Notice is hereby given that Mr. A. J. Lamoureux has given his procurator to Sr Arnaldo José Dias de Miranda for the administration of The Rio News, and to Sr. Manoel Joaquim Moreira Maximino for the administration of his printing office, known as the Typographia Aldina, during his absence. The procurator given to Mr. Frederick Pfeffer is hereby revoked.

In our issue of June 18th we referred to the disclosure, made at that time, of latent elements of discord in the ranks of the dominant party in S. Paulo and, although the threatened rupture was then averted, we expressed the opinion that the peace would not be lasting and that the lack of harmony thus shown would perhaps produce important results in national politics. A month later it seemed that an open rupture had become inevitable, but again a truce was arranged. Now, however, the disruption of the party has been consummated and on the 7th inst. the seceders, whose leader is ex-President Prudente de Moraes, have issued a manifesto explaining the causes that have led to this result. It appears from this manifesto that the lack of harmony dates from the beginning of the administration of President Campos Salles, when it was discovered that the president, repudiating the party that had elected him, was sedulously engaged in organizing a personal party. It was observed that he systematically refrained from consulting the ex-president, who is perhaps the only republican leader that has any real prestige among the conservative classes of the country, and, as we all know, it was soon apparent that he intended to destroy all the valuable work of party discrimination accomplished in 1897 and to restore the political chaos that existed before that year.

In our opinion the ex-president should have broken with him at once. Had he done so, he would perhaps have been able by timely opposition to save the country from many disasters that have occurred during the present administration. But—better late than never, and it is to be hoped, now that the rupture has been consummated, that no time will be lost in the important work of organizing a strong opposition party. We understand that a convention for this purpose will be held in S. Paulo on the 12th prox.

PRESIDENT MCKINLEY.

On the 6th inst. President McKinley was dangerously wounded by two shots from a revolver at Buffalo, where he was attending the Pan-American Exhibition. The author of the crime, who was immediately arrested, is a young man whose name is said to be Leon Czolgosz and who is described as an anarchist. It is stated that he is a native of Cleveland, Ohio, and is of German-Polish origin.

It was to be expected, the crime has excited much indignation against the criminal and

much sympathy for the President and his family. At the time of the prisoner's arrest it was with great difficulty that the police prevented the people from lynching him. Letters and telegrams expressing the deepest concern have been received by the President's family and by the government and congress of the United States from all parts of the world. Among the messages sent from Brazil are those of the government and both houses of congress and of state governments and legislatures.

We are pleased to be able to state that up to the date of the present issue of THE RIO NEWS the greater part of the reports received encourage the hope of the President's recovery

THE FINANCIAL SITUATION.

At the general meeting of shareholders of the North Brazilian Sugar Factories, held in London on July 16, the chairman made a statement from which we extract the following:

"We have had this year a larger crop than for some years past; but unfortunately the economic conditions prevailing in Brazil have been so serious that the markets for our products have been disorganized and about as bad as they could possibly be. The country has been passing through the most acute economic crisis. Owing to financial measures, which were adopted with a view of improving the foreign credit of the country, the internal conditions have been simply upset. The internal currency of the country has been so violently affected by these financial measures that practically people depending upon agricultural operations, where the payments of wages have to be made in the internal currency of the country, have been ruined wholesale, and I believe I am not overstating the case when I say that in the great commercial centres the majority, to state the thing well within the mark, of banks and trading houses have been ruined. A vast number of banks have been closed, and practically the business of the country has been suspended."

Mr. Furniss, U. S. consul at Bahia, describes the financial crisis as the severest ever felt in that part of Brazil. "It often costs the producer," he says in a report to the state department, "more to gather his crop and to get it to market than he can hope to receive, while his money buys a little more than of old. Thus, in 1898, the value of the milreis was 11 cents in United States money, while to-day it is worth 25 cents, more than double, but meantime food, house-rent, board, clothing, etc., have not decreased 5 per cent., and in many instances the necessities of life remain in milreis as they were when the milreis was worth but 11 cents. Almost everything one purchases... has a stamp on it... to say nothing of the increase of the already high tariff on imports, which went into effect on June 1, 1901, raising the portion of duties payable in gold from 15 1/2 to 25 1/2. Two of the three native banks shut their doors on Jan. 29, 1901, and, although much effort has been made to reopen them, their future is problematical. It was thought that the only remaining native bank, one of the oldest in Brazil, would stand the strain... but it too closed its doors on April 11, 1901. As a great number, if not all, of the merchants, both importers and exporters, are either directly or indirectly concerned in these failures, it cannot but have a most serious effect upon all financial operations."

