WEST COAST ITEMS.

— A telegram of the 7th inst. states that in the Chilean province of Aconcagua unemployed laborers have been attacking and robbing houses.

— The commercial treaty, says the Valparaíso correspondent of the *Financial News*, recently signed at Rio de Janeiro between the Chilean Minister and the Brazilian Government has provoked a simultaneous demonstration of cordiality by the two nations in their respective countries that can only be accounted for by what is indeed an open secret—a secret clause or treaty of alliance between the two countries. The exact details have not been divulged, but it is understood that either country has engaged itself to go to the assistance of the other in case of foreign invasion. Whether, in the case of a war between Chile and the Argentine, assistance from the Brazilians would be of much utility to the former is open to doubt, as the Brazilian army is not much to be feared, although their navy comprises some good ships, which would prove a valuable adjunct to the navy, already very strong relatively, and well equipped and manned by far better drilled and trained sailors than that of the Argentines. On the other hand, intervention by Chile would always be an efficient check on any encroachment by the Argentines on Brazilian territory.

RIVER PLATE ITEMS

— It is stated the population of the Argentine Republic was, at the time of the last census, composed of 4,094,911 Argentines and 1,004,572 foreigners.

— A telegram received here last Saturday stated that in Uruguay an armistice of 15 days had been concluded between the revolutionists and government troops for the purpose of negotiating for peace.

— A telegram of the 18th inst. from Pelotas states that Aparicio Saravia and Lamas have been besieging Montevideo, but that they raised the siege on the approach of Villar. It is said that many wounded have arrived at Bagé.

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RIO DE JANEIRO, JULY 20th, 1897.

On last Saturday Hon. Thos. L. Thompson, having terminated his mission to this country, left on the steamer *Ionic* for Europe, whence, after visiting certain parts of the old world, he will proceed to the United States.

Of all the ministers who have been sent to Brazil by the government of the United States, there has never, we venture to assert, been one who has better comprehended the object of his mission than Mr. Thompson. And in making this assertion we think that, if other proofs were wanting, we should be fully justified by merely referring to the exhaustive report which, on the 23rd of last November, he forwarded to the Department of State, and which has been embodied in the publication on commercial relations issued by that department. This important document contains so much valuable information that, in our opinion, it should be printed separately and scattered broadcast among the manufacturers and other producers of the United States.

Under these circumstances, it must be acknowledged that Mr. Thompson thoroughly deserves the honorable tribute rendered to him by his countrymen residing in this city in the dinner which they offered him on last Tuesday and of which, in this issue of our paper, we publish a short account.

We are pleased to learn that the severance of Mr. Thompson's official connection with Brazil does not diminish his interest in the work of promoting the development of commercial relations between this country and the United States, and that after his return to the latter country he will continue to devote himself to this work. This is a praiseworthy undertaking in which, it is to be hoped, he will be thoroughly successful, thus accomplishing without solution of continuity the important object for which he has so strenuously labored.

The many friends whom Mr. Thompson and his family have made during their stay among us unite with us in expressing the deepest regret at their departure and in earnestly wishing them a safe and pleasant voyage.

LEGISLATIVE NOTES

JULY 12. Chamber of Deputies.— The debate on the army bill was begun.

JULY 13. Senate.— Several senators spoke in regard to the assault on Senator Porcuncula and much indignation was expressed.— Chamber of Deputies.— Deputy Barbosa Lima, in a speech on the army bill, said that the strength of the army in enlisted men (non-commissioned officers and privates) is now reduced to 74,320, of whom 3,642 have completed their term of service and are consequently entitled to be discharged. He offered an amendment providing for the execution of the conscript law and increasing from 1,200 to 2,000 the number of cadets at the military schools. He suggested that martial law should be declared in Bahia.

