—According to a telegram of the 8th inst. the United States Consul at Buenos Ayres, Mr. Baker, died on that day in consequence of the accident of which we gave an account in our last issue. —The Grand Jubilee Ball at Prince George's Hall in aid of the Victoria Convalescent Home in Buenos Ayres on the 30th ult. was a brilliant success. Almost every native family in the city was represented at the gathering, which was one of the largest that has ever assembled at the Hall. It is estimated that the sum thus obtained for that charitable purpose will amount, after all expenses are paid, to about four thousand dollars. In the present disturbed state of the country there is one class of citizens whose exemplary attitude cannot fail, we think, to win the admiration and approval of all impartial and thoughtful observers. We refer to those who directly or indirectly aided the federalist movement in Rio Grande do Sul and the naval revolution which began on the 6th of September, 1893.

The character of these two movements was essentially conservative, and their common purpose was to remove all cause of disturbance by relieving the country of the illegitimate and baneful pressure that has prevented the people from enjoying the benefits of self-government. Although they were not successful, they did not entirely fail, for the purpose by which they were guided has survived and is apparently about to be adopted by the powerful party that is organizing in defence of the President of the Republic.

Of the important events that are now occurring the ex-revolutionists are calm, but not uninterested, spectators. For the sake of the idea which inspired them they are, with rare exceptions, enduring with courage and cheerful resignation the manifold unmerited sufferings that are inflicted upon them by injustice, misrepresentation and detraction. Preserving in the midst of all political vicissitudes their autonomy and solidarity, they will, as soon as they become convinced of the sincerity and earnestness of the president's followers in espousing the cause for which they struggled and for which they continue to suffer, take the place, which rightfully belongs to them, in the front rank of the vanguard of the party.

GLYCERIO'S MANIFESTO

The manifesto of Congressman Glycerio, published in some of the journals of this city on Sunday, contains important disclosures. Prudente de Moraes, it appears, became very much disheartened and seemed to wish to withdraw from the presidential contest, being convinced that the election would not be permitted or that, if perchance it should be held, the candidate elected would not be allowed to take office.

Dr. Bernardino de Campos, then president of S. Paulo, and other prominent politicians were in favor of postponing the election, which, indeed, as we are led to infer, would not have been held on the 1st of March, 1894, had it not been for the tenacity of Glycerio himself and the prompt and timely action of Dr. Pedro Velho who was at that time governor of Rio Grande do Norte.

It is gratifying to be assured that we were not mistaken in supposing that the president has never been in harmony with the jacobins, whom, as Glycerio's manifesto shows, he thoroughly distrusts. It is no less gratifying to learn that he has always been friendly to the ex-revolutionists and that in 1895 he actually threatened, as was reported at the time, to resign unless congress voted the amnesty bill, whose restrictive clauses he moreover strongly opposed.

These disclosures are very interesting and would be still more so, if they were complete, for they would then show that President Prudente de Moraes was perfectly justified in thinking that there was a plot to prevent him from taking office.

Glycerio attacks Campos Salles, president of the State of S. Paulo, insinuating that the latter did not become a prudentista until he was promised that the presidents friends would make him his candidate at the presidential election to be held on the 1st of next March.

On the whole the manifesto will, we think, contribute to strengthen the confidence of the conservative classes in the president of the republic.

LEGISLATIVE NOTES

JULY 5.—Senate.—Considerable time was consumed in discussing the telegram to the Paiz from Buenos Aires.—Chamber of Deputies.—There was received a communication from the minister of justice in regard to the alleged espionage to which Vice-President Manoel Victorino is said to have been subjected. Deputy Barbosa Lima censured the government for not publishing news from the war in Bahia.

JULY 6.—Chamber of Deputies.—There was another trial of strength between the prudentistas and glyceristas, the former presenting as their candidate for 1st secretary Deputy Julio de Mello and the latter Deputy Theotonio de Brito. The vote was as follows:

Julio de Mello 83
Theotonio de Brito 85
Cornelio da Fonseca 1

The proceedings afterwards became disorderly and the sitting was suspended for 25 minutes. The bill appropriating the sum of 111,006,500 for arrears of pay for officers who had been illegally retired from the service by Marshal Floriano Peixoto was voted in 3rd discussion.

JULY 7.—Chamber of Deputies.—The prudentistas succeeded in electing their candidate for 1st secretary. The vote was as follows:

Theotonio de Brito 5
Blank 17

PROVINCIAL NOTES

—The Diario de Santos says that during the last six months no arms whatever have been received at that port from Buenos Aires.

