#### RIVER PLATE ITEMS.

—The Argentine government has granted a railway concession from Parana to the Brazilian frontier to Messrs. Garrido & Co: A grant of thirty leagues of land goes with the concession.

—Telegrams from Buenos Aires last week state that enormous clouds of locusts are threatening the cultivated districts. The government has appropriated \$300,000 for the destruction of the insects.

—The September receipts of the Montevideo custom-house were \$722,944.92, which are below those for September of the three preceding years, but are an improvement on those of the five preceding months.

—Mr. C. Akers, special correspondent of the London Times, who has been some five months in the River Plate, left for the West Coast on Saturday. He will remain in that part of the world about a year, visiting Chile, Perf, Bolivia, and some of the Central American republics.—Montevideo Times.

—The department of public gardens has not been idle during the winter. About 16,000 trees were planted along avenues and in plazas and more than \$5,000 in Palermo park. It has, besides, given a great number of plants to hospitals and public institutions, amounting in all to more than 111,000 trees and shrubs.—

—The Rosario branch of the London and River Plate Bank has been robbed of \$147,000 by its subcashie, Frederick Shaw, who has been taking out money for the last three years and concealing it by means of false cheques, entries and balances. He says he took the money to loan to his brother. Herbert Shaw, who was always asking him for money. Fearing detection, he finally confessed to his father, who at once advised the manager. Both brothers are under arrest.

—Feeling towards the United States on the part of Argentines has not been of the most cordial, for it is felt that the Dinglety tariff with its burdens upon hides and wool, is an unworthy return for the attempt which Argentines made to offer large profits and quick returns to the North American republic. Our finance minister, with the hearty support of our amateur economists, will probably place taxes upon North American produce, for the sake of proving, even at a scriffice, that he believes in reciprocity.—M. Andrew's Gazette.

—Professor Brunner is in Paraguaya. He proposes to take a trip across the Paraguayan Chaco to Bolivia, conditions permitting, with the idea of noting whether the locusts have any particular breeding ground in that direction, as is asserted. The journey will take three months. Mr. Oliver C. James' estancia at Carcarafia is still his head quarters for experimenting with caged locusts and cultivating locust diseases. #### WEST COAST ITEMS.

—The prospects for cereal and fruit crops in Chili are said to be very promising.

—The question of electric traction and lighting in Santiago may be considered as settled. The Valparaiso corporation has been empowered to grant the use of the streets for electric traction for a term of thirty years.—Chilian Times.

—The Chilian Times of the 15th ult, says that Chili "is entering upon an era of determined protection for native industries," and that "rolling stock to the value of 1,500,000 dollars, to include locomotives and cars, is to be built in the country." It is a bad outlook for the taxpayer as well as for commerce.

#### PROTECTION IN CHILI.

PROTECTION IN CHILL.

As was to be expected from the well known activity and energy, coupled with a large amount of technical knowledge, of the actual incumbent of the portfolio of the ministry of industry and public works, this department of state has been unusually active since he entered upon the duties of his office just three weeks ago to-day. A few days after his appointment to give protection to native industries in a decree, the first clause of which prescribes that all articles required for the railways in operation, for those in course of construction, for those under survey, for public works, establishments and sections subordinated to the department of industry and public works, shall be acquired by public tender, subject to certain conditions calculated to protect and promote native industries. It is stipulated in these conditions that (1) home made articles shall be considered equal in price to foreign made although as much as ten per cent. more be demanded for the former; (2) that the difference conceded in the previous condition shall be fifteen per cent, in the case of home made articles manufactured from native raw material; and (3) that an excess of time shall be granted to home manufacturers. By clause 3 it is provided that tenders stipulating for payment in foreign money and delivery in bond will not be taken into consideration; and in clause 4 it is provided that the heaves of the director of public works requesting permission to order from abroad certain duplicate pieces for locomotives, the minister gives the director instructions to provide that whenever, owing to exceptional circumstances, it may be necessary to order articles from abroad, authority to do so must be obtained from the department. In another decree, in reply to a note of the director instructions to provene certain pieces from abroad, and to order the remainder, in proportionate quantities, from three Valparaiso firms, This decree furnished the minister with another opportunity to affirm the determination of the governme

He would despatch the vessel quite in order. The captain had no objection, the consul could despatch away, but, to despatch away, the articles and register of the ship were required. That, it appears, was a horse of another color. Those official documents were American property and American property is not to be trifled with. Her captain talked big, precisely as American captains can do, but the Brazilian consulf alked bigger, as Brazilians can do. Diplomatic questions were threatened, the United States minister being requested to take up the question on behalf of the American flag detained in port by unwarranted exactions of Brazilian officials. It became evident that Uncle Sam would not bow to the only claim that Brazilian consulate can put foward, i.e. commiscation for abject imbecility. Uncle Sam might have deferred without fosing any dignity. The final result is that the vessel is still delayed and no solution will be arrived at until to-day.

