Mr. Harper apparently gives voice to the general feeling of the whole party, and Mr. Search, the president of the Association, who doubtless had an opportunity to converse with all those gentlemen after their return to the United States, speaks enthusiastically of the unbounded hospitality with which they were welcomed and of the eagerness displayed in assisting them to accomplish their objects.

Accordingly, although want of time and other untoward circumstances prevented the complete execution of the programme carefully organized by Mr. Thompson, they were able to obtain much useful information, which, together with many valuable suggestions, is embodied in Mr. Harper's report, in the accompanying observations of other members of the commission and in the introduction with which Mr. Search prefaces the report and observations.

Of the suggestions made in regard to the best means of promoting the development of trade we shall endeavor to give our readers an account in a future article.

# ESPIONAGE.

By order of the chief of police Dr. Barros Lima, 2nd auxiliary police delegate, called some days ago at the house of Vice-President Manoel Victorino, whom he requested to give him the document, which the vice-president is said to have, showing that he has been subjected to espionage. The reason alleged by the police authorities for wishing to obtain possession of this document is that they desire to use it in investigating the matter.

"His Excellency," says the delegate in his report, "informed me that he could not give me the document, which would remain in his own possession."

"On my asking him whether the document contained Your Excellency's signature or that of any of the police authorities he answered that it was merely a slip of paper, stamped by the police, without any signature, and that his house and that of another person were mentioned therein."

"The vice-president of the republic then referred to a man who was constantly observed in front of his house not only by himself and family but also by visitors."

"I asked for a description of this person, which His Excellency refused to give me, declaring that he was not an informer."

# LEGISLATIVE NOTES

JUNE 28.—Senate.—Senator Vicente Machado, a propos of the alleged espionage to which Vice-President Manoel Victorino is reported to have been subjected, made a violent attack on President Prudente de Moraes.—*Chamber of Deputies.*—Deputy Glycerio moved to ask the government what steps it has taken to put an end to the espionage to which Vice-President Manoel Victorino has been subjected. Deputy Paulo Ramos moved to ask for information in regard to the government's alleged intention to purchase the railway of the Empresa de Melhoramentos. On motion of Deputy Barros Frazão the Chamber resolved to adjourn to Wednesday and to appoint a committee of 21 to take part in the session to the grave of Marshal Floriano Peixoto.

JULY 1.—Chamber of Deputies.—Some of the Deputies became noisy, insulted each other and created such a disturbance that the chair was obliged to suspend the sitting. The house afterwards adjourned in token of respect for the memory of the Deputy Gustavo Veras, who had died on the previous day.

JULY 3. Senate.—Senator Vicente Machado violently attacked President Prudente de Moraes for sending the following telegram to Dr. Manoel Correa de Freitas:—"Learning that you failed to receive my telegram, I hasten to repeat my thanks for your support and for that of the partido democratico in the struggle in which the government is engaged for maintaining respect for law and the prestige of the authorities." The party which in Paraná supports the president of the republic, said the senator, is composed almost entirely of ex-revolutionists.

PROVINCIAL NOTES

—In the month of March there were 453 interments in the cemeteries at Bahia.

—It is stated that the federal troops in S. Paulo have not received pay for two months.

—Mass was said yesterday at S. João Baptista Church in Niteroy for Admiral Saldanha da Gama.

—A band of Afonso Indians, under the lead of two brothers of the celebrated chief João Afonso, is reported to be committing depredations in the vicinity of Carmo da Bagagem in the State of Minas Geraes.

—The Comercio de S. Paulo says that it was reported on Saturday, in financial circles, that, on account of new demands of the English syndicate, the negotiations in London for the sales of the Paulista railway had been broken off.

—A telegram, published in the Diario Popular of S. Paulo, states that on the 29th ult., at Curitiba, about 30 of the cadets that had been detached from the military school at Rio de Janeiro, went to the headquarters of Gen. Xavier da Camara, commander of the 5th military district, and ordered him to hoist the national flag.