—At Ouro Preto the superior court of the state of Minas Geraes is making preparations to remove to Bello Horizonte, the future capital.

—The report that Col. Carlos Telles will be presented by the adversaries of Julio de Castilhos as their candidate for governor of Rio Grande do Sul is once more circulated.

—We have to record another "eclipse of Brazilian civilization." On the night of the 4th inst. the printing-office of the Folha de Sergipe was attacked and destroyed.

—Judge Alcides Lima has again decided that Julio de Castilhos' jury law is unconstitutional, and Castilhos, it is stated, is again going to cause the judge to be prosecuted.

—Although Campos Salles carefully refrains from defining his position, his action has been favorable to President Prudente de Moraes, to whose support he is now, apparently, definitely committed.

—Gov. Luiz Viana denies that he intends to relinquish the government of Bahia, either permanently or temporarily. He contradicts the report of having asked the State legislature for a leave of absence.

—The commandant of the Ceará military school has resigned. In consequence of the mutiny for which the majority of the cadets have been detached from the school the number in attendance has been reduced to 65, of whom 32 are officers.

—In S. Paulo, Dr. Marcellin Xavier, who is described as belonging to a good family in that city, some days ago took a quantity of kerosene and after swallowing a part of it poured the rest on the clothing that she was wearing and set fire to it, thus putting an end to her life.

—On the 7th inst., in S. Paulo, Congressman Glycerio called a meeting of the members of the State executive committee and proposed that they should all resign so that the local committees might elect their successors. None of the members voted for the proposal except its author.

—On the 10th inst., the partisans of Congressman Glycerio, in the State legislature of S. Paulo, began to abandon their hitherto dubious attitude and to openly attack, not only the government of President Prudente de Moraes, but also that of Dr. Campos Salles, president of the State.

—At the election held on Sunday ex-Minister Alberto Torres was elected president of the state of Rio de Janeiro. At Campos there were some disturbances, Congressman Nilo Peçanha's father being pretty roughly handled. At S. João da Barra there was also a disturbance, the ballot-box being broken.

—We believe that the full text of Congressman Glycerio's speech in the State legislature of S. Paulo, has not been published. In some of the reports that we have seen he is said to have accused President Prudente de Moraes of ingratitude, hypocrisy and cowardice and to have asserted that the only true republicans are the Jacobins.

—A telegram received yesterday from S. Paulo states that Councillor Rodrigues Alves has telegraphed to Dr. Diño Bueno, contradicting the statement made in Congressman Glycerio's manifesto in relation to a mission to Dr. Campos Salles. This refers to the insinuation contained in Glycerio's message in regard to Campos Salles having declared himself a prudentista after receiving the offer to make him a candidate for the presidency of the Republic.

RAILROAD NOTES

—On the 7th there was another collision on the Central Railway.

—There are said to be 6,003 pieces in the modern high class locomotive.

—It is expected that up to the end of the month connection will be established between the Sapucahy and Mogiana railways.

—A telegram of the 7th inst. states that on the Chilian government railways robberies amounting to 2,000,000 pesos have been discovered.

—Decree No. 2539, of the 5th inst., authorizes the Companhia Bahia e Minas to transfer to the Banco Constructor the charter of the railway from Victoria to Pecanha.

—It is stated that planters residing in the vicinity of Campo Alegre, S. Paulo, intend holding a meeting for the purpose of asking for a reduction in freight rates on railways.

—In view of the reports that have been circulated in regard to the sale of the Paulista railway the secretary of the Rio Claro S. Paulo Railway Co. has stated that in the event of the purchase or expropriation of that railway the value of the 5% bonds, amounting to £ 2,722,500, which were issued to the latter company, must, in virtue of the terms of the deed of mortgage and of the bonds themselves, be immediately paid in cash at par.

COFFEE NOTES

—The coffee imported from Brazil into the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland for the 5 months ended May 31 was valued at £ 61,850 against £ 27,258 for the corresponding period of 1896.

LOCAL NOTES

—Senator Quintino Bocayuva is reported to be preparing a manifesto.

—The government has changed the commander of the fort of S. João.

—We learn that Mr. Conger, the new United States minister is expected to arrive here on the 24th inst.

—The Gazeta de Noticias very properly censures the violent and insulting language which congressmen have recently been using towards each other.

—Dr. Pedro Moacyr has telegraphed to his representatives in Porto Alegre to sue for slander the proprietor of the journal Federação, organ of Julio de Castilhos.

