—The Buenos Aires Sport and Pastime says the total area in Argentina under wheat this year is estimated at 3,400,000 hectares (7,082,-200 acres) and 400,000 hectareas (833,200 acres)

—The fearful storm which passed over on Thursday evening last may be described as "the last straw" for our poor countrymen in the south. The daily telegrams from the south of the province are very sad reading, and the terrible losses sustained and the damage done are incalculable. Round about the partido of Dolores most distressing scenes have occurred, and it is said that there alone something like 30,000 horned stock and 150,000 sheep have been lost, while it will take years for the camps to recover. At the time of writing the weather seems more settled, but it is impossible for anyone to foretell what may be in store for us from day to day, and we can but hope for the best. — Sport and Pastime, Buenos Aires, Oct. 17.

—The discovery of pretty extensive frauds

The discovery of pretty extensive frauds in the custom-house, in connection with the duties paid on some classes of wine from Spain, has been creating quite an excitement, and, we suppose, there are still further revelations to be made. The assessing, or fixing of, the valuations by means of samples would appear to be a quite simple process, and one which would be recommendable as an equitable base of understanding between the importer and the custom-house. But when good faith no longer attends the operation, and it is found that false samples are sent to the analysing chemists, the aspect of affairs somewhat changes, and the deceit practised assumes all the appearance of a vulgar fraud. It now remain to be seen if the substitution of false samples for real ones is the act of the importersatone, or in connivance with custom-house employees, and, which ever way it result, there seems to be a likelihood of some one coming out of the affair with very little credit. — Review. Buenos Aires.

—It appears to us that, at a time like the present, it has been a very ill-advised step on the part of the authorities to cloose the moment for writing up the valuations of property on which to assess the land tax. The estancieros have had a bad season from a number of causes, each one more serious than the other. In the first mouths of the year the foot-and-mouth disease wrought immense harm by closing the European markets against live stock imported from the republic, with the consequent fall in values. The effect of the disease upon the animals themselves was to render them weakly and unfit to stand the severities of the winter which followed, and being milder than usual, fortunately did not all the damage that might have been anticipated. But losses there were, and sufficient. The heavy rains and the floods and inundations, prevalent still in many districts, have contributed to make the estanciero's year a disastrous one. The prices of wool in the European markets are ruinously low, and although this feature may change before the present clip can be sent forward, it will be partly brought about by the diminished quantity, the result of the frightful mortality among the sheep, which we have seen stated for this province alone at about fifteen millions. We cannot, therefore, be surprised to hear the cry of protest against the raising of the land valuations by the officers of the government, — Review, Buenos Aires.

The cook was French, and all the others were English.

The vessel was never in Glasgow. It left Rosario last July for Antwerp, thence to London, and thence returned to the River Plate. She was disinfected several times during the double voyage, and dead rats were frequently found on board. The inference is that she acquired the disease in Rosario, and that it remained on board, among the rats, in spite of the disinfections. The peculiarity is that it should have taken so long in mani-

festing itself. Such a case seems to us to prove the futility both of quarantines and disinfection as preventives, while there are rats about.

As already stated, the vessel is being very thoroughly disinfected in this port, and the cargo is being landed under special precautions. A smitary guard has been placed on board, but at present there are no further cases of sickness, all being in good health. The vessel had 11 passengers for Buenos Aires, and a crew of 29.—Montevideo Times, Oct. 16.

COFFEE NOTES

The crop outlook in Brazil seems to grow more satisfactory from buyers' point of view. It looks as if the Santos crop would reach above six million bags, and if the Rio crop does not fall much below last year or the year previous the total Brazilian supply this year should be pretty close to the shumpers crop of 1897-98. One firm estimates the Santos crop at 6,500,000 bags, an increase of one million bags from an early estimate of a few months ago. LARGE COFFEE IMPORTS.

CARGOES AGGREGATING 141,000 BAGS DESTINED FOR NEW ORLEANS.

DESTINED FOR NEW ORLEANS.