#### ARGENTINE TRADE

The exports from the United States to Argentina exceeded \$3,000,000 in the last fiscal year preceding the collapse of Raring Brothers, and immediately thereafter fell to less than 3,000,000. Year by year, however, there has been some improvement, and the total value of our exports to that country in 1896 was very close to \$6,000,000, and in 1897 it was \$6,384,984. In spite of this small increase the value of agricultural implements sent to Argentina was only \$415,312, or a little less than half the value of the same item in 1896, and the figures of 1896 have been very much exceeded. A bad wheat harvest in Argentina has evidently impaired the buying ability of the farmers, but a fair crop is expected this year, and they feel better prices there as well as here. The carriages and cars and parts thereof sent to Argentina last year were worth close to \$150,000, more than three times as much as theyear before. The value of cotton cloths sent to Argentina exceeded a quarter of a million dollars in each of the last two years. Bicycles to the value of \$2,000 were exported last year. We sent to Argentina last year hardware, saws, tools, sewing machines and general machinery to the value of \$21,000 were exported last year. We sent to Argentina last year hardware, saws, tools, sewing machines and general machinery to the value of \$41,031,137. If we are as anxious, as we pretend to be, to develop our trade with South America, Argentina is peculiarly worthy of our best efforts. What we have done is to impose duties on wool and lindes, the chief exports of the country, and in his message to congress last April President Uribura intimated that if diplomatic negotiation did not secure for the republic some concessions it would be necessary to retaliate.

The proposal to inaugurate an American exposition in this capital next year, is one which merits more than a passing consideration. There was a time when an exposition of this character could not fail to afford great benefit when an exposition of this character could not fail to afford great benefit, but we are not at all sure of such a benefit now. The times are changing, and the frequency of these exhibitions has sapped them of both novelty and influence. However, some good can be secured if the right means are employed to that end. Seading out goods to the care of irresponsible adventurers is certainly not such a means. If the exposition is to be made an object lesson, it must be under the control of capable and experienced business men, and it should be run on strict business principles. We are not in favor of the elaborate scheme of exemptions which has been laid before the federal and municipal legislatures, for it smacks too much of sharp practice. It is fair enough to ask that legitimate exhibits be admitted free of duty, but the exemption should be subjected to exactly the same limitations, restrictions and penalties which the United States imposed moon the exations, restrictions and penalties which the United States imposed upon the exhibits sent to the Chicago exhibition. Beyond that no American can honestly go. He should be ready and willing at all times to submit to the same penalties which he imposes upon foreigners. If he does not wish to do this, then he must submit to the charge of insincerity and unfairness. His object in coming here is simply one of ordinary business, one of private gain. He can therefore present no valid claim for exceptional favors, such as exemption from federal and municipal taxation. As a business undertaking, the exposition should pay taxes and expenses just the same as any other private business venture. Assuming that this will be done, in spite of the petition sent to congress, we should like to add that the direction and arrangement of the exposition should be placed in the hands of experienced business men. And if the parties interested wish to derive the fullest benefit from such an exposition, they will send out competent men and open shops for the sale of their goods during its existence. As a rule, every established merchant, no rule, every established merchant, no matter what his nationality is, stands ready to keep any article of merchan-dise which his customers demand. He may have his prejudices and preferences like ourselves, but business is business. and sentiment is not business. Is offsiness; and sentiment is not business. He will not permit his personal feelings to stand in the way of a profitable business, no matter what may be the nationality of the merchandise sold. But when it comes to pioneer work the case is quite diffe-rent. In this the foreign manufacturer or merchant must undertake the risk or merchant must undertake the risk and incur the expense. If a great ba-zaar could be opened here, contempo-raneous with the exposition, for the sale of American goods and novelties, it would do more toward securing a foothold in the market than all the exposi-tions that could be devised.

The evidence convincingly established the fact that, as in so many cases of this kind, the insubordination was the outcome of the influence of that bane to the mercantile marine—the sea hawyer s—who is always so ready to misinterpret the law in justification of his improper conduct.

So successfully had he plotted in the present instance that some of his dupes appeared hardly to have settled in their mind upon what ground they had refused to obey the lawful commands of their officers.

While recognizing that the offenders erred chiefly in consequence of their ignorance and weakmindedness, a certain sympathy cannot at the same time be withheld from their captain who had thus the responsibility of navigating his vessel during a difficult voyage of two and a half months' duration with a reduced crew and seven mutinous spirits on board. During part of the time, as many as cleven mercfused to work. Afterwards, four of them turned to and deserted on arrival at Rio to avoid prosecution.