NEWS AND NOTES

—It is stated that a large daily newspaper is to be established at Nietheroy.

—A sulphure of carbon factory on the island of Governador has been sold for 6,000\$.

—A quicksilver mine is said to have been discovered in the vicinity of Ouro Preto.

—Last month the gas bill of the municipal government of Campinas amounted to 17,132\$00.

—At Campos on last Sunday Dr. Lacerda Sobrinho delivered a socialist lecture to a large audience.

—Judge Gama e Souza has ordered the judicial liquidation of the Companhia Estrada de Ferro da Tijuca.

—Judge Bulhões Pedreira has ordered the judicial liquidation of the Companhia Fiação e Tecidos Santo Aleixo.

—In S. Paulo, Christiano Wehenderfer has been declared insolvent. His liabilities are said to amount to 800,000\$.

—The civil chamber of the court of appeals has annulled the order for the judicial liquidation of the Sorocabana company.

—In the town of Campinas there are said to be at the present time 159 buildings condemned as uninhabitable for sanitary reasons.

—On the 1st prox. an agricultural school will be opened in the district of Batatas, S. Paulo, by the municipal chamber of the district.

—At the Bemfém cattle fair, in the first half of the present year, 33,581 heaves were offered and 24,956 sold, the sum realized being 2,376,000\$.

—The Associação Commercial of Campos has sent to the minister of industry a complaint against the new rates on the Carangola railway.

—During the celebration of the anniversary of Brazilian independence in this city on the 7th inst., there were serious disturbances caused by capoeiras.

—In the first half of the present year the revenue of the state government of S. Paulo amounted to 17,380,391\$796 against 14,067,499\$866 in the first half of the year 1900.

—Several persons are reported to have been killed in political disturbances in the district of Guarará, Minas Geraes. Among them is the editor of the Gazeta de Guarará.

—The employés of the Campos syndicate, who had struck on account of non-payment of wages, have resumed work with the understanding that payment shall be made within eight days.

—On the night of the 7th inst. Dr. Mathias Chaves, a prominent lawyer of Pirassununga, S. Paulo, was attacked from ambush. Fortunately none of the shots fired at him took effect.

—An electric railway is to be constructed from a suitable point in the vicinity of Itaipava to Nova Friburgo, passing through Theresopolis. The length of the road will be about 60 kilometers.

—The British Bank of South America informs us that the directors have declared an interim dividend of six shillings per share, being at the rate of 6% per annum, payable on the 25th inst.

—It is reported that the state government of Minas Geraes has obtained a loan of 250,000 from the Morro Velho Mining Co. The price of issue of the securities is said to be 90% and the rate of interest 6% per annum.

—The Belgian chargé d'affaires, M. Louis Fayder, committed suicide in Petropolis on last Friday. He had recently suffered very much from nervous diseases, and it is supposed that it was the state of his health that led him to put an end to his life.

—The supreme council of the court of appeals has refused to issue a writ of habeas corpus in favor of Ensign Alfredo Costa, whose brutal conduct excited so much animosity during the disturbances in June and who is to be tried for assault with attempt to kill.

—An exchange states that a Brazilian hress, Miss Laura Rienza, has recently caused some sensation in Paris by having a pair of bullocks trained to trot in tandem fashion, drawing a dog-cart. It is added that she has refused an offer of 2,000 for the bullocks.

—M. Santos Dumont, says the Paris correspondent of the Daily Mail, "is said to attribute his providential escape from injury to the fact that he was wearing on his wrist a bracelet to which hangs a medal of St. Benoit given him by the Countess d'Eu."