New Orleans, Oct. 1.—New Orleans seems at last in a fair way to regain her old prestige as one of the great coffee ports of the United States.

The steamer Volage, laden with 37,000 bags of coffee, from Rio, has arrived at the city front from quarantine and has begun to discharge her cargo into lighters.

There are at present in dock unloading, on the sea bound to this port and loading at coffee ports for here and about to sail five vessels, all told, that within thirty days will place nearly a million and a half dollars worth of coffee in New Orleans to be reshipped or sold here. These vessels, exclusive of the Volage, are the Strabo, with a cargo of 22,000 bags now affoat; the Juriak Bat, with 37,000 bags, which sailed from Sutos for Rio, where she will receive an additional shipment for this port; the Tiverton, now loading at Rio, with a 20,000 bag cargo, and the Glendevon, which sailed from Santos with a cargo of 25,000 bags.

This makes a total of 141,000 bags that will

This makes a total of 141,000 bags that will be handled here within the next thirty days, and large as the figures are, they represent merely the beginning of the season's imports. None of the dealers care to venture even an approximate estimate of the probable total, but they all agree that it will prove beyond doubt the largest for many years.—V. Y. Journal of Commerce, Oct. 2.

COLOMBIA AND VENEZUELA.

The author of the most recent book on South Americas' has given us a study of the two northern republics of the continent which is well worth perusal. Mr. Seruggs was for some years envoy extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary of the United States to the republics of Colombia and Venezuela, and therefore enjoyed exceptional opportunities for studying the physical conditions, people and histories of those two countries. It does not always happen that a minister is the best informed and most competent man to describe and discuss-the country to which he had been accredited, but in this case Mr. Seruggs shows that he was not only a lover of grand scentry. And his pages often tell more than his sentences were designed to express, to those who know how to read between the lines. A cursory glance at the table of contents shows that the author has discussed the isthmus of Panamá and its celebrated canal, the cities of the «Spanish Main,» the Magdahem valley and the journey to Bogotá, the capital and the wonderful tableland on which it is built, the manners and customs of the people and the race problem, the history of the revolution against Spain, revolutions in general and the rights of foreigners in South America, the island of Curaçao and the Venezuelan coast, the city of Caracas, the republic of Venezuela, the Monroe doctrine and the Guiana boundary dispute, and a general discussion of international arbitration. Subjects like these are not to be discussed superficially nor can the reader dismiss them with a hurried glance. They cover questions of the greatest interest to the whole western world, and this book discusses them seriously and intelligently. Whether we agree with the author's opinions on every subject, or not, they are worthy of serions consideration and every student of American history and American policy can not afford to overlook them.

—The Gazeta de Noticias says that the measures adopted by the government for mitigating the effects of the crisis are excellent, but that the delay in carrying them into execution will probably render them inoperative. To this the Impressa very pertinently answers that in this case it is a mistake to say that the measures are excellent, since the utility of a measure necessarily depends on the time required for carrying it into execution. The business community accepted the government's measures because the government declared that it was not prepared to adopt any others. If on account of delay the measures adopted prove inoperative, it will be evident that the government was not even prepared to adopt those. In other words the government, in causing the crisis, did harm that it was powerless to remedy, or even to mitigate. And yet we see no signs of any intention to abandon the disastrous policy that has done so much harm.

—A contributor to these columns writes us as follows:—In the chamber of deputies another bill against foreign banks was introduced last week. This bill absolutely prohibits the establishment of such banks or their branches in Brazil, if they deal in exchange, and the present banks are required to wint up their transactions within six months. We cannot bring ourselves to believe that any of these insane measures against foreign capital will be voted by congress; but, if they should be converted into law, persons were induced to introduce their labor and capital into the country under more liberal legislation, which offered them security and protection is to violate the tacti contract between them and the government, and they will, as we have said, ecrtainly be entitled to compensation for the loss which they thereby sustain.