RAILROAD NOTES

—There has circulated a report of the sale of the Villa Izabel tramway for the sum of 3,000,000\$.

—The student Afonso Borges, accused of having burnt an Italian flag in S. Paulo, at the time of the protocol riots, has been acquitted.

—According to the muster rolls on the 31st of May the number of troops at that time engaged in the operations against Antonio Conselheiro was 6,861 officers and men.

—The new time table for the suburb trains on the Central Railway went into operation on the 1st inst. There are now 55 trains in each direction, though some of them do not stop at all the stations. The shortest interval between trains is 10 minutes and the longest one hour and a half.

—On the 1st inst. the shareholders of the Correo Paulistano held a meeting, and by a vote of 28 to 5 decided that the journal should support President Prudente de Moraes. In view of this decision, Dr. Herculan de Freitas, Congressman Glyceiro's son-in-law, resigned the position of editor-in-chief.

—In 1871 the United States had 45,000 miles of railway, with a capital and funded debt of \$2,700,000,000, with net earnings of \$50,000,000. This and with annual dividends of \$50,000,000. This country now has 180,000 miles of railway with a capital and funded debt of \$11,000,000,000, with net earnings of \$750,000,000 and with annual dividends of \$81,000,000. This shows an increase of about 300% in mileage and in capital and funded debt, 150% in net earnings and 62½% in dividends.

—At the general meeting of the shareholders of the Paulista Co., held in S. Paulo on the 30th ult., the president stated that the board of directors had received no definite proposal for the purchase of its railway, although it had been for some time negotiating with a syndicate, which may perhaps decide to buy it. He also said that all work for extending the road has been suspended, except on a section 29 kilometres long, which, beginning at Dous Corregos, passes along the Banharão mountains.

—A number of accidents have recently occurred on the Central Railway. On Thursday morning a train was derailed and ran into the station at Serra, killing the telegraph operator and the engine driver and one of the stokers of the trains, and wounding 8 other persons. Twenty head of cattle were killed, and the station building, the locomotive and 21 cars, also a considerable quantity of merchandise were all very much damaged. On the same day two men were run over and killed by trains, one near Juiz de Fora, and the other near Batagá. Near Engenho de Dentro, a police inspector was severely wounded by a train, and at 9 o'clock p. m. the body of a dead man was found on the track near the same station. On the following day there was a collision near the station of Nazareth and several persons were wounded. Near the station of S. Francisco Xavier, a man was run over and killed.

—The gross receipts of the Paulista railway amounted last year to 19,693,127\$477 against 17,333,811\$641 in 1895, the net receipts being 6,113,429\$550 against 7,138,761\$203. The dividend paid last year to the shareholders were 12% at the rate of 12%, and amounted to the sum of 5,637,134\$500. The sum of 476,295\$060 was carried to the reserve fund.

LOCAL NOTES

—Mass is said this morning at 9 o'clock at the Rosario Church for Admiral Saldanha da Gama.

—In 13 parishes of this city, in the first quarter of the present year, there were registered 3,528 births, of which 1,772 were of males and 1,756 of females.

—The Republica says that Dr. João Philippe, director of telegraphs, either through perversity or incompetence, does not make the slightest efforts to improve the telegraph service.

—The cricket match between the London & Brazilian and London & River Plate Bank will be played on Sunday next, July 11th, at the Paysandu grounds, commencing at 11 a. m. sharp.

—Custodio Serra, who, it will be remembered, killed Comendador Belaminio Pessoa de Mello in April 1896, was tried and acquitted on the 28th ult. By order of the judge he was sent to the lunatic asylum.

—In the first quarter of the present year there were registered in this city 3,370 deaths, of which 2,204 were of males and 1,166 of females. Ten men and fifteen women, among those who died, were reported to be 100 years old and upwards.