—A Desterro telegram of the 15th says that a band of outlaws under one Manoel Rodrigues, had attacked various officials in the municipality of Arangud, on the borders of Rio Grande. A detachment of Santa Catharina police has been sent after the criminals.

—All accounts agree in stating that the famatics at Caudoos fought with courage, tenacity and desperation. It is said that after having completely exhausted their animumition they continued the struggle for several days with precarious supplies obtained from the cartridge-boxes of dead government soldiers.

Alfonse Spee manager of the Compagnie de Chemins de Fer Sud Onest Bresiliens, and both offer an initial payment of £ 160,000. One offers thereafter £ 3,000 every three years, with an increase of £ 150 a year, and 15,000 for fiscalization. The other offers 25 per cent of the net profits.

—The president of the S. Paulo Railway Co. is reported to have said at a general meeting of shareholders that he would vigorously oppose the extension of the Mogyana road to Santos, since he considers it an infraction of the 6th article of the contract of July 17, 1895. The minister of industry, however, in a dispatch of the 15th inst. addressed to the Brazilian legation at London, asserts that this view of the mutter is unfounded and that the article expressly exempts Santos from the company's exclusive privilege.

—The new law of Venezuela, granting subsidies for railway construction, authorises the President to grant railway concessions for one hundred years, and exclusive concessions for forty years. On per mement roads subsidies may be given of 20,000 bolivars per 20 kilometres of level road, 40,000 bolivars per 20 kilometres. Railway contractors must pay 20 bolivars per kilometre, and must deposit up to 10,000 bolivars as a guarantee for completing the road. Concessions cannot be transferred to foreign governments.

He withdrew, and twenty minutes later returned with a revolver, which he fired lwice at short range. The prompt action of Mr. Townes in rushing upon the man, and the assistance rendered by Mr. H. G. Thompson in helping to seize him, prevented serious consequences. The servant, William A. Patris, is an American negro, and is a man of violent temper. ## SHIPPING NOTES

-The French cruiser Dubourdien left port on the 15th inst.

—The British cruiser *Retribution*, flagship of the squadron on this coast, entered this port on the 17th.

—According to the Jornal do Commercio of the 16th inst. 3S vessels have thus far been nationalized under the provisions of decree No. 2,304 of July 2nd, 1896, of which 22 were sailing vessels and 16 were steamers. Of the total, 13 had been constructed in the country and 25 abroad, 10 were under 50 tons each, 8 from 100 to 200 tons and 8 from 200 to 200 tons. One only exceeded 1,000 tons.

—I announced in the last issue of Transport that the Bazin roller boat, in her present state of existence, was not destined to revolutionise the art of navigation. For some time past, engineers in the service of the French government have been experimenting with the vessel in the Seine and in the open sea off Havre. The conclusion at which they have arrived is that M. Bazin is right in principle, and that the use of rollers or wheels economise 70 per cent. of power as compared with an ordinary keel. The boat behaves well in rough weather, is easily manœuvred, and throws up very little swell—a point of some importance in river traffic. Their opinion is, however, that M. -The customs receipts at Santos from January to September, inclusive, amounted to 29,432,072\$604.

The aggregate annual expenditure of 45 municipal districts of the state of Rio de Janmunicipal districts of the state of Rio de Janeiro is 5.504.5545187. The revenue is estimated at the same sum. The manicipal district that spends most is that of Petropolis, whose expenditure is estimated at 608,4895. Nictheroy spends 585.465666 and Campos 407.858560. The cheapest municipal government is that of Mangaratiba, whose expenditure is estimated at only 10,9005.

-The government has informed the senate that it sold in last December silver coin of the nominal value of 1,000,000\$ and in last August nominal value of 1,000,000 and in last August 11,971,570 grammes of silver bullion. The coin was sold for 1,160,000 and the bullion at the rate of 104.51 rels per gramme. The silver had cost the government 63.86 reis per gramme, having been bought in 1890 before the paper currency was so much depreciated as it is at present. The government thinks that this transaction is authorized by one of the provisions of art. 1 of the last revenue law.

-In 1889 the debt of the state (then —In 1889 the debt of the state (then province) of Rio Grande do Sul was 4,178,-921\$818. During the period which clapsed between that date and Dec. 31, 1893,—a period during which, with the exception of a few months, the state was under the control of Julio de Castilhos and his partisans—the indebt-edness increased to 7,872,250\$818. Since then Castilhos notwithstanding the decadence of the principal industry in the state—the cattle industry—has drawn from increased taxation and from the pecuniary assistance which he obtained from the general government and the state government of S. Paulo, sufficient resources to enable him to reduce the debt to 4,500,000\$.