According to recent telegrams the proposal of the government to restrict the privileges of foreign banks has elicted general disapproval from the London press, the Times, Economist. Standard, Globe and Financial News, all condemning editorially the project presented to the chamber of deputies for the suppression of exchange speculation and the regulation of these banks. This is only what might reasonably be expected. There are methods by which exchange speculation can be restricted without seeking to crush these banks, and it will therefore be believed that the real intention of the project now before congress is to get rid of the competition which these banks can offer to the banking scheme of the minister of finance. As these banks are principally English, the London press is sure to look upon the measure with disfavor, and as Brazilian credit abroad is almost wholly dependent upon the good opinion of London financiers, these unfavorable criticisms can not fail to work incalculable harm. The minister should have foreseen all this before laying so mischievous a scheme before congress. Next year he may want more assistance from that quarter, and if he offends British capitalists in this manuer how can he expect to get it? It must be said that he is not secure in his plans for resuming interest payments next year on the foreign debt, for the transfer According to recent telegrams the for resuming interest payments next year on the foreign debt, for the transfer of a million sterling from the guarantee fund in London to the Banco da Republica, the loss of £900,000 sterling and 10,000,000\$ in treasury bills here, and the loan of 25,000,000\$ more in cash to the same bank for discount purposes, can not fail to seriously cripple his resources. Under such conditions his best policy would be to cultivate the good will of London capitalists, and to good will of London capitalists, and to encourage them to employ their money in Brazil. Instead of doing this, he proposes to compel their banks to surrender their deposits should they choose to continue exchange transactions, and then to limit these transactions to double their capital, subject to arbitrary and vexations official regulations. His object evidently is to force all deposits into the Banco da Republica, where they will be subject to his disposition, and to also control all future exchange operamit the Banco da Repubnica, where they will be subject to his disposition, and to also control all future exchange operations. The Banco da Republica, which will be a branch of the treasury, will therefore become the depository of all the surplus cash of this city, and also the arbiter of its commercial destinies. Such a situation can not fail to be full of peril for this country, and full of annoyance to the one country which Brazil can not do without. Without offence, it must be said that such a banking combination is beyond the administrative powers of the country. We already see that the minister has been compelled to call in a foreign banker to manage his new enterprise, and that from this has arisen a highly improper combination—the said banker retaining his connection with the Ger-

man bank during his administration of the official bank. Should the minister's the official bank. Should the minister's project become law, the German bank project become law, the German bank will promptly retire from exchange operations, retain its deposits, and monopolize discounts, and the combination thus arranged between the two banks under one head will serve to drive the other foreign banks out of business. Such a result will assuredly be looked upon in London as an unfriendly combination, and if the London financiers have not wholly lost their spirit, it will lead to an estrangement which will seriously cripple this country in the future. The minister of finance should know that Brazil is not yet out of danger, that the country's solvency has not yet been satisfactorily demonstrated, and that he can not yet take the risk of kicking those who have been helping him through a serious difficulty. Berlin him through a serious difficulty. Berlin will never take the place of London when money is wanted, nor will German capmoney is wanted, nor will German capital do for Brazil what British capital has done. We have no sympathy with the exchange speculations which have brought so much prejudice upon us, nor do we defend the policy of the banks which have assisted in these speculations, but this does not blind us to the injustice and dangers of the scheme proposed. We can not forget that the government itself has promoted exchange speculations and that two years ago it employed a foreign bank to force up the rate. And we can not ignore the fact, also, that the most persistent speculators in the market are Brazilians, who will find some means to continue such transactions even when the foreign who will find some means to continue such transactions even when the foreign banks are closed. The scheme can not possibly result beneficially to the country, for it is founded upon conspiracy and wrong, and will serve only to weaken credit and restrict business. The minister will therefore do well to heed the words of protest and warning which the London press is uttering, and to recall the project which he has so unwisely asked congress to pass. asked congress to pass.