—On the 30th ult. the government decided to change the commander of the fortress of Santa Cruz. The resolution, which had not been made public, was executed on Saturday. The Paiz and Republica say that, when the new commander arrived at the fortress, the Benjamin Constant was cruising in the vicinity. This, of course, may have been a mere coincidence.

—Dr. Lauro Sodré, in his speech at Marshal Floriano Peixoto's grave, defended jacobinism and terror, which in his opinion uphold the institutions of the country. But of what benefit to a country are institutions that can be upheld only in such a way? We had supposed that it had long since been settled that the best institutions for a country are those which the people willingly accept, and not those to which only fear can induce them to submit.

—The executive committee of the party that supports President Prudente de Moraes is composed of the following members:—Senators Justo Chermont (Pará), Benedicto Leite (Maranhão), Rosa e Silva (Pernambuco), Porciuncula (Rio de Janeiro), Feliciano Penna (Minas Geraes), Leopoldo de Bulhões (Goyaz), Deputy Arthur Rios (Bahia) and Dr. Cerqueira Cesar (S. Paulo). The party will issue a manifesto and establish a newspaper.

—The police continues to investigate the disappearance of legal documents relating to the fictitious firm of Egnont Taveira & Co. At the hearing on Saturday, there was a quarrel between Dr. Roxo Lima, a lawyer, and Col. José Franklin, clerk of the 1st district court, who accused each other of being responsible for the disappearance of those documents.

—It is stated that some days before, on rua do Ouvidor, the former drew a revolver and pointed it at the latter, but was prevented by a bystander from firing.

—The following telegram has been sent to Julio de Castilhos by 17 army officers and military cadets:—"Eminent citizen Julio de Castilhos:—We salute the successor of the Marshall. Our country expects from you the supreme affirmation of the republican ideal. As soldiers we see in you the only political leader capable of maintaining the prestige of the army, which by its traditions and especially by its organization is the chief support of the Republic. Believing that the industrial system of the future and honorable peace consistent with national self-respect, depend on true patriots now subjected to such impolitic and ungrateful treatment, we, as soldiers and as republicans, see in you, on your birthday, the inflexible transformation of the consoling of the glorious work of Benjamin Constant."

—On last Tuesday the floriantistas celebrated the 2nd anniversary of the death of Marshal Floriano Peixoto by going in procession to his grave. On this occasion, as has always been the case in their demonstrations, military and official elements predominated, although the President of the Republic was not represented. Precautions were taken to maintain order; Fribergue Palace, it is stated, was garrisoned by 20 mounted policemen, and 40 foot police were held in readiness at the nearest station. There were slight disturbances on rua do Cattede and rua Marquez de Abrantes. One man was struck on the head with a club, and another was arrested. The war department, more tolerant than it was last November, when troops prevented ladies from entering the Paqueta cemetery with wreaths in honor of the heroic dead whose memory they cherish, made no attempt whatever to interfere with the floriantistas, who even made political speeches in the cemetery, attacking the government.

—The Club das Laranjeiras scored a great success at their Smoking concert on the 3rd inst. Mr. Massey presided, and nearly a hundred members and friends were present. The feature of the evening was the violin duet by Messrs. Benjamin and Jeronimo da Silva; their splendid performance fairly brought down the house. A solo on the flute by Mr. Porto Junior met with warm appreciation, and Mr. Savory, who, we regret to say, is leaving Rio, as usual delighted the audience with his Coster songs. The following gentlemen also took part in the programme and assisted in making the second smoking concert of the season one of the most successful ever held: Messrs. Stacey, Simmons, Livings, Ehrhardt, Unwin, Webb, Wheatley and the Rev. Irvine Crawshaw. At the close of the performance votes of thanks were accorded to the accompanists (Messrs. Savile and Oliveira) and to the chairman, and the proceedings wound up with God save the Queen.

ANTONIO CONSELHEIRO.