JULY 17, Senate.—Senator Ramiro Barcellos moved to inquire of the government what is the amount of outstanding exchequer bills issued during the present or other fiscal years. He pointed out the financial difficulties of the country, estimating at 200,000,000 the annual amount now required for the service of the national debt. Senator Severino Vieira said that the friends of the government are ready to unite with opposition in devising means for improving the financial situation of the country. **Chamber of Deputies.**—Deputy Nilo Peganha made two interesting declarations. One is that it is impossible for the opposition to carry on election in Brazil. The other is that, if he is killed, the leader of the party opposed to him will pay for it with his life. Deputy Glycerio renewed the suggestion made at a previous sitting by Deputy Barbosa Lima in regard to declaring martial law in Bahia. Deputy Coelho Cintra moved that the committee on legislation be instructed to report on the constitutionality of the tax of 6 1/2% on articles imported from Brazilian States, voted by the State legislature of Pernambuco.

PROVINCIAL NOTES

—The steamer *Brazil* with the 22d and 35th battalions of infantry on board reached Bahia yesterday.

—The persons accused of having taken part in the lynching of the Britos at Araraquara are to be tried on the 26th inst.

—Engineer Alexandre Haag, who had obtained a writ of habeas-corpus from the supreme court was indicted in Pará on last Saturday.

—The *Gazeta do Rio*, at Campos, has suspended publication, alleging that it has no security for the printing-office or for the lives of its editors and employes.

—The executive committee of the partido republicano federal of S. Paulo has published a manifesto in answer to that of Congressman Glycerio. The committee severely censures the jacobins.

—At the Porto Alegre military school there was a fight on the 12th inst. between Prudentists and Glycerista cadets. Two were severely wounded. It is stated that the majority of cadets are prudentists.

—It is asserted that the governor of Ceará has decided to support the policy of President Prudente de Moraes. The governor of Pará is supposed to continue to maintain a conciliatory attitude towards both prudentists and glycerists.

—Dr. Miranda Azevedo is reported to have said in a speech which he made last Saturday in the S. Paulo chamber of deputies that he has reason to believe that Congressman Glycerio's protestations of being in harmony with Marshal Floriano Peixoto's policy are not sincere. This corresponds to what we have been informed from other sources. In fact we have heard it said that Glycerio's tenaciously opposed the plan establishing a permanent dictatorship. For this, of course, he deserves credit, though it does not exempt him from blame for his present conduct. A man deserves unqualified praise only when he is persistent in wrongdoing.

RAILROAD NOTES

—Decree No. 2,547, of the 12th inst., annuls the contract signed on the 17th of July, 1891, for a railway between Paraty and Iguaçu.

—It is stated that the government does not intend to buy the railway of the Companhia Melhoramentos do Brazil unless it finds it necessary to do so in order to facilitate the lease of the government railways. The representatives of a French syndicate are said to be engaged in examining the road.

LOCAL NOTES

—On the 12th inst. there was a mutiny at the sergeants' school, from which 88 of the mutineers have been detached.

—In view of the departure of Gen. Girard for Bahia, Gen. Pego has been appointed commander of the military school in this city.

—We have the pleasure of informing our readers that the police delegate at Paqueta has been dismissed. This official had rendered himself very obnoxious.

—The prominent part taken by Vice-President Manoel Victorino in the demonstration in honor of Congressman Glycerio on last Tuesday has excited considerable discussion in the press.

—The *Noticia* was informed yesterday that the foranista students of the Polytechnic school would hold a meeting to day for the purpose of nominating Julio de Castilhos as their candidate for the presidency of the republic.

—Col. Torres Homem has been dismissed from the command of the military school at Porto Alegre and appointed director of the military colony of Iguaçu. His successor in the command of the school is Col. Joaquim Martins de Mello.

—It was reported last week that a man had been arrested at Friburgo palace and sent to one of the fortresses for attempting to assassinate the president of the republic. The papers have been discussing the report, but not much light has yet been thrown on the subject.

—Up to Saturday the sum of 10,000\$ had been collected on the three streets of Ovidor, Uruguyana and Carioeca and the largo da Carioeca for the purchase of the war vessel that is to be offered to the Portuguese government in commemoration of the voyage of Vasco da Gama.