It would seem that the President has decided not to visit President Cuestas, of Uruguay, as he at first intended to do. Instead he will sail by Montevideo without even a salute. It is said that this is designed as a rebuke because the Uruguayan government has failed to give complete satisfaction for the ill-treatment of some Brazilian soldiers at Flores island a silort time ago. Whether this is true, or not, it is to be regretted that the President should consider it advisable to treat our small neighbor with so — hous a mark of discourtesy. Us have a small and weak country and may be treated discourteously in perfect safety, but is it good taste and good policy to do so? Trouble may at any moment arise between Chili and Argentina, and if this exchange of visits is the precursor of an alliance between the latter and Brazil, this treatment of Uruguay may throw the latter into the arms of Chili and give that country an invaluable base of operations on this coast. In these uncertain times it is a mistake to make enemies unnecessarily.

THE proposal to do something for the exslaves in the state of São Paulo, late as it is, is
deserving of praise, but it seems to us that the
means chosen are not of the best. The liberation of three quarters of a million slaves and
leaving them absolutely unprovided for, was
not a wise and just act, for it left the freedmen
homeless, helpless and unprotecled. It was
an act of justice to give them their liberty, but
justice could not be complete without providing for their future welfare. In a country
like Brazil, it would have been easy to provide
lands for them and to encourage them to
remain agriculturists. This was not done, and
as the planters themselves were inclined to take
advantage of the freedmen, they soon abundoned the plantations and settled in the cities
and towns, where there is very little for them
to do. To now provide homes for them in and
about the towns may be a necessary charity,
but even yet it is not too late to settle some

We trust that the monarchs of the old world will learn a lesson from the exchange of visits between the republican rulers of Argentina and Brazil. We are assured that these visits have no political objects in view, and that they are actuated only by a desire to promote neighborly feelings between the two countries. The two presidents, who spring from the people and are the chosen representatives of the people, wear no crowns, nor are they draped in ermina/trimmed robes. Their manly breasts are not hidden behind the insignia of useless orders, nor are they decked out in the

uniforms of honorary commands bestowed upon each other. Like simple-minded men and good neighbors, they just drop in upon each other for an afternoon's call, to take a cup of tea and talk about the weather and crop prospects. Of course it is not like calling on a neighbor who lives five minutes walk from your door, and perlaps preparations of a somewhat more expensive character have been necessary, but what else can one expect from a plain republican president. Instead of calling in a carriage and pair, they have taken three elegantly-equipped warships, and instead of travelling with a coachman and valet, they take a retinue of two score officials and friends and a force of five or six hundred servants. When the queen and kaiser and king go a-calling they generally go in a little yacht with a half dozen, or so, attendants, secretaries and servants, but here we do it better. Perhaps it does cost a little more, but then it must be made or we should not know that a visit was taking place. Then look at the dinners, and excursions, and bulls, and races, and reviews, and presents, and charitable gitts—what can effete Europe offer to meet all these? It may not something—perhaps more than we can simplicity, but we are bound to do it. There is a splendor in republican institutions which the world never dreamed of until Gazman duty to keep it up.

—The sgrand old mans of Rio Grande, Dr. Gaspar da Silveira Martius, has gone to Buenos Aires to attend the festivities in honor of President Campos Salles.

— Telegrams from Minas Geraes say that the state government is sending policemen to various districts for the purpose of carrying the municipal elections.

— A telegram of the 24th inst, says that it is reported. Lyba that 60 policemen have been sent to Arcia in order to massacre Cunha Lima and his friends.

— In Paralyba there are two citizens each of whom claims to be governor, and at Iguape there are two sets of citizens each of which claims to be a municipal chamber.

—The ex-governor of Parahyba in a telegram announcing that he had transferred the government of the state to his successor says that there was general rejoicing. He deserves credit for his candor.

—On Saturday last the corner-stone of a new Protestant church was laid at Porto Ale-gre by Bishop Kinsolving. The new church which is to be called Trinity church, belongs to the Protestant Episcopal denomination.

—The municipal council of Juiz de Fóra has voted 2,000\$ per annum to the Liga Mineira contra a Tuberculosa. It is to be hoped that this society will be able to do effective work for the prevention and cure of pulmonary consumption, which is widely prevalent in Minas Geraes.

