— It is reported that the Argentine agents in Europe have signally failed to raise a new loan, the guarantees being considered insufficient.

It is stated that President Cuestas has called out four battalions of the Uruguayan national guard, placing them under commanders of his own choice.

- A Buenos Aires telegram of the 9th says the Argentine budget presents a deficit of eleven millions. It is a good time to purchase a £ 900,000 ironclad, surely!

—The Argentine budget for 1898, as presented by the committee, provides for expenditures of \$21,646,682.90 in gold and \$91,731,498.79 in currency. The receipts are estimated at \$44,560,646 in gold and \$55,918,000 in currency.

- A Montevideo telegram of the 5th says that the British str. Fieda had taken a cargo of arms at Buenos Aires for Rio Grande, consisting of ten cases of Remingtons, twenty cases of swords and two cases of accourte-ments. The Brazilian consul at Montevideo had the merchandise landed and deposited

- A Buenos Aires telegram says that the — A Buenos Aires telegram says that the Argentine government has ordered an iron-clad in Europe, to be called the Belgramo, which will be of 12,000 tons and have a speed of 20 miles an hour. The contract cost is f,000,000, and the ship is to be completed in fifteen months. For a country which has been unsuccessfully trying to borrow money in every capital of Europe, this is decidedly good.

-Five little boys were arrested in Montevideo one day last month for stealing six pears from a quinla. It was a great crime and a terrible lesson. Those little boys should have terrine tesson. Those little boys should have known better. The honest and wise thing to do is to first grow up, and then they can get into the custom-house, or into the inmicipal government, or even into congress, where they can steal with impunity. Every one now knows that it is infinitely worse to steal six pears than it is to steal a hundred thousand dollars.

- So far locusts have not approached very near the city of Buenos Aires: but there are plenty of them in the province, even to the far south. Patagones and other places which far south. The cumpaign against them goes on with a good deal of vigour; but very much depends on the composition of the local committees, which in some places are composed of active men, while in others they are of the wrong material, and admost nothing is done. It is not to be supposed that if this organization can be kept up without expense. THE STRANGERS' HOSPITAL.

THE STRANGERS HOSPITAL.
Among the many public institutions which
the city of Rio de Janeiro possesses, one
of the most useful and interesting is the
Strangers' Hospital. It is a small hospital,
and it has no endowment and no fixed income,
but it has done good work during the few
years since it was opened and has amply fulfilled the expectations reposed in it be its
founders—the British and American residents
of this city.

founders—the British and American residents of this city.

The first steps toward the creation of this loopital were taken in 1895, the subject having been frequently discussed in The Rib News and a meeting held to effect a preliminary organization. In 1895 subscriptions were spend and when a sufficient sum had been secured to guarantee success, a definite or ganization was effected, toward the close of the year, and a site was purchased. The whole of 1895 was spent in the work of reconstructing the editice purchased and in improving the grounds, and on january 8th, 1895, the hospital was formally opened.

The primary object of the hospital is to provide treatment for the subscribers and their employés, principally with respect to yellow fever, but its doors are open to patients of all nationalities and for diseases of nearly every description. It is now provided with an isolated pavilion for vellow fever, so that no restrictions need be placed on the reception of other patients. The staff is composed of a highly successful and esteemed Brazilian physician, Dr. Raymundo Bandeira, and six English trained nurses. Thus far this staff has given the fullest satisfaction, and its skilled attendance upon the sick, especially those stricken with yellow fever, has not only greatly relieved their sufferings, but has led to a great diminution in the percentage of deaths. This r sult, it must be admitted, is ample compensation for all the sacrifices made in the creation of the Strangers' Hospital.

For so small a community and in view of the great business depression in Brazil during these years, the construction and maintenance of such an institution has involved no slight succine, and its foundars therefore deserve vinstinted praise for their persistence and herality. But the hospital is af from being self-sustaining, and it still needs much assistance. It should have an endowment, but this must wit upon the gratitude of those who have benefited from its skillful ministrations. But it has a debt to pay off, and some need