—It is to be hoped that the suggestions of Glycerio and Barbosa Lima in regard to declaring martial law in Bahia will be peremptorily rejected. So many abuses have been committed in this country under cover of martial law that it is evident that the provision permitting it is incompatible with free institutions, and it should consequently be expunged from the constitution.

—On the 12th inst. senator Porcinucula, while on his way from Petropolis, was suddenly assaulted by one Cicero Peganha, who struck him on the head with a cudgel, knocking him down. The senator who was unconscious for 20 minutes, was taken to his house on rua Silveira Martins, the assailant being arrested. The latter, who is a naval pharmacist, is a brother of congressman Nilo Peganha.

DEATH.

—On the 17th inst., at Las Palmas, James Clark, eldest son of George Clark, Kilmarnock, Scotland, aged 31 years.

MR. THOMPSON'S DEPARTURE.

Mr. Thompson, the United States minister, and his family, who left Saturday on the departure of many proofs of the esteem and friendship that is felt for them here.

—One of the most conspicuous of these proofs was the dinner offered to Mr. Thompson on Tuesday at Hotel Brito by American gentlemen residing in this city.

—On this occasion Mr. Thompson, in response to a toast, made a short but eloquent address, expressing his thanks for the distinction conferred upon him and alluding to his diplomatic work, to his efforts to promote the advancement of American interests and to the cordial relations that he has always maintained with the Brazilian government and with his colleagues of the foreign diplomatic corps in this country.

—"I came to Brazil four years ago a tyro in diplomacy," he said, "and I am now more than a novice on leaving it; but it has been a source of great satisfaction to find myself, when dealing with the serious questions we have had to consider, generally in accord with my highly esteemed colleagues."

—Mr. Thompson then paid a glowing tribute to Brazil, which he described as a great and wonderfully endowed country, and referred with warm and natural enthusiasm to his own home in the land of roses and to the great city through whose golden gate the traveler passes on his way to a land of sunshine and flowers.

—To the friends who surrounded him and to others who were absent he bade an affectionate farewell, giving expression to his earnest hope of meeting them all again at no distant day.

—On Friday, at 3:30 p. m., Mr. Thompson and his family went on board the *Jonic*, where they were visited by a large number of friends.

—The steamer left port on the following day at 6 o'clock a. m.

ANTONIO CONSELHEIRO.

Although during the past week many vague and absurd reports have continued to circulate in regard to affairs in Bahia, we are now able to give a connected account of what took place up to a certain date.

—It seems that after the fight at Cocorobó the troops under Gen. Savaget continued to advance, constantly harassed, however, by bands of fanatics, who inflicted on them heavy loss.

—On the 27th ult. they arrived in sight of Camudos, and on this day their loss was very heavy; Col. Saucupira being one of the officers killed.

—On the following day Gen. Savaget had begun to bombard Camudos when he received instructions to march to the assistance of Gen. Arthur Oscar the commander-in-chief, whose troops, surrounded by bands of fanatics who had captured part of their ammunition and other supplies, were in a critical position.

—At 11 o'clock a. m. the junction was effected and at 6 p. m. part of the supplies were recovered. It is stated, however, that the whole of the sanitary stores and 45,000 cartridges remained definitely in the hands of the fanatics.

—The government troops afterwards, as we stated in our previous issue, occupied and fortified the hill of Pavella, whence they bombarded the town of Camudos.

—The loss of the government troops in their engagements was variously estimated. In a statement published by the government in the *Diario Official* it is said to be between 650 and 700. According to another account 50 officers and 300 men were killed and 50 officers and 400 men wounded. A telegram to the *Folha da Tarde* says that there were reported to be 800 wounded at Pavella. Mretra Cesar's old battalion (the 7th) is said to be reduced to 65 officers and men; but there has been published no statement of its loss discriminating the killed, wounded and missing. Among the officers killed were Cols. Saucupira and Thomaz Flores.

—In addition to the losses incurred in battle, disease is contributing on a considerable scale to thin the ranks of the government troops. At the hospital at Geremoabo there were reported to be, some days ago, 126 patients and at that of Monte Santo 230.