Telegrams received last week state that on the 25th ult. Gen. Savaget, who commands the government troops that marched through Sergipe, found a body of fanatics occupying a strong position at a place called Coorobó six miles from hours' fighting, in which the government troops lost 17 men killed and over 200 wounded, they succeeded in dislodging the fanatics, whose loss is not stated. Among the wounded were Gen. Savaget himself, 3 captains, 2 lieutenants and an ensign. Onofre's battalion, the 12th infantry, which is reported to have borne the brunt of the battle, is reported to have lost 12 men killed and 53 wounded.

On Wednesday telegrams received from Bahia stated that the main body of government troops under Gen. Arthur Oscar had won a decisive victory and had entered Camudos in triumph. The report has been circulated throughout the country and the journals have been flooded with accounts of rejoicings over the reported victory. These rejoicings, however, proved to be premature and on Saturday and Sunday the Paiz claimed to have learned from a private source that Gen. Arthur Oscar in three attacks which he had made on Camudos had lost over 1,000 men. Antonio Conselheiro's loss being, according to that journal, still greater.

President Prudente de Moraes has sent the following telegram to Dr. Campos Salles, president of the State of S. Paulo:

"We have not yet received an official account of the operations at Camudos. News is expected any moment, and the delay does not warrant unfavorable reports. No matter how great the obstacles may be, we consider certain the triumph of the legal forces."

Last night the government decided to make a statement in today's Diario Official. According to this statement Col. Medeiros had arrived at Monte Santo from Camudos with his brigade for the purpose of procuring ammunition and commissariat supplies. On the march he had been several times attacked by bands of fanatics.

The bombardment of Camudos commenced on the night of the 27th ult. Up to the 30th, when Medeiros left, there had been no decisive engagement. Gen. Savaget's army had succeeded in effecting a junction with that of Arthur Oscar. Notwithstanding the tenacious resistance of the fanatics, the government says that it expects news of a victory in a few days.

The Noticia and Paiz received telegrams yesterday stating that the government troops have been constantly harassed by bands of fanatics in ambush and have suffered heavy loss. The fanatics are reported to have captured a number of pack-mules loaded with ammunition and other supplies.

Col. Serra Martins is reported to have been severely wounded.

The Republica has received a telegram stating that the governor of Bahia has given orders for holding in readiness the police force in the capital. It adds that he is reported to wish to transfer the State government to the lieutenant governor, who, however, is said to be unwilling to take office.

COFFEE NOTES

—In 1895 France imported 142,156,372 kilos of coffee, of which 56,734,903 were from Brazil.

—A company of Americans has recently purchased 60,000 acres of coffee on the Rio Tinto, in the state of Oaxaca, Mexico, and will colonize the tract with several hundred American families.

—Experiments have been recently made with hot lat for drying coffee, and excellent results are reported. It is stated that freshly gathered coffee can be dried in this way in four hours and that the article thus prepared is superior in aroma, color and weight to coffee prepared by other processes.

BUSINESS NOTES

—There is much complaint against abusive fines imposed by supervisors of the stamp tax on tobacco and beverages.

—The minister of finance has refused to grant 6 months' extension of the time fixed for the presentation of landing certificates of merchandise transhipped by Messrs. R. F. Sears & Co., from Pará to Bolivia.

—In the United States, in 1870, the depositors in savings banks numbered a little over 1,600,000, and their deposits were \$550,000,000. Last year, there were over 5,000,000 depositors, whose deposits exceeded \$1,900,000,000.

—In 1895 the imports of France from Brazil amounted to 166,700,000 francs against 126,819,421 francs in 1894. The exports to Brazil amounted in 1895 to 120,124,139 francs against 85,845,250 francs in the preceding year.

—The building known as Villa Ruy Barbosa, at the corner of Rua dos Invalidos and Rua do Senado, is valued on the books of the Companhia de Saucamento do Rio de Janeiro at \$3,229,275\$109. The rent of the apartments into which this building is divided produced last year the sum of 218,819\$590.