—Deputy Almeida Nogueira, of the S. Paulo state assembly, has presented a bill to that body appropriating 20,000\$ a year for the relief of destitute freedment, liberated by the abolition act of 1888. Another deputy, Sr. Annador Cobra, has proposed the grant of land at Ypiranga, on which to build houses for their relief.

—Two men were recently assassinated in the district of Sunde, Minas Geraes, by four hired assassinase who were afterwards captured and confessed that they had received 500 from José Antonio do Nascimento for committing the crime. The murdered men were two brothers named Manuel and Victorino Aldeia, and were shot from an ambush.

The Gazela de Guarurá says that in Sunta Maria Magdalen a man named Manoel Ferreira Coelho was recently arrested for having injured (offendido) a young won un. Brought before the juzz, he was released on habeas corpus. A relative of the girl, named Augusto de Souza Pontes, thereupon drew a revolver and shot Coelho three times, inflicting serious wounds. He exclaimed to 1 as there is no justice for such secondrels, he would administer it with his own hands. Fontes is said to be highly esteemed by his neighbors.

—Now that matters have reached a point at which it is perhaps no longer possible to find a remedy, the press hitherto optimistic and reticent, is beginning to speak plainly. The Gazeda de Noticias, in its issue of last Friday, publishes on the situation an excellent article whose principal defect is that it has not been preceded in the last few years by articles of a similar character.

—At the meeting of creditors of the Banco Rural e Hypothecario on Thursday there was appointed a committee to ascertain what the bank is willing to offer. After an offer is made by the bank, another meeting will be held for the purpose of taking it into consideration. The creditors showed a very praiseworthy inclination to speak freely and not to submit to any terms that may be imposed upon them.

—A London telegram of the 27th says the Economist. Times, Financial News, Clobe and Standard had that day published editorial articles against the project presented to the chamber of deputies for separating banking operations in this country. What the subsidized press will have to say we cannot imagine, for they can hardly excuse so mischievous a measure.

—The London and River Plate Bank is experiencing several changes in its staff, three men, Ridgway, Massé and Carvalho, leaving to join the Banco da Republica, and the accountant Mr. C. H. —On the 26th inst. Deputy Fausto Cardoso, leader of the opposition, introduced a project of law in the claumber forbidding the establishment in the country of foreign banks dealing in exchange while the currency shall not be metallic or convertible paper, and providing for the liquidation within six months of those already established. The bill also stipulates that in future permission to open a foreign bank in Brazil can be granted only by congress. In the considerando introducing the bill, its author says that the exchange rate is the greatest evil which afficits the country, that a low rate can not be attributed to an excess of currency, that the fall in exchange became accentuated only after the creation of foreign banks, that the facts demonstrate the existence of a monopoly based upon exchange operations, that the rate is kept down to facilitate the acquisition of the Central railway, the Lloyd Brazileiro, the Santos docks, and to convert Brazil into a kind of Egypt in South America, and that this monopoly promises to be all the heavier isince the government has turned one of the national banks into a branch of the treasury, advanced it money equivalent to double its capital, and placed its management in the hands of the manager of one of the foreign banks, who was one of the principal operators in lowering exchange.

—The government has refused to confirm the concessions of permission to Mr. John Gordon to remove monazite sauds from the sea beaches in Bahia, and also the transfer to him of the concessions granted to Mr. S. S. Schindler, Srs. A. Ribeiro & Co., and Sr. Manoel Gonçalves Duarte. This will defeat the organization of a monopoly for working these valuable sands. The minister decides that each grantee should have his concession surveyed and should confine his operations within its limits, which is proper and right.

FINANCIAL NOTES

— In the London money market on the 25th inst. Brazilian 4 % bonds of 1889 fell to 60 1/2.

—The Imprensa says that the government is selling its bonds belonging to the assets of the Banco da Republica. This is doubtless done in order to obtain the 25,000,005 which the government has bound itself to deposit in the same hank.