—Under these circumstances the government deemed it advisable to send more troops to Bahia and accordingly issued orders for the departure of the 22nd and 24th battalions of infantry, which formed a part of the garrison of this city, and the 35th, which was stationed at Niteroi. The 24th left on Thursday on the steamer *Imperiana* and the 22nd and 35th on Friday on the steamer *Brazil*. The three battalions are said to number about 1,250 officers and men. Seven soldiers deserted from the 24th battalion as it was marching through the city. Several officers have failed to go with their commands and have been arrested.

—The three battalions form a brigade under the command of Gen. Girard.

—One of the peculiarities that have been noted by foreigners in regard to Brazilian troops is that whenever they are transferred from one point to another they are nearly always accompanied with a large number of women and children. This was prohibited on the present occasion, much to the disappointment of soldiers' wives, three of whom leaped into the bay in endeavoring to follow the 24th battalion and were with difficulty saved from drowning. We learn that the government has taken steps for providing for these families.

—With the 22nd battalion there went 50 recruits, and the jacobin journals say that the press-gang is actively at work.

—It is reported that the 13th, 17th and 29th battalions of infantry, now in the state of Rio Grande do Sul, will also be sent to Bahia.

—For garrison duty in this city it is stated that two battalions of the national guard will be called into active service.

—One of the Bahia journals has recently published a list of the leaders who are styled by command Conselheiros's followers. The commander-in-chief, it is stated, is a retired officer of the Italian army.

—It has been reported that the government intends causing Gen. Arthur Oscar to be superseded by Gen. Barbosa; but the report has been contradicted.

—Gen. Arthur Oscar is said to have telegraphed to his wife that he may not storm Camudos to day as he had expected to do.

—On Sunday the Pernambuco correspondent of the *Journal do Brazil* telegraphed to that paper that the last telegram that Arthur Oscar's wife has received from her husband was dated the 13th and that the last letter she had received from him was dated June 21st. A week ago she had telegraphed to him, but had not, up to Sunday received an answer. Knowing, however, how busy he is, she felt no uneasiness.

—It is not yet certain that Col. Meleiros has reached Camudos with supplies from Monte Santo. In regard to this we find the following telegram from Bahia in the yesterday's *Paz*: —We are unable to give any information in regard to the alarming rumors which since yesterday have been circulating in regard to the column under Col. Meleiros. There is great anxiety to learn whether the provisions and ammunition in charge of that column have safely arrived at Pavella. It was reported to-day that they had arrived and that preparations are made at Monte Santo to send more.

—A telegram from Quimadas in yesterday's *Noticia* states that Arthur Oscar had telegraphed for farinha, rapadura, coffee, tobacco and soap, all of which would be sent to-morrow.

CRICKET.

On Sunday, 11th inst., at the Paysandu ground, a match was played between teams of 12 a side, representing the London and Brazilian and London and River Plate Banks.

The weather was everything that could be desired, and the game proved of an interesting and eventually exciting description.

The London and Brazilian Bank winning the toss, took first innings which realised 52. Millions 19, Brooking 11 and Allen 8, being top scorers.

The most successful bowlers for the London and River Plate Bank were Conolly 4 for 18, and Pritchard 3 for 3.

After lunch, quite a jubilee procession was witnessed, the 12 representatives of the London and River Plate Bank contributing 10 runs between them, the innings amounting with the aid of extras to 13.

Brooking 6 for 3, and Mawson 5 for 7 were responsible for the downfall.

—The *Diario Official* of last Friday contained executive decree N.º 2,535, of June 28, 1897, permitting The S. Paulo Coffee Estates Company to operate in Brazil.

BUSINESS NOTES

—London cabmen collectively earn about £ 2,500,000 a year.

—In Paris there are over a thousand professional fortune tellers.

—Nearly £ 1,000,000 worth of patent medicines are exported from the United Kingdom each year.

The receipts of India rubber at Manaus amounted from July 1, 1896, to May 31, 1897, to 11,104,720 kilograms officially valued at \$8,837,760.