—It is stated that the government has decided to take the Gloria market building offered to it by the Banco da Republica for 1,000,000\$. The building is said to have changed hands last year for a little over 500,000\$; but this statement has been contradicted.

—"The rapidity of the growth of exports of American manufactures," says the Washington correspondent of the New York Journal of Commerce, in a telegram of May 29, has been striking since 1893. The movement which began after the crisis of that year was supposed in many quarters to be temporary. The movement did not cease, however, with the fiscal year 1894 nor with 1895. The year 1896 showed a still ascending record."

FINANCIAL NOTES

—In the first half of the present year, the customs receipts at Bahia amounted to 10,503,152\$143 against 9,007,809\$709 in the corresponding period of 1896.

—A telegram states that the revenue collected by the State of Pará during the year ended on the 30th ult. amounted to 13,935,973\$288 against 11,011,421\$599 in the previous fiscal year.

—Although congress has now been sitting for two months, it has done nothing whatever to improve the financial situation of the country. It has not even begun to discuss the yearly appropriations with the exception of those for the department of foreign affairs.

—The following returns of customs receipts for the month of June have been made public:

EXCHANGE.

June 29.—Church holiday. June 30.—There was no change made in the official rates of 7½-7 1/16, and the market opened uncertain, with buyers for other than bank sterling being scarce. During the morning the rate for bank sterling was considered to be 7 1/16, although one of the banks refused money at this rate, but about 2 o'clock the news arrived that the government troops had settled the Canudos question, and the tone of the market changed at once. Bills came out freely at 7½, and were placed for a time, the banks drawing with some caution at 7 1/16, but just before the close rates hardened, and the last quotations were 7½ for bank and 7 1/16 for other bills. A very fair business was doing in the afternoon, and the extreme rates reported during the day were 7½-7 1/16 for bank and 7 1/16-7 1/8 for other bills. Nothing was reported in sovereigns on the street, and the Boisa closed without buyers, or sellers.

July 1.—The British Bank and the Banco da Republica opened at 7 1/2, which was posted later by the London & Brazil River Bank. The latter returned to 7 1/16 in the early afternoon, and this was the official rate during the day at the Brazilian and American Banks. The market opened firm with the banks drawing freely at 7 1/16, but a fair business doing in other sterling at 7 1/16, but about 1 o'clock there were signs of hesitation, the demand for bills at once increased, some of the banks refusing money at better than 7 1/16. Afterwards the demand declined, and at the close bank sterling was quoted at 7 1/16-7 1/32 and other bills at 7 1/16-7 1/32. The day was moderately active, the declared business comprising bank at 7 1/16-7 1/32 and other sterling at 7 1/16-7 1/32. Nothing was reported in sovereigns on the street, and the Bolsa closed with buyers at 3 1/8, no sellers.

July 2.—The London & River Plate, Brasilianische and Francaise Banks opened at 7 1/2, the others maintaining 7 1/16 during the day, but the delay in receiving advices from the Canadian expedition was commented on, and the market was undecided, and even weak. At first 7 1/16 ruled for a counter business only, and there were buyers at 7 1/16, rates then declining until the banks bought at 7 1/16, and 7 1/2 was the best to be had for bank sterling. During the afternoon there was a rather better feeling, and bank sterling was again to be had at 7 1/16, with business in other paper at 7 1/32, the market closing steady with other than bank sterling quoted at 7 1/16-7 1/32. The fluctuations in the market were not justified by the business reported, which comprised bank sterling at 7 1/16-7 1/32, and other sterling at 7 1/16-7 1/32. Sovereigns were quoted on the street at 3 1/8, the Bolsa closed with buyers at 3 1/8, sellers at 3 1/8.