—The prudentistas deserved the reverse which they suffered in the chamber of deputies on last Tuesday. They should not have presented such a candidate as Julio de Mello.

—It is stated that the recent changes in the commanders of the forts at the entrance of the harbor are due to discoveries made in the investigation of the facts relating to the mutiny at the military school.

—The commanders of the torpedo boats Gustavo Sampaio and Silvado have been acquitted by the court-martial by which they were tried on account of the collision between those two torpedo boats.

—The minister of war probably smiled long and loud when he received Deocleciano Martyr's letter asking for arms for the battalion into which, as Deocleciano asserts, the Jacobin club has been converted.

—On Thursday throughout Brazil the Portuguese celebrated the fourth centennial of Vasco da Gama's celebrated voyage to India. In commemoration of the event they are subscribing to a fund for building a first-class war vessel, which they will present to the Portuguese government.

—On Friday the board of directors of the Associação Commercial adopted a motion congratulating the Portuguese residents in Brazil on the fourth centennial of the departure of Vasco da Gama's fleet from Lisbon for India.

—With Jacobins constantly howling at the president of the republic and congressmen howling at each other in the chambers amidst the howls of derision of the public, Smith says that the present political situation is a howling shame.

—The cricket match between The Club Brazileiro de Cricket and the United Banks will be played on Sunday next, July 18th, and as both sides are strongly represented everything points out to a tough struggle for victory. The match will start at 11 a. m. sharp.

—A captain and two ensigns of the police brigade were arrested on Thursday. These officers took part in the Jacobin demonstration on the anniversary of Marshal Floriano.

—The Pizil still endeavors to prove that arms have been shipped from Buenos Ayres to Santos and Bahia; but the Brazilian minister at Buenos Ayres contradicts the statement, and the customs authorities at Santos and Bahia say that no arms have been withdrawn at either of those places without the permission of the commanders of the military districts.

—The Jacobin press censures President Prudente de Moraes for holding in readiness the naval force at this port and the police and military garrison of the city. We think, however, that no candid and judicious person will hesitate to acknowledge that the government cannot, without loss of prestige and honor, fail to take all legal precautions in its power to prevent the recurrence of the disgraceful scenes that ensued after the defeat of Moreira Cesar.

—Congressman Coelho Lisboa states that the following exchange of courtesies took place in the chamber of deputies between him and Congressman Bueno de Andrada: —B. de A. :—«No one in S. Paulo has ever read a journal edited by Your Excellency.» —C. L. :—«What Your Excellency is saying is foolishness. I never was a journalist and Your Excellency's insult fails to reach me.» —B. de A. :—«Your Excellency is ill-bred.» —C. L. :—«Your Excellency is insolent and presumptuous. I say it here, and on no occasion will I say it elsewhere.» —B. de Andrada asserts that he then retorted:—«I am at Your Excellency's orders elsewhere as well as here.»

MARRIAGE

ESTILL.—JEAVONS.—On the 15th June, at St. Michael's, Bedford Park West, Harry George Estill, of Rio de Janeiro, to Edith Jeavons, of Bedford Park.

ANTONIO CONSELHEIRO.

From the mass of confused and conflicting reports that have been received from Bahia it is impossible to extract a connected and trustworthy account of what has occurred at Camudos, the stronghold of the fanatic Antonio Conselheiro.

It seems that the government troops have occupied and fortified a hill (known as Favella or Favilla) 2,500 metres (about a mile and a half) from Camudos, and that from that position they have been engaged in bombarding the town of the fanatics. It is stated that they have been constantly harassed by bands of Conselheiro's followers hidden in the neighboring woods. Many reports are circulated in regard to the respective losses, but, in our opinion, none of them are worthy of belief.

Among the army officers whose death is reported are Col. Phozoz Flores, commander of Moreira Cesar's old battalion of infantry (the 1st), which is said to be completely annihilated, and Col. Sacupira, the commander of the 12th.

Gen. Arthur Oscar, the commander of the government troops, is stated to have telegraphed to his wife that he will storm Camudos on the 20th inst.

The Jacobin press has published telegrams asserting that the soldiers are suffering for want of supplies; but in yesterday's Diario official the government asserts that Gen. Arthur Oscar has, from the beginning, been authorized to make the necessary contracts and other arrangements for obtaining everything that he requires and that up to the present he had not reported his inability to do so.

The government adds that on the 7th inst., Col. Medeiros and his brigade left Monte Santo for Camudos with 600 beesves and 150 pack-mules loaded with farinha and salt. Private telegrams, published in the Jacobin journals, say, however, that up to the 8th Medeiros was still at Monte Santo.