During the 5 months ended May 31 the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland exported to Brazil cotton fabrics valued at £ 498,148 against £ 711,431 in the corresponding period of 1895.

A special correspondent of the London Times estimates at £ 24,500,000 the value of the exports of Brazil for the year 1896-97. This barely exceeds two thirds of the amount of the estimate of Mr. Glyn, president of the London and Brazilian Bank.

Up to the 30th ult. the number of cattle slaughtered at the River Plate and Rio Grande saladeros compared with the previous years was as follows:—

The Companhia Mineira de Electricidade at Juiz de Fora has declared for the half year ended June 30 a dividend at the rate of 7% per annum. The capital of the company is \$800,000 and among its assets are the following:—

Generating plant, 182,335,630; Machinery, 354,557,601; Wires and poles, 105,618,697; Distributing station, 51,679,520; Telephone plant, 47,604,520.

In an article on the delegates from South America to the opening of the Philadelphia Commercial Museum the New York Journal of Commerce says:— "Our South American friends will find here a business community that knows that already our exports of manufactured goods to their countries are considerable and are increasing; we desire them to observe how large is the list of commodities that we can sell to them in competition with Europe; we desire to convince them that without coercive legislation, and with a single eye to their own advantage, more of their buying might be done in this country; and they will find in this city a deep conviction that special discriminations against the exports of their countries are a passing freak of United States customs legislation, and that the sentiment of American business men is fast moving in the direction of breadth of view and liberality of practice, and the political action of the United States cannot permanently lag far behind the mature and intelligent opinion of its merchants and its manufacturers."

FINANCIAL NOTES

In the quarter ending June 30 the receipts of the Campina post office amounted to \$503,253.19 and the expenses to \$378,515.69.

The new bonds which the State government of Sergipe has issued in payment of current expenses are said to be circulating in that State as money at a discount of 20%.

Returns from 23 custom-houses show that their receipts for the first half of the present year amounted to \$22,904,676.62 against \$22,464,041.18 in the corresponding period of last year and \$39,746,614.18 in the first half of 1895. These returns include the important custom-houses of Rio de Janeiro, Santos, Parã, Pernambuco, Bahia, Rio Grande do Sul, Porto Alegre and 16 others of less importance.

On 14th inst. the Diario Oficial of Aracaju announced that a subscription for bonds issued by the State government of Sergipe had been opened. These bonds consist of the following: 300,000 \$500 reis each; 1,500,000 of \$500 U.S. coin; 30,000 of \$2000 U.S. coin; 1,000 of \$2000 U.S. coin; total \$580,000 bonds amounting to \$20,000,000, which are offered to the public at 95% of their nominal value. It is stated that there have been no subscribers to the loan and that the State government, whose treasury is said to be empty, is using the bonds for paying current expenses.

EXCHANGE

July 13.—The market was uncertain, and the business done was principally in liquidations that left losses to those interested. Two of the English banks opened at 7 1/16, but soon joined the others at 7 1/8, and this was official until the afternoon when the London & Brazilian Bank posted 7 1/16, and was accompanied by the British Bank later. In the morning the banks refused to buy under 2 1/2, and business was done, but when they showed disinclination to continue, and some were furnishing bills at 2 1/2, the money market was investigated in other sterling at 7 1/8, and rates flattened, the market closing with bank at 7 1/16, and others bills quoted at 7 1/8.

July 13.—There appeared to be a fair business doing, as the declared rates of 7 1/16 for bank, and 7 1/8 for other sterling. Nothing was reported in sovereigns on the street, and the market closed without buyers, or sellers.

July 14.—Holiday. July 15.—The London & Brazilian and British banks opened at 7 1/16, and the others posted 7 1/8, these rates ruling officially all day. Although bank was up to 7 1/16, there were buyers for other paper up to this rate in the morning, and it was said, among the banks, but 7 1/16 was virtually the rate for business, and the market closed with money to advance rates on the 13th, failed, the bears did not succeed in weakening the market to day, and the day was very quiet at the extremes of 7 1/16 for bank and 7 1/8 for other sterling. The Bolsa closed with buyers of sovereigns at 32 1/2 on the street in 1894 was quoted.