—There being no bids for the Theresopolis railway, which went to auction three times for the payment of the company's debt to Contractor José Augusto Vieira, the creditor was obliged to take the road for the debt, which amounted, we understand, to about 1,000,000\$.

—Messrs. Karl Valis & Co., who had agreed to pay their creditors in three yearly instalments, have not been able to comply with the terms of their agreement, and the judicial liquidation of the firm has consequently been ordered by Judge Aulaf de Paiva.

—President Campos Salles has decided to pay duties on the merchandise that he has imported. Even so, he is much more fortunate than the rest of us, who have to pay not only duties, but also many other taxes and merchants profits thereon, on every imported article that we buy.

—The state government of S. Paulo has notified the Sorocabana company that within 20 days it must pay into the state treasury the sum of 1,245,000\$86, amount of the company's indebtedness on account of the Companhia Itana and Companhia Navegação Fluvial Paulista.

—Dr. Eduardo Prado, one of the most talented writers in Brazil and a member of a prominent S. Paulo family, died in the city of S. Paulo, on the 30th ult. of yellow fever contracted in Rio de Janeiro. Communications have been received from all parts of the country, showing how deeply his death is deplored.

—Luiz Pinto de Andrade, illegally arrested by police authorities on account of the political disturbances on the 22nd ult., has been set at liberty in virtue of a writ of habeas corpus. The court, ordering the prisoner's release, censured in very strong terms the conduct of the police authorities, who, the judges state, furnished false information to the court.

—The discussion of the general revenue bill commenced yesterday in the chamber of deputies. The revenue for 1902 is estimated in the bill at 42,576,666\$667 in gold, and 258,011,000\$000 in currency, against 27,049,708\$277 in gold, and 277,883,051\$281 in currency collected last year and the estimate of 45,101,667\$000 in gold and 285,082,200\$000 in currency in the budget for the present year.

—On the 4th inst. there was issued in this city a manifesto of Rio Grande federalists. It is signed by Rafael Cabeda, Pedro Moutier, Barros Cassal and Alcides Lima. In Rio Grande do Sul a federalist manifesto, signed by Marshal Augusto Cesar da Silva, Venesclán Escobar and others, has also been issued. We understand that a convention of the party will be held at Bagé.

—It has been asserted that the Banco da Republica will not furnish information in regard to the deputies who have abusively obtained money from that establishment. In our opinion, however, the bank will not fail to furnish the information, if the chamber really wishes it. If the chamber does not wish it, the investigation is a farce that is very creditable to the chamber.

—On Thursday, by a vote of 75 to 43, the chamber rejected a motion of Deputy Serzedello to ask the government for information in regard to custom-houses said to have been established by the government of Venezuela in territory east of the Rio Negro.

—"A move is on foot," says the *Buenos Aires Herald*, "between the four merchants of this city in order to improve the condition of the flour markets of Brazil, which they have finally wrested from the North American trade after much hard labor and no inconsiderable sacrifice. There is not a week that goes by but we ship a cargo of flour to Brazil... and an international understanding would certainly prove beneficial to parties at both ends of the deal."

—It is stated that Dr. José Hygino, a gentleman who won a very honorable reputation as judge of the supreme court, will represent Brazil in the Pan-American congress. It is reported that he will be paid 50,000\$ in gold and that his two secretaries will each receive 18,000\$ in gold. The appropriation of 150,000\$ in gold for Brazil's expenditures at the congress has passed the chamber of deputies and been sent to the senate. In this body the committee on finance reports in favor of the appropriation, but the committee on the constitution proposes to reduce it to 75,000\$.

—On Monday, the 6th ult., the proceedings of the chamber of deputies were stormy, anarchical and scandalous. During the debates deputies addressed each other in the most violent and insulting language. All this was apropos of a motion offered by Deputy Barbosa Lima for appointing a committee for investigating the question of the accounts of some of the deputies with the Banco da Republica, from which they are said to have abusively received money. On the following day the motion was voted with an amendment, declaring that the committee should be composed of Deputy Barbosa Lima and such deputies as he should select for this purpose. As far as we are aware, this method of choosing the members of a committee has never before been adopted by any legislative assembly.