According to the government's statement there is an abundance of ammunition at Bahia, Queimados and Monte Santo.

To the latter place the governor of Bahia is rapidly sending reinforcements, 270 men having gone on one occasion and 150 on another. On the 11th inst. another force, said to be large, the number, however, not being stated, took the train for Queimadas.

Arthur Oscar is reported to have asked for reinforcements of regular troops, but the government does not appear to have received such a request, and it asserts that, on asking Col. Medeiros whether reinforcements are required, it was informed by him that he had received no instructions on the subject from the commander of the army.

THE DIAMOND JUBILEE CRICKET MATCH, RIO DE JANEIRO

THE OLD STAGERS VS. THE NEW CORNERS.

This match, which had been twice postponed, finally took place on the 4th July.

The weather was splendid, and there was a large attendance of spectators, amongst whom was noticed the venerable Visconde de Barbacena; and the fair sex was also strongly represented. Considerable care had been taken to prepare the ground for the occasion, there being a fine display of hanting, and a decoration of a more lasting description in the shape of a large V. R. painted on the side of the quarry, by the hand of an enterprising Britisher.

The pitch was everything that could be desired, hard and true, and at mid-day the Veterans, having won the toss, sent their opponents to the wickets—Messrs. Unwin and Wucherer facing the bowling of Messrs. A. Lopes and Wheatley.

In Lopes' first over he bowled Unwin, and on Reeves' joining Wucherer a long stand was displayed, during which very careful cricket was played.

A double change of bowling was tried, and with the score at 31 Reeves played on. Brooking was the next corner, and he made a long stay with Wucherer, who with the score at 46, was bowled by Morrissy by a carefully played 20. Brooking succumbed to a good ball from Wheatley, and the rest of the side was all out for 73, a result due in a great measure to the fine bowling of Morrissy, whose analysis read 8 wickets for 9 runs.

The Old stagers commenced batting at 3 o'clock, being represented by Messrs. Skeey and V. Lopes. The latter left with the score at 4, and was succeeded by Webb, the score being taken to 14, when Skeey was bowled by Conolly for 10. Morrissy did not stay long, and A. Lopes was unfortunately run out; but came more lively, the newcomer sending three successive hits to the pavillion, shortly after which he was well caught by Moura, at cover point, for 12, the score then standing at 37. The best stand of the innings was then made by Webb and Nicolson, the former retiring at 59, and giving place to F. S. Youle who with Webb raised the score to 66, when the latter was bowled by R. Two of the banks at Pará have decided to increase their capital.

Capitalists and merchants in Ceará speak of establishing a new bank in that city.

A telegram of the 7th inst. from Valparaíso states that 1,000 unemployed operatives have applied to the Brazilian consul for passage to Brazil.

The municipal government of this city is calling for tenders for furnishing 475 vehicles of various classes, 370 sets of single harness and 5 sets of double harness. These tenders will be received up to Oct. 2.

The state government of Pará has invalidated the contract with the Companhia Oriental de Imigração e Commercio for the introduction of Japanese immigrants into the State. In justification of this action it is alleged that the company has failed to perform in the time fixed in the contract the obligations which it assumed. It is said, however, that the company refuses to accept the decision of the government, against which it is stated to have brought a suit.

On last Wednesday Messrs. Arens Bros. of this city signed a contract for lighting Poços de Caldas with electricity.

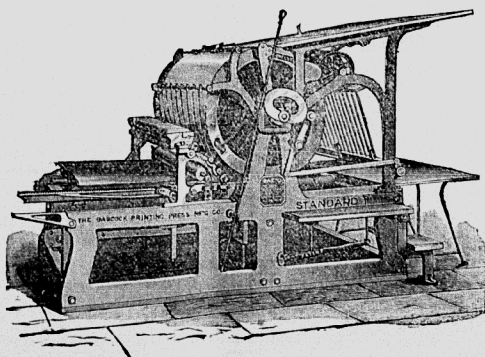

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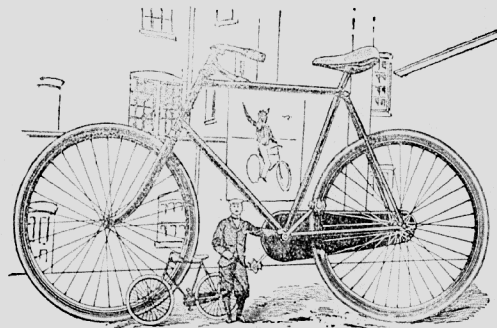


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