July 16.—The banks all posted 7 1/16, and the market opened firm, with bank readily obtainable at 7 1/16, and other sterling offered at 7 1/8, at which business was done, buyers' option for the end of the month, and 7 1/16 was considered the rate. There was a good deal of animation, and the tendency seemed upward, the option business offering and closed at 7 1/16, and so-called repassed bank came out at 7 1/8. Some money then appeared, and the banks showed ready disposition making conditions for transactions, but just before the close the tone improved, and the last quotations were 7 1/16 for bank and 7 1/8 for other sterling. Nothing was reported in sovereigns on the street, but 2 1/2 gold pieces sold at 74 1/2 on the 13th, there were neither buyers, nor sellers of sovereigns.

July 17.—The market opened firm, without change in the official rate of 7 1/16, but with all the English banks drawing at 7 1/16, and other than bank sterling was offering at 7 1/8, with 7 1/16 the rate for business, although some of the banks talked for 7 1/16. Later, however, some money appeared at 7 1/16, and rates flattened, with business reported in other London & Brazilian and British banks were drawn at 7 1/16, it was thought with a bank, but the London & Brazilian and British banks were drawn at 7 1/16, and the day closed with a better feeling at 7 1/16 for bank and 7 1/8 for other sterling. There was excitement in the market, the small transactions reported comprising bank sterling at 7 1/16-7 1/8, and other bills at 7 1/8-7 1/16. The tendency of the market was not altogether unfavorable for an advance in rates, what is lacking seems to be some concerted action on the part of the banks.

July 18.—For the third day, which is worth noting at present, the official rate of 7 1/16 was unchanged at the banks. The market opened steady, for if there was some hesitation on the part of the banks in furnishing bills at 7 1/16, this rate was to be had somewhere all day, and in the same manner other bank sterling found money at 7 1/8, at which the banks sometimes bought, and afterwards refused, while at 7 1/16 there was little difficulty in selling. The London & Brazilian Bank, however, steadily refused to buy during the day. There was a moderate business reported, done entirely by brokers, who had commercial dealings, and the declared rates were 7 1/16 for bank and 7 1/8 for other sterling. The market closing without change in rates, but slightly better in tone, for the banks were drawing bills at 7 1/16. The Bolsa closed without buyers, or sellers of sovereigns, and on the street gold was quoted at 39 1/2.

MARKET REPORT

Rio de Janeiro, 14th July, 1897.

Exports.—Coffee.—As was expected the business doing for the United States has been very moderate, and the scarcity of the better grades has restricted foreign purchases, but the declared sales for the week are reported on Friday and Saturday, while the market has only very slightly declined. Dealers have generally been "bears" under the influence of the low prices of the exports, and the present stock is supposed to be nearly all in the factors' hands, who have been showing a good deal of confidence notwithstanding the pressure resulting from the continued free receipts here and in Santos, and the total absence of demand on the part of the American roasters, who are suspected of holding off here, under the expectation of purchasing a part of the shipments made to the United States early in the month. There are coffee contracts for that have not yet been declared, and some "exporting" the market was evident on Saturday, when exporters' ideas were supposed to be about 12¢ per arroba, or No. 2, whether coffees changed hands at this price we do not know, but it was certainly under the views of the majority of the dealers and brokers quoted No. 2 at 12¢-12 1/2¢, and on the 14th the quotations were reduced 12¢-12 1/2¢, while the reported sales reaching 8,000 bags, on the 14th, in sold, and the market was steady, with 12¢-12 1/2¢ the sales were 10,000 bags, and brokers were quoted at 12¢-12 1/2¢, while dealers' ideas were generally about 12¢. This morning there is a good deal of business doing between factors and dealers, about in the basis of 12¢, and the exporters are expected to show more animation during the present, than they showed in the past week.