One of our morning contemporaries affirmed on the 6th that the adjutant-general of the army has proposed to the general of the army has proposed to the minister of war a reduction in the effec-tive strength of the army from 28,160 to 16,000 men. His justification of this proposal is that congress has made appropriations only for the smaller number. Aside from all questions rela-tive to the legislative error of fixing the effective strength of the army at 28,000, and then providing for the maintenance of only 16,000, which may have been and then providing for the maintenance of only 16,000, which may have been done designedly, it seems to us that the government now has a good opportunity to reduce the army, as the President recommended during the early days of the last congressional session, and that the last congressional session, and that too without becoming involved in any controversy with the military party. Congress has failed to provide the necessary appropriations for the full force, and the executive therefore is under no obligation to maintain such a force. It has been generally known that the effective strength of the army has all along been under twenty thou-sand, and the government could easily continue the force at its present strength. continue the force at its present strength, which may not exceed the sixteen thousand stipulated by the adjutant-general. There are always losses from sickness and expiration of enlistments, and if such vacancies are left unfilled the government can easily diminish the number. The principal reason why this should be done—and it is a reason which should appeal to military men as well as civilians—is that of lack of means. There were about two hundred guests present, mostly in fancy dresses, some of which showed much taste and ingenuity. I venture to instinuate in the most delicate manner in the world, however—just to hint—that, next time, it would be better not to limit the choice of materials for the costumes in any way; or, at any rate, not to exclude or discourage the use of silks, satins, and velvets, gold, diamonds, pearls, rubies and extrict feathers. It was simply this prolibition which prevented me—as it probably did many others—from coming out with all my best clothes on; and though the scene in the ballroom was full of life and color, there was a certain want of brilliancy, which was undoubtedly due to the scarcity of the richer materials and accessories above referred to.

It is not easy to get fancy dresses of any kind made in S. Paulo; but ladies say—whether in perfect sincerity, or not, I cannot tell—that calico is more expensive than silk or satin, because a dress made of it only serves for the night of the dance, and is useless afterwards; whereas one made of the latter materials can be cut up or used for other purposes, when it has served its turn. Still, as the judges say, I should like to hear counsel for the other side on this point.

There was no list of the characters assumed, except, indeed, one which appeared the day after the ball, and which the reporters of the Correio Paulislano seem to have made, as the Corporation of London did the wooden pavement, by laying their heads together. Miss Simon, of Santos, as «Night,» won the ladies prize for the best dress. There was no lack of clowns—there seldom is in any assemblage of what we call Anglo-Saxons—and one or two played their parts amusingly. I saw, too, a cook, and a Mephistopheles; and I thought if the cook did cook as most cooks do, he would prove the more dangerous devil of the two! I saw a Cuban insurgent in a singlet, a pair of boots, and a straw hat; and a masher in a gorgeous tin helmet, and a long white smock, get up regardless of expense to represent a praça of the waist down—you remember the animal which was part monkey and part bare?—two bull faghters from Pacaembh, who looked as if they would take a very small size in bulls, and a man who came out in a fancy embroidered «knight» dress, and he ought to have got a prize, too!

I feel a certain delicacy in saying anything about the ladies' costumes. As a young lady once remarked to me, talking of some of her Sunday school experiences, "you know it is so dreadfully embarrassing to have to explain what one doesn't understand!" I do not know what French modiste the reporter of the Correio Paulislano may have studied under, but I must say I enzy him the glib facility with which he sails away among—him!—among the clouds, in long strings of sentences like the following:

RAILROAD NOTES

— It is said that the proposds for leasing various government railways in the north will be decided on or before the 15th.

—The Santa Cruz and Itaguahy transway company has been fixed 5005 for not estab-lishing the stations mentioned in the contract.

—Of the 24 Baldwin locomotives ordered in November by the director of the Central railway, 12 are said to be already on their way to Brazil.

— The state government of Pará has recently paid 138,400,805 for 23 cars imported from the United States for the Bragança rail-

— A petiton signed by Soo residents of the suburbs through which the Central railway passes, has been addressed to the minister of industry asking for a reduction in fares on the suburban trains.

—The government fiscalization of guaran-teed railways is confided to 31 engineers, of whom 16 receive 6,000\$ per annum, 10 receive 7,000\$ per annum, and 5 receive 8,000\$ per annum. The aggregate of their salaries is 206,000\$.

206,000.

— In the month of October the trains of the Sorocabana company curried 12,325 first-class passengers, 38,691 second-class passengers, 5,599 head of cattle and other animals, 512 tons of parcels and 21,962 tons of freight, including 6,314 tons of coffee. The receipts were 936,6265880, against 630,2005499 in October, 1896. The receipts for the half-year ended Dec. 31 are estimated at over 5,000,0005.

— The Gazela da Tarde of the 8th says that there is no truth in the report about the reduction in the army. So much the worse for Brazil.

Orders have been issued for bringing to the de janeiro the furniture and archives of the Ceará military school, which is to be closed.

It is stated that at the cabinet meeting held on Friday there was read the report of the chief of police on the murder of Marshal Bittencourt.

— The minister of foreign affairs has nor nated Sr. Francisco Alves Vietra as Brazili consul at London, and Manoel da Silva Pon to the same post at Paris.

— The Y. M. C. A. of this city has moved into its new quarters in Rua da Quitanda, where a bazaar was held on the 6th in aid of the Hospital Evangelico Fluminense.

—It is announced that a new morning paper, to be called A Imprensa, will appear about the beginning of February, and that Dr. Ruy Barbosa will have editorial direction of it.

Among the passengers arriving yesterday on the Lamport & Holt steamer Galileo was Mr. F. Seeger and wife. Mr. Seeger is the new American consul general at this port.