—The cigar-makers of Bahia have sent to congress a petition in which they show that burdensome taxation is destroying the tobacco industry of the country. This taxation, which increases prices and diminishes sales, is forcing manufacturers to reduce not only the wages but also the number of their operatives, so that the sum now paid in wages is considerably less than it was some years ago. In the district of S. Felix, for instance, the wages paid now amount to only 63,000\$ a month, against 122,000\$ a month in 1897. In other districts there is a similar state of affairs, which necessarily causes much suffering among the poorer classes. Many houses have been vacated because the tenants are no longer able to pay rent. In small houses, formerly occupied by a single family, three or four families are now obliged to crowd. It is hoped that congress intends increasing still more the taxes on tobacco the Bahia cigar-makers vigorously protest against this ruinous policy of burdensome taxation.

—The period of four months fixed by the constitution for the congressional session has now expired and during that period, we regret to say, very little legislative work was done. The discussion of the army and navy bills was not finished and that of the budget was not even commenced. It is manifestly unjust, however, to censure congress alone for this lamentable state of affairs, since there are no doubt that the government is equally to blame. The ministers of finance and industry had up to the end of that period failed to prepare their reports, and it was only in the middle of the fourth month that the estimates were sent to congress. Such scandalous waste of time, repeated year after year, has contributed powerfully to bring the government and congress into disrepute and to increase the prevalent discontent. Congress has voted a resolution extending the session to the 2nd prox., after which there will, of course, have to be further extensions, which will probably carry the session, as usual, to the end of the year. In the debate on the resolution in the chamber of deputies there was offered an amendment limiting remuneration to congressmen in actual attendance during the extension, but this amendment was overruled by the chair.

The soiree was a great success, although there was a great scarcity of ladies. It is to be hoped the next time the Fleet visit Santos they will be able to make a longer stay.

S. A. C. v. FLEET (H. M. S. Cambrian, Nymph, Basilisk).

Played at José Menino 21st August. The Fleet won the toss and decided to take the field. Santos opened their innings badly. Burgos, being bowled the first ball of the match by Ames, in trying his old trick, of placing the ball through his legs. Lloyd and Tomlinson gave little trouble, things looking very black until Murray and Miller got together. Murray, however, was too impatient and was clean bowled by Kenney. Grey joined Miller, and although he only made 7, together they put a different complexion on the game.

PORTO RICAN COFFEE TRADE.

Merchants of the city of San Juan, Porto Rico, are alarmed about the importation of Brazilian coffee, which the removal of the tariff has made possible. The steamship "Ponce" brought two consignments yesterday, one of 120 and the other of 115 bags. This coffee can be sold here at about one-half the price of the Porto Rican product, thus destroying the market for the latter.

The merchants of Manati met to-day and resolved not to trade with the importers of coffee from Brazil, and meetings were also held in other towns. Gov. Hunt has consented to ask for relief from Washington by the enactment of a measure declaring that the proclamation does not refer to the special duty of five cents on coffee.

Pearing public sentiment, the importers who arrived to-day announced that the coffee received would be shipped back again by the next vessel. The newspapers, considering a favorable construction of the law impossible, are urging a boycott against the dealers until congress can act in the matter.

The 233 bags of Brazilian coffee which arrived at San Juan on the steamship "Ponce" from New York and was allowed to enter free of duty in competition with the Porto Rico article, have been shipped to New York by the steamship "Maracibo." The coffee was taken from Brazil to New York and imported here by Lomba & Co. The trouble arose through the removal of the tariff of 5 cents per pound on coffee.

When the coffee arrived Lomba & Co. said they had only received it on consignment. There was much popular disfavor and the firm at first sought delay. This people and the merchants, however, demanded that the goods be sent back to New York by the first steamship. The merchants have signed an agreement not to import any Brazilian coffee and Lomba & Co. head the list of signatures. The news that Secretary of the Treasury Cage is considering this matter has been joyfully received in Porto Rico.



THE RIO NEWS.

This paper is now in its 26th year having originally been published as *The South American Mail* and *The British and American Mail*. It assumed its present title at the beginning of April, 1879, when it was published three times a month. From a tri-monthly it has been changed to a weekly publication, and from four pages it has been increased to twelve.