July 3.—No changes were made in the official rates of 7 1/16-7 1/32, but the market was weak, and there was money for other than bank sterling at 7 1/32 from the opening. The banks continued furnishing small amounts at 7 1/16-7 1/32, but the market makers refusing liquidation money at 7 1/32 and this went into the streets with business done in the afternoon at 7 1/16-7 1/32, commercial sterling and the London & Brazil Bank posted 7 1/16. The close was not very reassuring; there were bank bills at 7 1/16, but they were not wanted, and other bills quoted at 7 1/16-7 1/32, it was supposed that a good deal of option business was liquidated by sellers, who have become disheartened, for 10,000 money seemed to appear, the declared extremes ranging from 7 1/16-7 1/32 for bank, and 7 1/16-7 1/32 for other sterling. Gold was sold at the Bolsa at 2 1/2-2 1/4, and sovereigns on the street at 3 1/8.

July 4.—The market opened weak with 7 1/32 posted at the banks, at which the counter business was weak, and there declined until 7 1/16-7 1/32, with plenty of money at the last quotation. The weakness of the banks sent buyers into the market, and the market makers refused to post at the banks, and business was done at this rate in other sterling. Then the Brazilian Bank showed some strength and furnished bills at 7 1/16, with business reported in other sterling at 7 1/32, but the other banks were indifferent, and the market flattened again, closing with bank at 7 1/16-7 1/32, and other sterling at 7 1/16-7 1/32. There was a good deal of movement, for the market was nervous, and the proportion of real business was small. Gold was sold at the Bolsa for August delivery, which was not reassuring. The Bolsa closed with buyers of gold at 2 1/2, and sellers at 2 1/4; nothing was quoted in sovereigns.

**MARKET REPORT.**  
Rio de Janeiro, 5th July, 1897.

**Exports.**  
*Coffee.*—The suspicious, mentioned in our last report, that business was imminent, have been fully anticipated, and although the declared sales will not reach 60,000 bags, the shipments for the week exceed 80,000 bags. A good deal of the coffee shipped was in anticipation, and it is therefore quite impossible to report what prices were paid, but for the daily business doing, from what we can learn very little. The market for No. 7 coffee has changed hands under 12,000 per arroba, and 12,000 probably about represents the quotation. A series of accidents on the Central railway, which interrupted the traffic on 2nd and 3rd inst, and the factors seemed inclined to squeeze dealers, who were thought to have contracted uncovered, but with the service again more or less in its normal condition, and the prospect of free supplies the tone of the market only improved, and coffee could probably be bought without difficulty at 12,000-12,500. Receipts here promised to be very large before the accidents on the railway, and even after these the increase over last week is about 10,000 bags, while in Santos the increase has been very large. It is generally conceded that a good proportion of new coffees are now arriving, and the anxiety of exporters in part attributed to this fact, although the difference in prices at present, and at the same time last year, is very marked.

On the 28th the reported sales were 12,000 bags, brokers quoting at the extremes of 12,000-12,500 for No. 7, and the market was steady at about 12,000, and on the following day 12,000-12,500 were considered the quotations, with about 13,000 bags sold. On the 29th no changes were made in brokers' quotations, and coffee was rather better, but without any change in the demand improved, and 12,000-12,500 were generally quoted, the market closing on Saturday at these quotations, but a little undecided, as the traffic on the railway had not been re-established. This morning we hear that factors show some animation, and are asking 12,500-12,800, which they have found buyers, but exporters have not yet shown any activity, for today is a holiday in New York.

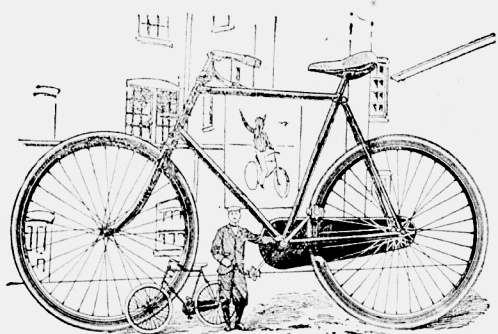