—It is said that the employés of the port health department on the steam launch Finla Guidido have not received their pay for three months. This must be due to the negligence of some official.

—The fornal do Commercio says that the debt of the municipality to the Central railway has been increased to 100 0005. The debt is on account of the transportation of fresh beef from Santa Cruz.

—The cruiser Quinze de Notembro was fitted out with all dispatch and sent south on the 8th, her destination being one of the southern ports. Sile goes under the command of Capt. Belfort Vieira.

The Norddentsche Algemeine Zeilung says that Germany has not entered China as a conqueror. Of course, we all knew that! There is quite another characterization for such an entry into another's property.

—Gen. Glycerio, in view of the apparent intention of n a y of his followers to vote for the government presidential candidate, has found it necessary to issue a circular advising them to vote for their own candidate.

A St. Petersburg telegram of the 5th says that the Russian government has in-structed its minister to this country to transfer his legation to Buenos Aires, because of the suppression of the Brazilian legation in Russia.

—The exceptionally large number of fires which have lately occurred in this city, is exciting comment. Formerly fires were very rare, except toward the end of bad years. Now they are becoming alarmingly frequent.

—The ex-minister of industry, Dr. Joaquim Murtinho, is certainly being well advertised. One of the latest journals to publish his port-rait and give a biographical sketch of him, is the Illustracion Sud-Americana of Buenos Aires

— The investigation at the 12th pretoria into the assassination of Col. Gentil de Castro was closed on the 7th inst, and the papers, together with the arguments of the lawyers for the defence, were sent to the president of the civil and criminal tribunal.

—The new quartermaster-general is about to devote his attention to a new plan of uniforms for the army. So frequently have these uni-forms been changed, and so great an expense do they represent, that this a new plan a might very well be postponed.

—Dr. Lauro Sodré is reported to have been advised by friends to withdraw from the presidential contest. On being told that he would not get 50,000 votes he is said to have answered that he would remain in the field even if he does not get one thousand.

— According to a local observer, the average temperature in December was 21.8° C. (76.6 Fahr.) the maximum being 34.7 C. (94.6 Fahr.) and the minimum 18.8 C. (65.8 Fahr). The rainfall was 212.1/2 millimetres and there were 12 miny days in the month.

Deputy Glycerio has issued a manifesto to his party, advising its voters to contest the coming presidential election. This is good sense, certainly. We have no patience with citizens who stay at home because they have no certainty of winning an election.

—A drunken woman with a child of six months in her arms, attempted to cross the street in front of a train car on Friday last, in Rua General Pedra, and the result was most dissistrous. Both were badly injured, the child dying before it reached the hospital.

—Gen. Glycerio undesignedly pays a valuable tribute to the revolutionists of the 6th of September when he asserts that they are now ruling the country. A cause that can survive defeat and finally triumph must be composed of the best and strongest elements.

— The Gazela de Neticias of Sunday says
the Capt. Carlos Accioli, who is now in the
Coptenhant beri-beri hospital, will be tried by
a military court whose members have already
been appointed. Capt. Accioli is one of the
persons arrested soon after the attempt on the

—It seems to us that Gen. Glycerio is unjust when he complains of the President for having separated from the jacobins. The President was obliged either to take this step or to completely stutify himself by abandon-ing all the best principles for which he had ever contended.

—On Tasslay night building No. 113, Rua de S. José was destroyed by fire, some of the adjoining buildings and their contents being more or less dunaged. It is stated that after the arrival of the firemen the work of ex-tinguishing the flumes was delayed 40 minutes by want of water.

—The police force of this city has been reorganized, and will comprise two hattalions of infantre, with 25 officers and 878 men each, and one regiment of cavalry with 26 officers and po men. Besides these there will be 75 officers in service in addition to those attached to the two infantry battalions.

—Gen. Glycerio, in his last circular, says that President Prudente de Moraes has neutralised the work of Marshal Floriano Peixoto. The receipts of the revenue office of the state of Rio de Janeiro in this city amounted last year to 10,860,327\$698, or 529,070\$698 more than the estimate. The export duty on coffee produced 10,305,80\$1814,07 nearly 96 %, of the whole sum. The export duty on sugar lind been estimated to produce 150,000\$5, but the sum actually collected was only 135,798\$711.

—In view of the returns so far made public it may be estimated that the decrease in customs receipts in 1897, compared with 1896, was at least 40,000,005. It is possible, however, that full returns may make a consideration in the estimated decrease. To this decrease should be added the diminished value of the receipts, caused by depreciation of the currency. of the currency.

—The Jornal do Brazil of the 6th says that the President and minister of finance have been occupying themselves with the fall in exchange, and that they are about to adopt measures in the matter which will soon be carried into effect. Naturally, those measures will be to reduce expenditures in order to avoid deficit, and to call in paper money to order to appreciate the currency.