Santos has ruled steady without great animation, and the reported sales are about 100,000 bags, good averages were quoted unchanged at \$500 per 100 kilos, until the 14th when it was advanced to \$500, but on the 17th \$500 was quoted, with the market strong, and the telegrams reported some talk of frost in the interior of the state of S. Paulo. During the five working days of the week receipts were 10,212 bags, against 11,436 bags for the preceding week; shipments 20,000 bags for the United States and 50,000 bags for Europe, and the stocks on Saturday evening were estimated to be about 340,000 bags.

Imports.

Moderate supplies of most articles have been received during the week, and the markets are generally steady, although the movement still drags. The receipts of flour are insignificant, and there appears to have been but little animation; quotations have, however, been advanced, and the market closed firm, with a better demand. The supplies of codfish, lard, tallow and rice are fair, and all are steady, without any great change in prices. A cargo of Pitch pine and a moderate shipment of White have arrived, the markets remaining unchanged. A fair quantity of kerosene has also come in, without affecting dealers' quotations. Turpentine and cement are dearer, the supply of the latter is considerable, and resin is unchanged without receipts. Indian corn is higher, and the market has an upward tendency, but bran and hay show no changes worthy of note. The exchange market has continued in the same doubtful position. An attempt to advance rates on the 14th failed, and did also an attack by the "bears" on the 15th, and since the latter failure the market has been rather quiet without serious fluctuations. It is curious that there is a general opinion that rates are too low, while no one seems inclined to back to this opinion.

Flour.—Receipts are 2,000 bags or 2,000 bbls per Assada from the River Plate. There does not seem to have been much animation for stocks are about where we left them last week, but the market has been firm, and quotations are advanced 75¢ per bbl. for American, and 25¢ for River Plate and native. Stocks are now estimated to be about 4,000 bbls of which 2,000 bbls American and 2,000 bbls River Plate in first hands, and the quotations furnished us are:

White Pine.—Receipts are 38,601 feet per W. H. Starbuck from New York. Last quotation of 24¢ per 100 feet is unchanged.

Swedish Pine.—There have been no receipts and quotations are nominal.

Spruce Pine.—There is nothing to report.

Kerosene.—The receipts have been 10,000 cases per W. H. Starbuck and Gallo from New York. Brokers last quoted American oil at 45¢-50¢ per case, and native refinery at 45¢-50¢ per case.

Turpentine.—Receipts are 100 cases per Gallo. We may now quote at 15¢-18¢ per kilogramme.

Rosin.—Receipts nil, and dealers' quotations are unchanged at 25¢-30¢ per bbl. according to quality.

Cement.—The Serra brought 17,214 bbls. from Antwerp. Some qualities are considerably higher, and dealers are now quoting British at 17¢-20¢, Belgian and German at 18¢-20¢ and French at 18¢-20¢ per bbl.

Indian Corn.—The receipts are 10,000 bags per Assada from Buenos Aires. The market is firm, with brokers quoting River Plate at 85¢-90¢ per bag; dealers' quotations are 85¢-90¢ for River Plate and 75¢-80¢ for native corn, per bag.

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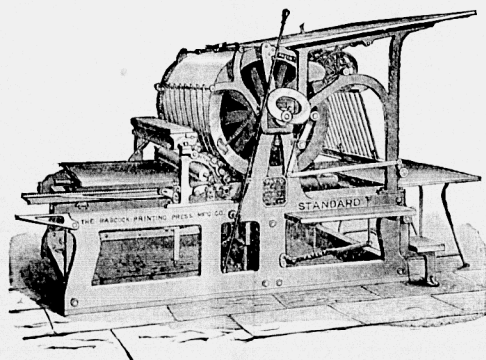
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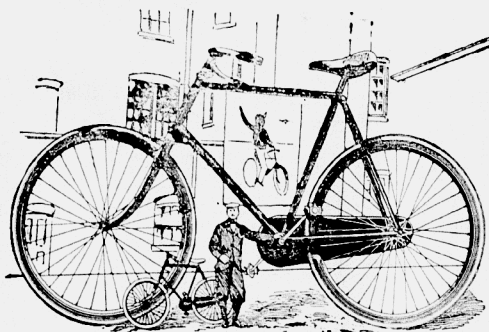
